INTRODUCTION

The San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters (ROV) is committed to protecting each registered voter's right to cast a ballot safely and securely. 





Article #1

Have You Voted Yet? Everything You Need to Know about Voting

For the November 5, 2024, General Election, you have the opportunity to choose how, when, and where to vote.

You have multiple options, including voting by mail, using a mail ballot drop-off location or Early Vote Site, or in person at a polling place on November 5.

Here are the details about early voting.

- 1. **Mail ballots** On October 7, ballots began to be mailed to San Bernardino County-registered voters. Once received, you can cast your voted mail ballot with a pre-paid envelope in the mail, at an early vote site, at a mail ballot drop-off location, or at any polling place.
- Early Vote Sites An Early Vote Site is a location where you may pick up or cast a mail ballot. Starting October 7, the Registrar of Voters office, located at 777 E Rialto Avenue in San Bernardino, operates as an early vote site through Election Day. An additional four sites will be open from October 29 to November 2 and on November 4.
- 3. **Ballot drop-off locations** –Y ou can choose from <u>more than 75 secure mail ballot drop-off</u> <u>locations</u> throughout the county to cast your vote. Outdoor secure mail ballot drop-boxes are bolted to the ground, and ballots are regularly picked up pursuant to State law.

If you prefer to vote in person, you can cast your ballot at your assigned polling place on Election Day. The County's more than 290 polling locations will be open on November 5 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Details can be found on the Registrar of Voters' <u>website or on the back of your Voter Information Guide</u>.

As you prepare to vote, remember, it's "Your Ballot. Vote Early. All Ways Secure."

Article #2 Tips for Filling Out Your Ballot

Every vote counts! The San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters is committed to protecting your right to cast a ballot safely and securely. For some voting in the November 5, 2024, General Election, this may be their first time casting a mail ballot.

Mail ballots were delivered to the U.S. Postal Service on October 7, 2024. Here are some helpful tips to make sure your ballot makes it to the finish line.

- Submit your ballot on time. If returning it by mail, your ballot must be postmarked on or before November 5, 2024! If you want to cast your voted mail ballot at a mail ballot drop-off location, the Registrar of Voters office, or a polling place, you must drop it off on or before 8 p.m. on Election Day.
- Choose your ink wisely. The ballot scanners do not read red ink opt for blue or black. Even markers are ok to use as long as they are black or blue ink.
- Make your mark. Double check you have filled in the ovals in every contest on the ballot that you wanted to vote. Then, seal, sign, and date the return envelope itself.
- No postage necessary! Do not worry about getting the right stamp for your ballot each one comes with a prepaid postage envelope.
- Track your ballot! Enroll in Where's My Ballot to receive emails, texts, or phone notifications about the status of your ballot. Go to <u>WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov</u>.

Article #3 Offices and Candidates on the Ballot for the General Election

For the November 5, 2024, General Election, there are three types of offices: party-nominated, voternominated and nonpartisan. Below are the different types of offices that will appear on the ballot:

Party-Nominated Offices

- President and Vice President
- The party nominating the candidate is listed with the candidate's name.
- Voters may write in the name of a candidate whose name is not listed.

Voter-Nominated Offices

- Includes contests for:
 - United States Senator (Full Term)
 - United States Senator (Partial/Unexpired Term)
 - o United States Representative
 - o State Senator
 - o Member of the State Assembly
- Only the top two vote-getters from the Primary appear on the ballot regardless of party preference.
- The party preference of the candidate is listed on the ballot.
- Voters may not write in the name of a candidate whose name is not on the ballot.

Nonpartisan Offices

- Includes contests for:
 - $\circ \quad \text{School Offices} \quad$
 - County Offices
 - City Offices
 - Special District Offices
- The party preference of the candidate is not listed on the ballot.
- Voters may write in the name of a candidate whose name is not on the ballot.

Measures Submitted to the Voters

- State propositions
- Local ballot measures (only in certain jurisdictions)

Article #4 Everything You Need to Know about Early Voting

For the November 5, 2024, General Election, you have the choice of when, where, and how to vote. Casting your ballot at an Early Vote site or at one of our more than 70 ballot drop-off locations is the best way to avoid lines and crowds at polling places. Four sites will be open from October 29 to November 2 and on November 4. Pick from a list of locations below and cast your ballot today!

Article #5 Ensuring Your Ballot and Election Process is Always Secure

Among the top concerns during any election are the secure nature of casting a ballot and the integrity of the overall election process.

The San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters (ROV) has a host of layered security protocols in place in accordance with the California Secretary of State's Office, which is legally mandated to certify any voting system prior to its sale and use within California. As a result, the state has developed one of the most strenuous voting systems testing and certification programs in the country.

In San Bernardino County, ROV is required to abide by stringent sets of rules and regulations regarding implementation and use of a voting system. A few notable rules and regulations include performance of logic and accuracy testing on voting systems prior to each election and ensuring specific procedures for programming, deployment, and use of voting equipment during elections are met.

Pursuant to the Elections Code, no part of a voting system shall be connected to the internet at any time. Nor shall any part of a voting system electronically receive or transmit election data through an exterior communication network of any type.

All this to say, the ROV takes election security very seriously, and we have multiple layers of security in place to protect your ballot and election results.

Article #6 Everything You Need to Know about Voting at a Polling Place

If you prefer to cast your ballot in person at a polling place, you can vote at your assigned polling place. The County's more than 290 polling locations will be open this year on Tuesday, November 5, from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

You can use the County's <u>Polling Place Look-up tool</u> or look on the back of your Voter Information Guide to find your assigned polling place.

Please note that masks are not required at any County polling place or Early Vote site regardless of vaccination status. Public health requirements are subject to change based on guidance from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), California Department of Public Health, or San Bernardino County Department of Public Health.

Article #7 Voter Registration File Maintenance

One of the keys to ensuring a fair and accurate election is to perform voter registration file maintenance to help ensure that the San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters' database of voters is as exact as possible.

Every year, voters pass away, change mailing addresses or their name, or submit new voter registration applications with new or different information about themselves that must be reconciled for each election.

By California state law, all Registrars of Voters must perform daily voter registration file updates to record changes to each voter's registration. These updates include removing duplicate voter registration files and deceased voters that are received from the Secretary of State and County Health Department.

The San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters goes above and beyond what is required by state law to help ensure the accuracy of its voter information. Using national deceased record data, vital records, and others, the Registrar of Voters minimizes the rate of undeliverable ballots, which is a leading indicator of its accurate list maintenance.

As you prepare to vote, remember, it's "Your Ballot. Vote Early. All Ways Secure."

Article #8 Tracking Your Ballot Is Easy

After casting your ballot for the November 5, 2024, General Election, you can easily look up the status of your ballot by using several websites.

You can track when your ballot is mailed, received, and will be counted through the Secretary of State's Where's My Ballot tracking system. You can sign up to receive notifications about the status of your mail ballot via email, text message, and/or telephone call. Sign up at <u>WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov.</u>

In addition, you may use one of the following two websites to look up the status of your ballot:

- <u>My Voter Status</u> on the Secretary of State's website enables you to look up the status of your ballot. This service provides similar messages to the notifications sent by <u>Where's My Ballot</u> from "ballot mailed" to "ballot received" or "ballot counted."
- <u>My Elections Gateway</u> on the Registrar of Voters' website enables you to look up the status of your ballot if you voted by mail.
 - If you have cast a mail ballot, the status of your ballot will remain "received" until we certify the election results (on or before December 3). After certification, your mail ballot status will update to "counted" or "not counted."
 - If you voted at a polling place, your voting history will not be immediately available on My Elections Gateway. You will be able to view your voting history after the election results are certified to see that you voted in this election.
