IMPORTANT DATES

- Friday, October 7: San Bernardino County Voter Information Guides delivered to the U.S. Post Office
- Monday, October 10: Vote-by-mail ballots delivered to the U.S. Post Office for mailing to county registered voters
- Tuesday, October 11: Early voting begins at the Registrar of Voters office
- Monday, October 24: Voter registration deadline; conditional voter registration begins
- Tuesday, November 1 through Saturday, November 5, and Monday November 7: Additional early voting sites open
- Tuesday, November 8: Election Day, voting at polling places takes place from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. All ballots returned by mail must be postmarked on or before this date.
- Thursday, December 8: Election results are certified by this date and posted on the SBCountyElections.com website





- 1. Use a pen or marker with blue or black ink when filling out your ballot.
- 2. Remember to sign the envelope before you mail or drop off your ballot.
- 3. Mail ballots must be postmarked by Nov. 8 or delivered off in person at a polling place or mail ballot drop-off location by 8 p.m. on Nov. 8.

Demystifying the Voting Process

Recommended Timing for Use: Oct. 1-Nov. 1

The San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters is committed to discussing the safe, protected journey of a ballot from the moment a vote is cast to the point it is counted. Our objectives are to give the county population insight into the election process and help people better understand how the San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters ensures:

- That all eligible citizens in the county understand how they can register to vote
- That all registered voters receive a ballot and know how to complete and submit their voted
 ballot
- That all voted ballots are collected and securely transported
- That ballot processing is transparent and fair
- We want voters in our county to trust that the election process is safe and secure and
 everyone's ballot is impartially processed. Our goal is to remove the mystery of how elections
 are conducted and ballots are counted.

Registered voters have four options when it comes to casting a ballot in the General Election:

- Vote by mail
- Mail ballot drop-off location
- Early Vote Site
- Polling Place

Regardless of how a voter submits their ballot, the Registrar of Voters ensures ballots are transported securely to our office to be processed.

What's on Your Ballot for the 2022 General Election?

Recommended Timing for Use: Oct. 1-Nov. 7

In the 2022 General Election, all voters will receive a mail ballot. Depending on which voting precinct you reside in, the following contests and measures may appear on your ballot.

Voter-Nominated Offices

- Includes contests for:
 - Statewide Offices
 - United States Representative
 - o Member, State Board of Equalization
 - State Senator or Member of the State Assembly
 - The party preference of the candidate is listed on the ballot.

Nonpartisan Offices

- Includes contests for:
 - Judicial Offices
 - State Superintendent of Public Instruction
 - School District Offices
 - County Offices
 - City Offices
 - Special District Offices
- The party preference of the candidate is not listed on the ballot.
- Voters may write in the name of a candidate whose name is not on the ballot.

Ballots

All voters will receive an Official Ballot that contains:

- General Election contests:
 - Voter-nominated offices
 - Nonpartisan offices
- Measures:
 - State propositions
 - Local ballot measures (only in certain jurisdictions)

A County Voter Information Guide mailed to all registered voters beginning on October 7 offers a full sample ballot with all the candidates and measures listed.

Everything You Need to Know About Early Voting

Recommended Timing for Use: Oct. 11-Nov. 6

For the 2022 General Election, you have the choice of when, where, and how to vote. Casting your ballot at an early vote site or at one of our more than 70 mail ballot drop-off locations is the best way to avoid lines and crowds at polling places on Election Day. Pick from a list of locations below and cast your ballot today!

Ensuring Your Ballot and Election Process is Always Secure

Recommended Timing for Use: Oct. 1-Nov. 7

The state of California has developed one of the most strenuous voting system testing and certification programs in the country. For more information, click this link:

At the local level, California counties are required to abide by stringent sets of rules and regulations regarding the implementation and use of a voting system.

All voting systems undergo extensive testing prior to certification, which includes:

- Examination and testing of system software
- Software source code review and evaluation
- Hardware and software security penetration testing
- Hardware testing under conditions simulating the intended storage, operation, transportation, and maintenance environments
- Inspection and evaluation of system documentation
- Operational testing to validate system performance and functioning under normal and abnormal conditions.

Pursuant to the California Elections Code, section 19205, "no part of a voting system shall be connected to the internet at any time, or electronically receive or transmit election data through any exterior communications network." The voting systems used in California do not connect to the Internet.

The Registrar of Voters processes are transparent and open for observation, including:

- Testing of the voting system equipment used to count ballots prior to their use in the election
- Examination of signatures on the mail ballot return envelopes
- Removal of the ballots from the envelopes
- Counting of the ballots on high-speed, accurate ballot scanners
- Hand counting of at least one percent of the precincts and one percent of the mail ballots to audit the accuracy of the scanners
- Testing of the voting system equipment used to count ballots after their use in the election

Once you cast your ballot at a polling place or it is removed from your mail ballot return envelope, it cannot be identified as your specific ballot. Your ballot does not contain information to identify it as yours to ensure your vote remains confidential. The Registrar of Voters only tracks that you voted in the election and the method you used to cast your ballot. Neither the Registrar of Voters nor anyone else will know the votes you marked on your ballot for a candidate or measure.

Secure, accessible, and locked ballot boxes are made available for ballot drop-offs through 8 p.m. on Election Day. Outdoor mail ballot drop boxes are locked and bolted to concrete to deter theft. Ballot drop-off locations are also placed in areas that have higher public visibility, and ballots are picked-up by 2-person ballot security teams on a regular basis for processing.

Vote Tomorrow!

Recommended Timing for Use: Nov. 7

Tomorrow is Election Day! The San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters offers several resources for voters on how, when, and where they can vote in the 2022 General Election.

You have four ways to cast a voted ballot this election:

- Vote-by-Mail
- Mail ballot drop-off location
- Early Vote Site
- Polling Place

In order for your mail ballot to be processed, your ballot must be:

- Postmarked no later than 8 p.m. tomorrow on Election Day, November 8, 2022, and received by the Registrar of Voters no later than Tuesday, November 15
- Dropped off at any polling place by 8 p.m. on Election Day
- Delivered to the Registrar of Voters by 8 p.m. on Election Day
- Deposited into a mail ballot drop box by 8 p.m. on Election Day.

In-Person Voting

The San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters will be open on Election Day, Tuesday, November 8 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. along with polling places throughout the County.

To find your assigned polling place, please refer to your <u>Voter Information Guide</u>. You can also use My Elections Gateway or the Polling Place Look-up tool on the Registrar of Voters' website at <u>www.SBCountyElections.com</u>. Or call (800) 881-VOTE or (909) 387-8300.
