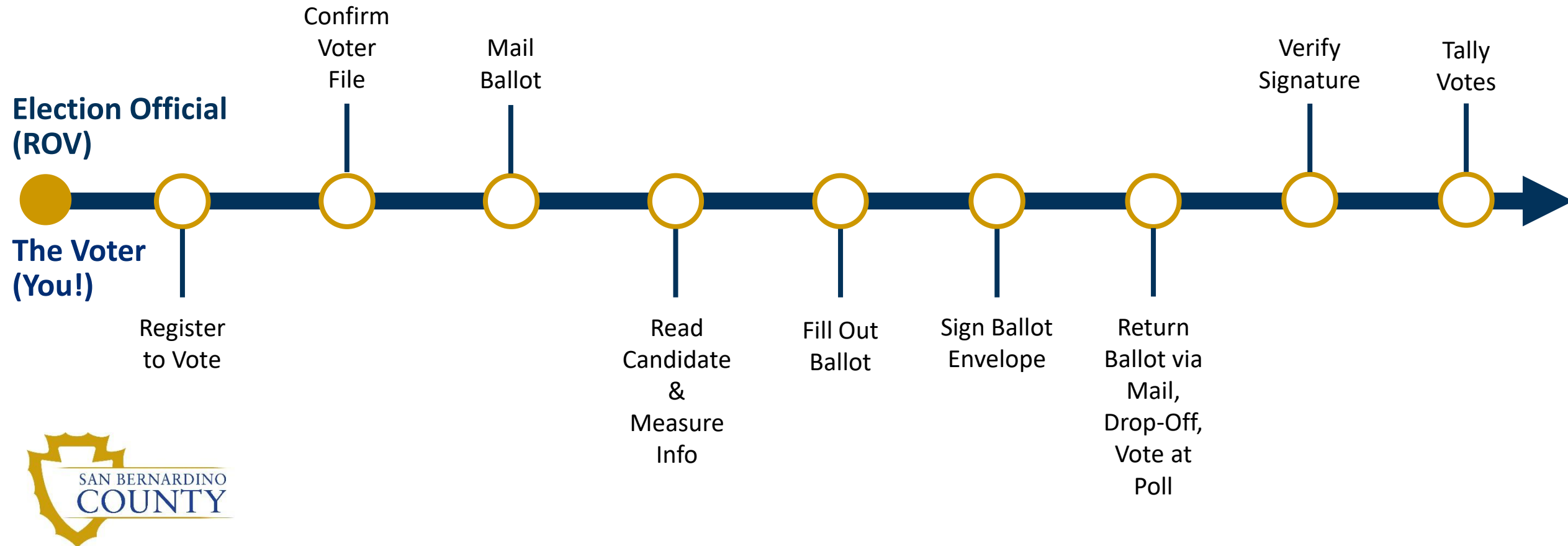


The security of your ballot and protecting the integrity of the election are our highest priorities.

We provide accessible, fair, accurate, secure and transparent elections.

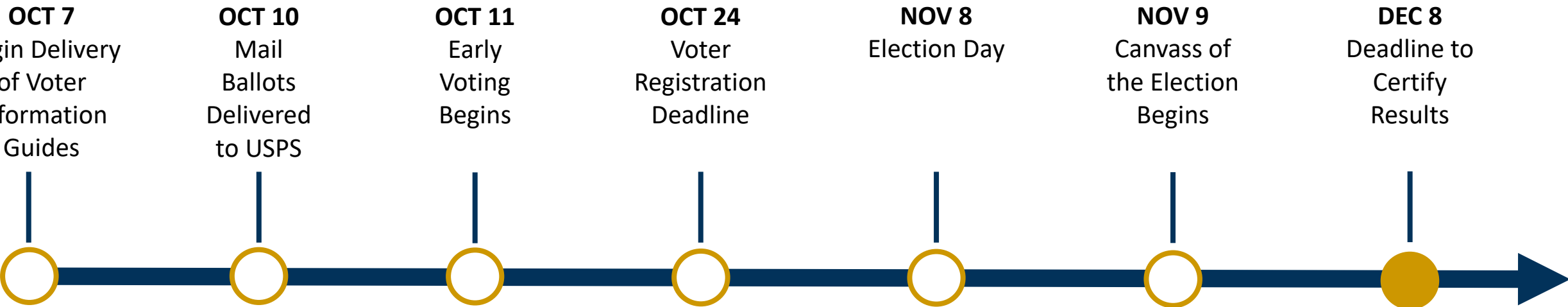
A collaborative process...

Both the voter and election official have responsibilities throughout the voting process.

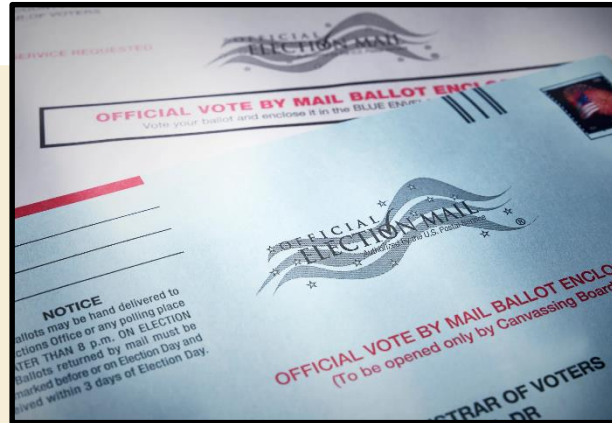
You choose how you want to vote...

Easiest: Vote by mail (postage paid!)

Take ballot to official ROV location

- Place in one of 76 drop-off locations throughout County
- Visit one of 5 early vote sites

Traditional in-person: Visit your designated polling place on Election Day (292)

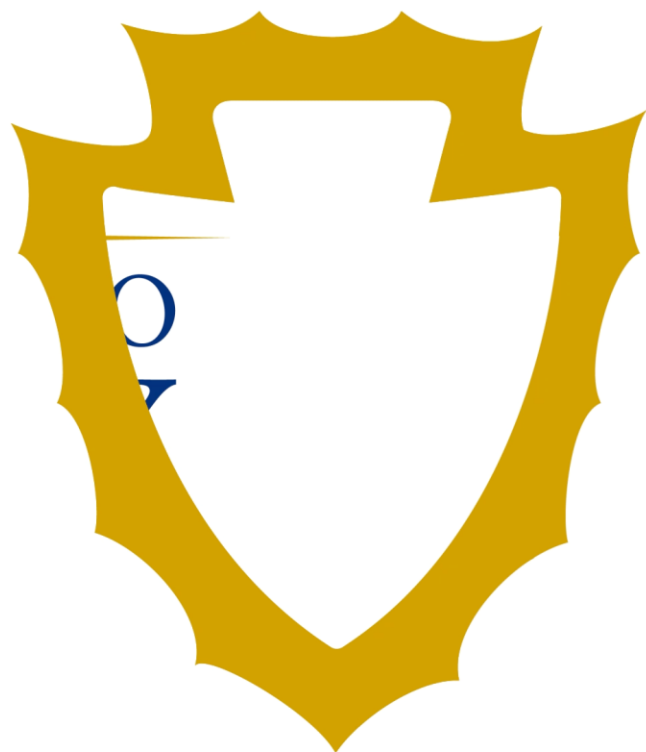


The journey of your mail ballot...

Regardless of how you submit your ballot, we make sure it gets to the Registrar of Voters office for processing.

Let's take a look at how a vote-by-mail ballot gets processed and counted.





Let's recap...

Whether you cast your vote-by-mail ballot at an early vote site, a drop-off location, or the U.S. Post Office, the ballot will be processed the same.



Mailing your vote-by-mail ballot...

Ballots delivered to U.S. Post Office on October 10

Ballots do not have any personal information; each one has a unique barcode that matches it to a specific registered voter

Vote-by-mail ballot envelopes must be postmarked by November 8

No postage necessary – it is already prepaid

Make sure to sign the mail ballot envelope



If you dropped off your ballot...

76 ballot drop-boxes available throughout the County

Drop boxes are heavy reinforced steel, bolted to the ground, and have a tamper-deterrent design

Ballot boxes in areas with high public visibility, accessibility, convenience

Ballots collected at regular intervals

Ballots are placed in box, sealed, and recorded in detailed log



Early vote sites and Election Day...

Similar collection process for vote-by-mail ballots dropped off at an early vote site or polling place on Election Day

Vote-by-mail ballots are received at the Registrar of Voters headquarters or a designated collection site throughout the county

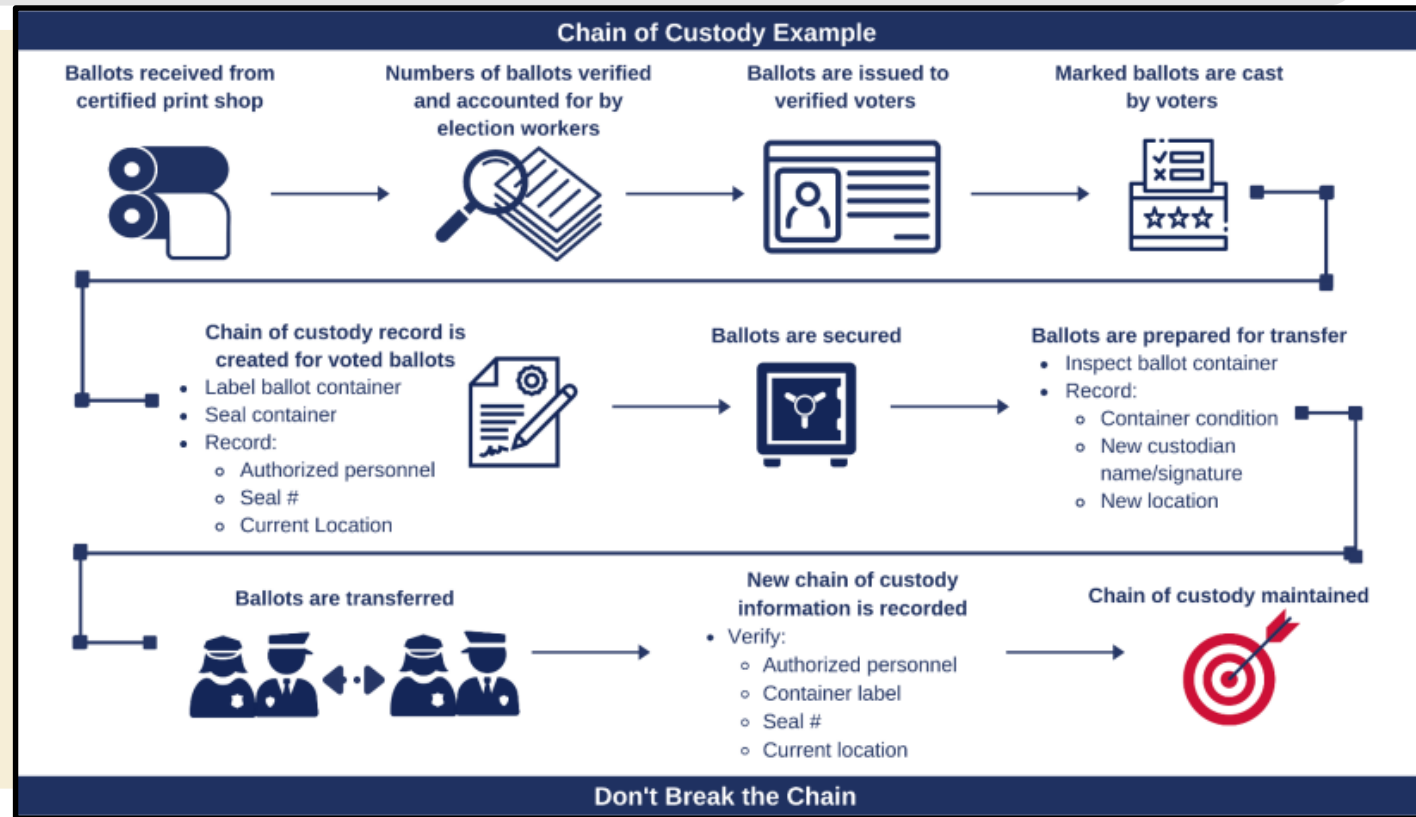


What is chain of custody and why it matters...

It's important that every legitimate ballot gets counted.

San Bernardino County is proud of its commitment to a free and fair election.

There is a secure **chain of custody** for both vote-by-mail and in-person ballots.



When ballots reach the Registrar of Voters ...

Boxed ballots are checked for intact official seals and the collection team log pick-up location is matched.

Ballots are then loaded into a sorting machine.

Trained staff compare each voter's signature on the ballot envelope to signature found on the voter's record.

If the signature compares, the envelope is opened and the ballot is counted using high-speed ballot scanners, each monitored by teams of three.



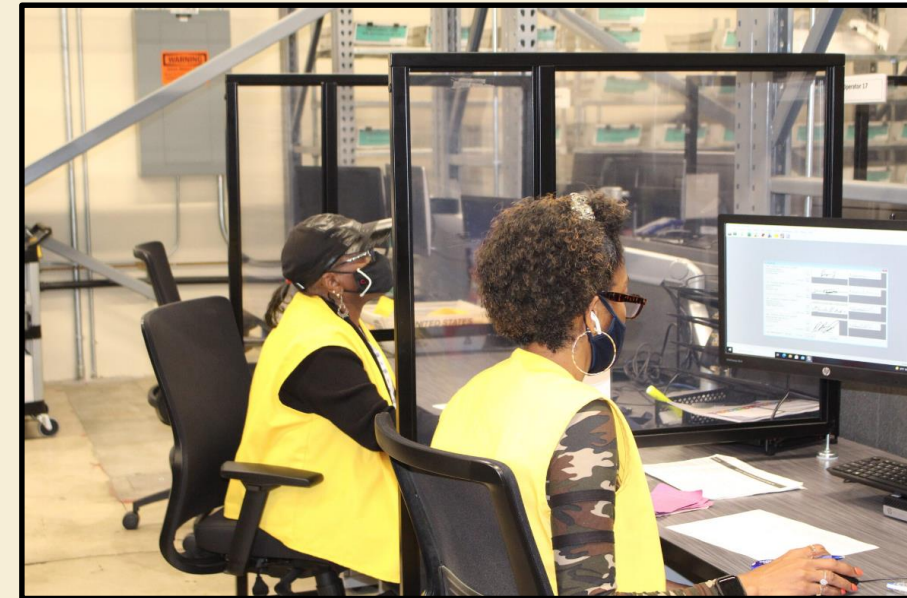
How are ballots counted?...

If there is a problem with a signature, the ballot is placed on hold and the voter is notified of the hold and ways to resolve it.

If a scanner cannot determine the voter's intent, trained two-person teams work to review issue.

After ballots are counted, they are placed back in the original collection box, which is resealed and archived.

The entire counting process is monitored 24/7 by cameras. Ballot process activities may be observed by any member of the public.



How can I get involved ...

There are a few ways to get involved in the election process.

- Poll worker – must be at least 18 years of age and registered to vote in California; stipends based on role
- Student poll worker – must be at least 16 years of age and in good academic standing; stipend available
- An election observer – may observe any ballot processing or audit activity at the ROV office; observation schedule is posted on ROV website
