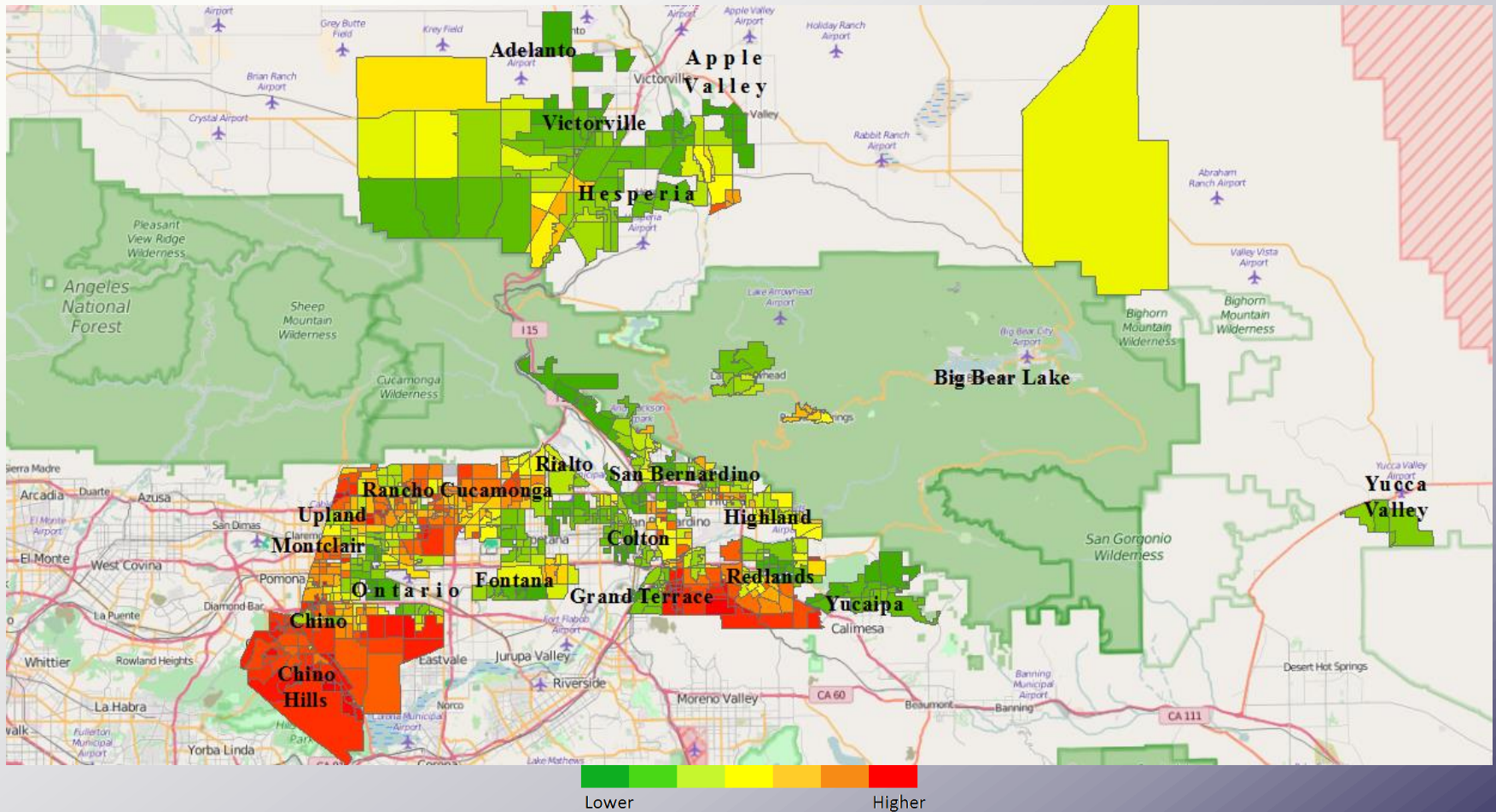

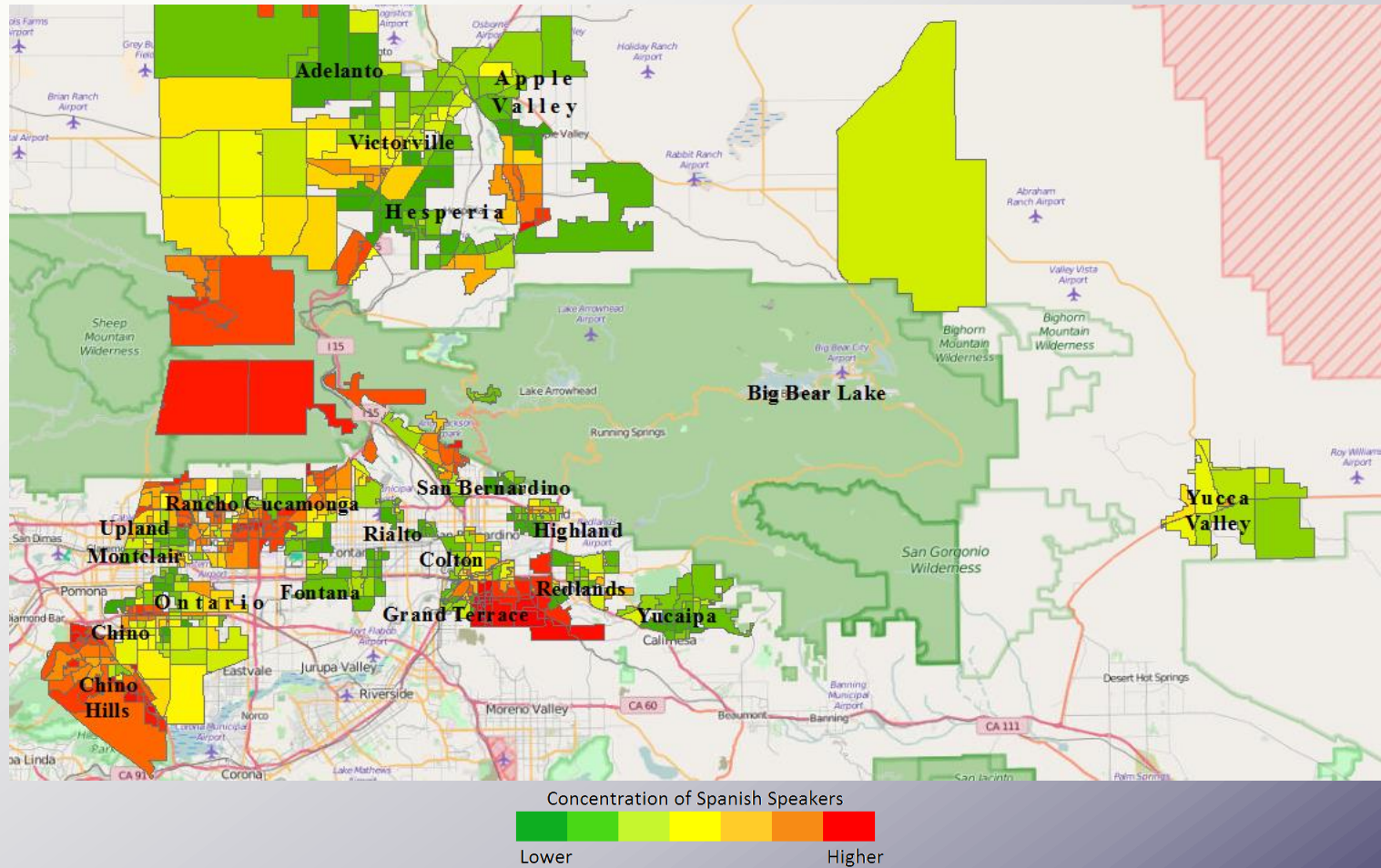


- Poll worker program

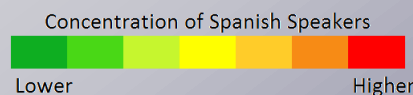
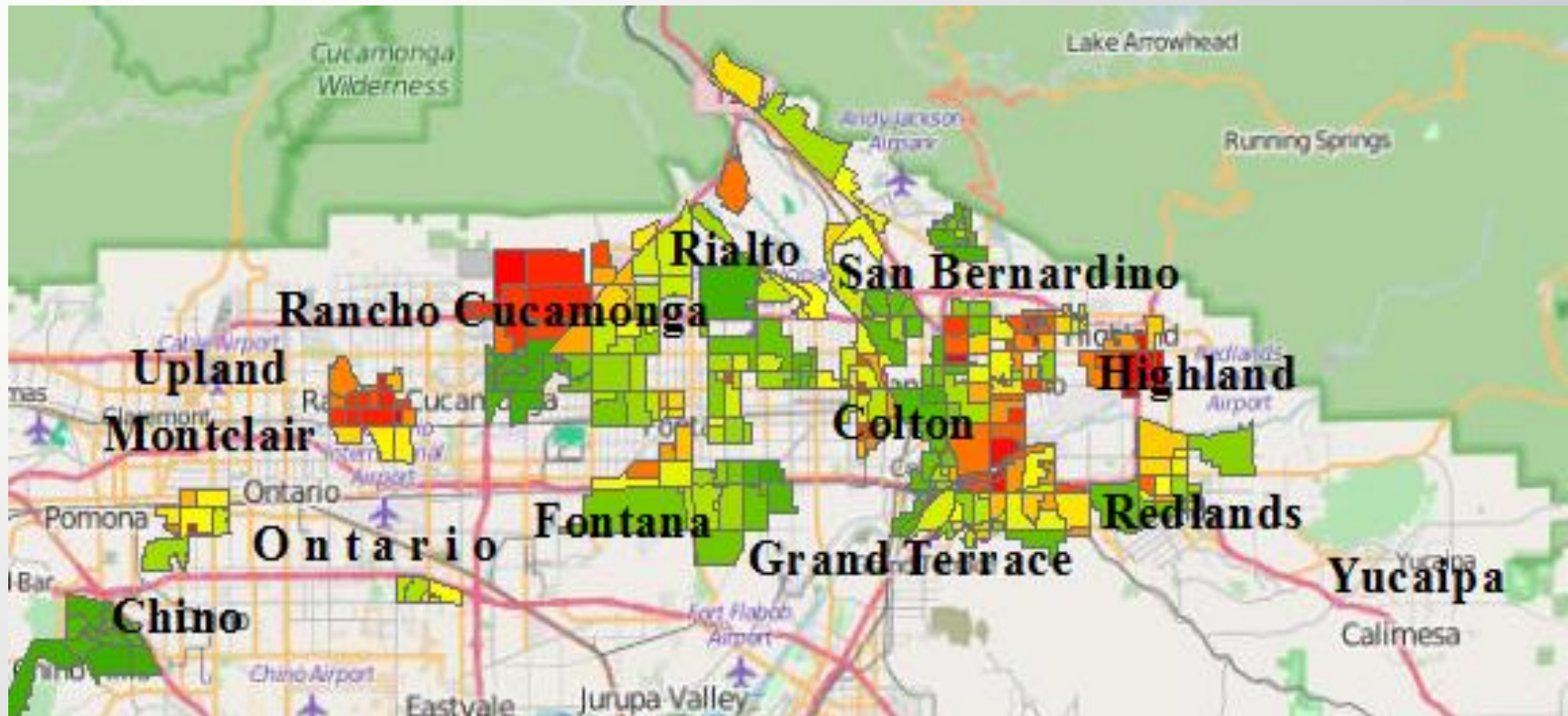
Chinese language density demographics



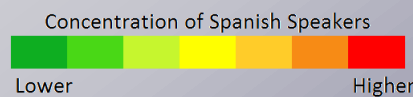
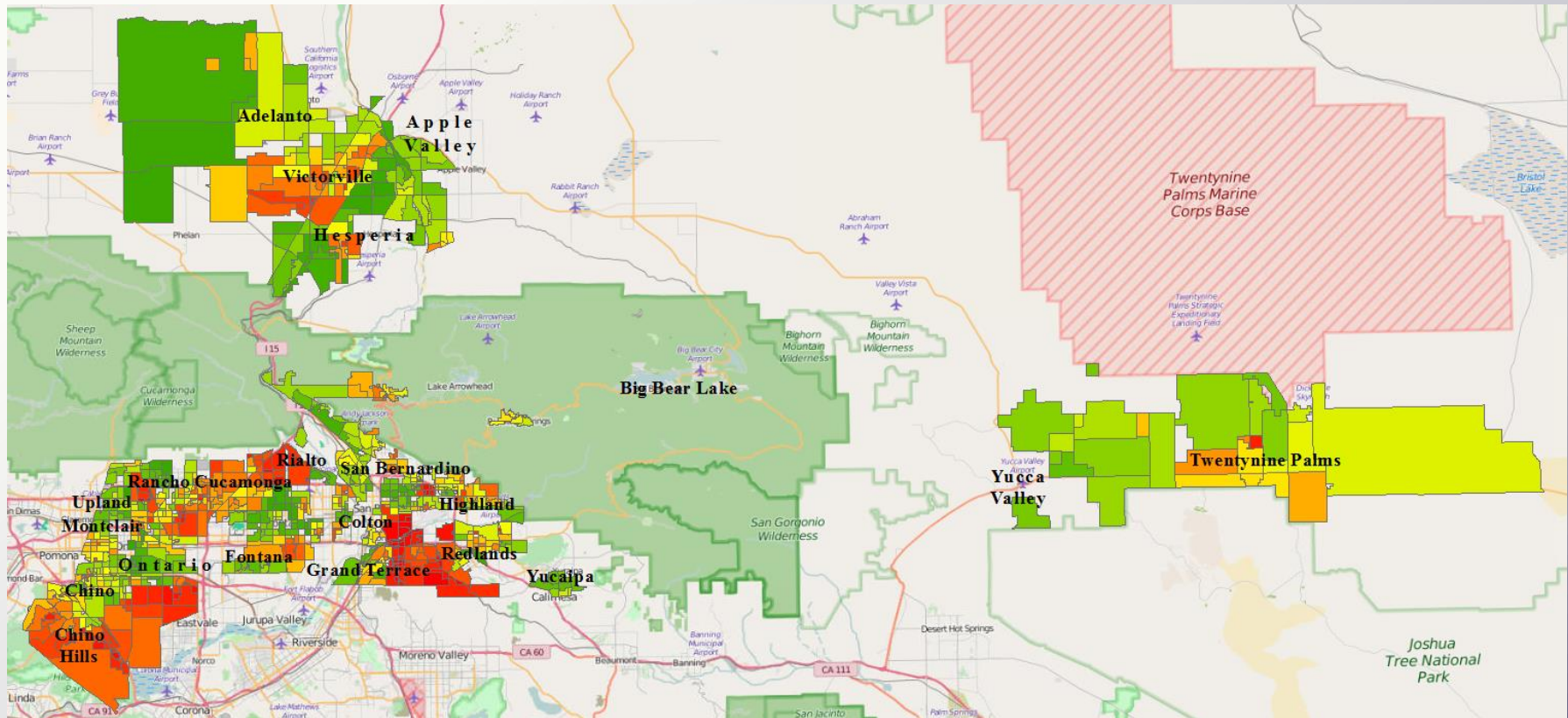
■ Korean language density demographics



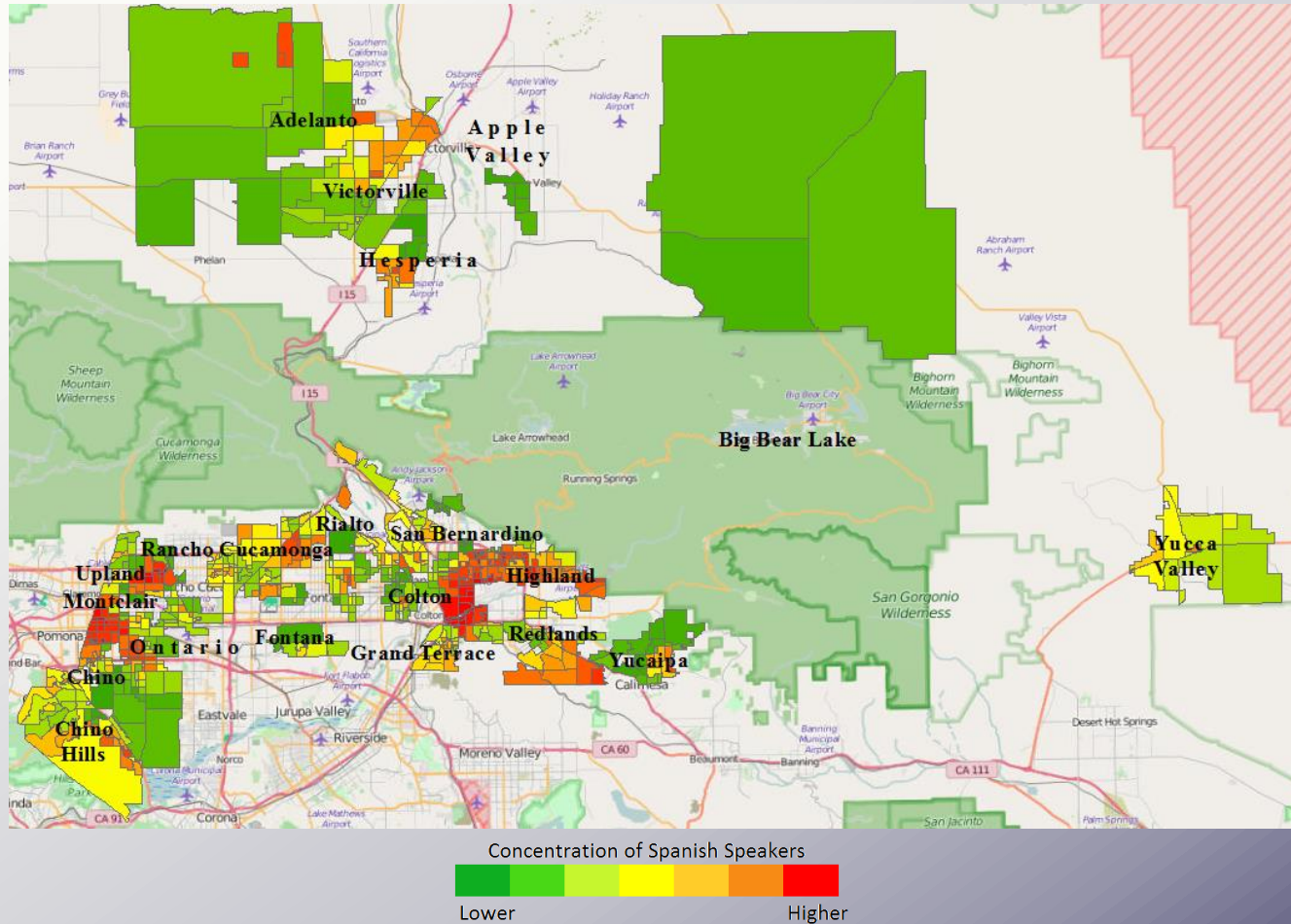
- Khmer language density demographics

- Bilingual recruitment goals and objectives
 - Increase partnerships with community organizations
 - Objective: Become program ambassador by networking in your community
 - Distribute recruitment information
 - Objective: Identify organizations engaged in the Chinese, Khmer, Korean, Tagalog and Vietnamese speaking communities
- Increase number of bilingual poll workers
 - Objective: Encourage potential bilingual poll workers to apply

- Election Day is June 7, 2016
 - 407 Polling Places
 - Approximately 760,000 Registered Voters
 - Approximately 3,500 Poll Workers
 - 40 Contests
 - 2 Local Measures
 - 1 State Proposition

- Saturday, May 7 Voter Information Guides delivered
- Monday, May 9 Early voting begins
- Saturday, May 14 Mail Ballots delivered
- Monday, May 23 Voter registration deadline
- Tuesday, May 31 Deadline to apply to vote by mail
- Tuesday, June 7 Election Day

■ Three Ways to Vote

■ Vote by Mail

- To vote by mail, you must be a permanent Mail Ballot voter, or request a Mail Ballot by May 31
- Ballots will be mailed starting May 14
- Return your voted Mail Ballot by:
 - **Mail** via the U.S. Postal Service
 - **Drop off** at any City Clerk's office, County library, or any polling place on Election Day. Visit **www.SBCountyElections.com** for locations

- Three Ways to Vote
 - Vote on Election Day
 - Assigned polling place from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.
 - Assigned polling place are listed on the back of the Voter Information guide
 - Voters can find their assigned polling place by visiting **www.SBCountyElections.com** or by calling (909) 387-8300 or (800) 881-VOTE (8683)

- Top Two Open Primary
 - Created by Proposition 14 (June 2010)
 - Changed the way primary elections are conducted in California

- Party-nominated offices
 - President and County Central Committees
 - Only voters who have chosen a party preference may vote for their party's candidates
 - The American Independent, Democratic and Libertarian Parties allow nonpartisan voters to vote in their presidential races.
 - The winner of each party's primary will represent that party in the General Election.

- Voter-nominated offices
 - Congressional and State Offices
 - All voters, regardless of party preference, can vote for any candidate on the ballot.
 - The top two vote-getters, regardless of party preference, will proceed to General Election.

- Nonpartisan offices
 - County and Judicial Offices
 - All voters, regardless of party preference, can vote for any candidate on the ballot.
 - The candidate's party preference will not be listed on the ballot.
 - The top two vote-getters will proceed to General Election.
 - If a candidate receives more than 50% of the vote, that candidate is elected to office.

There are **34** candidates for United States Senator listed in two columns on the official ballot. Voters can only vote for **one** candidate.
