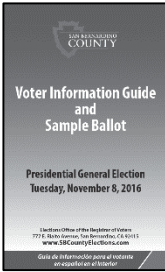

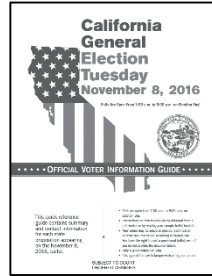

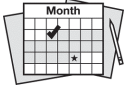

To vote by mail, you must be a permanent Mail Ballot voter, or request a Mail Ballot by November 1.

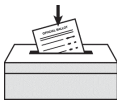



Voting Instructions

Marking your official ballot

1. Use a BLACK or BLUE pen or a #2 pencil.
2. To vote, connect the arrow   pointing to your choice with a single line like this:

	Vote for one
Candidate A	 
Candidate B	
Candidate C	 
(Write-In / En-escrito)	 

3. Do not vote for more candidates than the number indicated for each contest. If you vote for more, your vote will not count for that contest.
4. To vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot, print the name of the candidate on the blank write-in line and connect the arrow pointing to that candidate.
5. If you make a mistake or damage your ballot, request a replacement ballot.



SCHOOL BONDS. FUNDING FOR K-12 SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY COLLEGE FACILITIES. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Federal Election Commission*. *Citizens United* ruled that laws placing certain limits on political spending by corporations and unions are unconstitutional. **MEASURE A
APPLE VALLEY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT**

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE A

This Impartial Analysis of Measure A has been prepared by County Counsel pursuant to Section 9313 of the California Elections Code.

Measure "A" is submitted to the voters by the Apple Valley Fire Protection District ("District") in order to extend the term of the District's current fire suppression special tax and to increase the rate, in order to fund additional fire and emergency response services.

On November 4, 1997, District voters approved Measure "V" (Ordinance No. 39), a fire suppression special tax levied on property within the District to provide fire and emergency medical/rescue services. According to recent figures, Measure "V" currently provides approximately \$2,400,000 in annual revenue, making up 25% of the District's annual budget.

Measure "V" has a term of 20 years and will expire on November 4, 2017, unless extended. Further, the District is proposing an increase in the special tax rate in order to fund additional fire and emergency response services. Under California law (Proposition 218), 2/3 voter approval is required to extend the term of a special tax and to increase its rate.

On August 2, 2016, the District's Board of Directors placed Measure "A" on the November 8, 2016 ballot. Measure "A" would adopt Ordinance No. 54, which allows for the continuation of the special tax created under Measure "V" and increases the rates of the special tax to those amounts specifically set forth in Section 2 of Ordinance No. 54. If Measure "A" is approved, the rate increase will be levied against all taxable real property within the District on July 1st of each year, beginning July 1, 2017.

All special tax revenues must be deposited into a special account created for that purpose and must only be spent on the special purposes outlined in Ordinance No. 54. These include the reopening of fire stations, improving emergency response times, and operation of the District's fire protection and emergency medical/rescue services. It is estimated that Measure "A" will generate an additional \$2,400,000 annually for these special purposes.

Measure "A" would authorize the Board of Directors to adjust the rates of the special tax from year to year, provided the maximum does not exceed the rates set forth in Section 2 of Ordinance No. 54.

Measure "A" requires 2/3 voter approval.

A "Yes" vote for Measure "A" will approve the amendments described above;

A "No" vote against Measure "A" will not approve the amendments described above will leave in place the existing special tax (Measure "V") at its current rate, which will expire on November 4, 2017 and no increase to special taxes will be levied.

RUNNING SPRINGS WATER DISTRICT**

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE B

This Impartial Analysis of Measure B has been prepared by Legal Counsel pursuant to Section 9314 of the California Elections Code.

On March 11, 1980, the Running Springs Water District adopted Ordinance No. 9 authorizing the assessment and collection of an annual availability charge for fire suppression service on each improved lot or parcel of property within the District, except those owned by state or federal governmental agencies, other local agencies, or those determined not to receive fire suppression benefit, in an amount not to exceed \$65 per unit of benefit as defined in the Uniform Building Code, subject to approval by two-thirds of the District's voters as required by law for the assessment of a special tax on real property. At an election conducted on November 4, 1980, more than two-thirds of the voters voting at the election approved the annual availability charge for fire suppression service. Since the date of approval by the voters in 1980, the annual availability charge for fire suppression has not been adjusted to keep pace with increases in the cost of providing fire protection and emergency medical services.

Measure B proposes to adjust the maximum amount of the annual availability charge to \$146 per unit of benefit, for the Running Springs Fire Department to continue providing fire suppression service and also emergency medical, ambulance and advanced life support services. This measure was placed on the ballot by the District's Board of Directors.

The current fee of \$65 per year generates approximately \$200,000 or roughly 10% of the Fire Departments \$2 million annual operating expenses. Adjusting the fee to \$146 per year would generate an additional \$250,000 to help fund the continued local control and operation of the Fire Department and also much needed capital equipment needs.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE B

This Argument in Favor of Measure B was submitted pursuant to Section 9315 of the California Elections Code. It is the opinion of the author(s), and has been printed exactly as submitted.

On November 4, 1980, more than two-thirds of the voters of the Running Springs Fire Department approved a fire suppression availability charge not to exceed \$65 per unit of benefit per year beginning in fiscal year 1980-81. If this amount were adjusted for inflation, the charge today would be \$163 per year. Instead, this measure proposes to increase the charge to no more than \$146 per year. This adjustment in the charge will allow the Running Springs Fire Department to continue providing fire protection, emergency medical, ambulance and advanced life support services to the community of Running Springs.

The current fee of \$65 per year generates approximately \$200,000 or roughly 10% of the Fire Department's \$2 million annual operating expenses. Adjusting the fee to \$146 per year would generate an additional \$250,000 to help fund the continued local control and operation of the Fire Department and also much needed capital equipment needs.

Since 1980, the annual availability charge has not exceeded \$65 per unit of benefit while increases in the cost of providing fire protection and emergency medical services have greatly increased over the last 35 years. This adjustment will help keep pace with inflation, will help preserve local control, and will ensure that local funds are used to provide local benefits.

It is important to clarify that the CalFire Fire Prevention Fee does not provide funding for the Running Springs Fire Department. Revenue from that fee is kept and used by the State of California. The CalFire fee is currently being challenged by the Howard Jarvis Tax Payers Association as an illegal tax, not approved by the voters.

BARSTOW UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT**

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF BOND MEASURE F

This Impartial Analysis of Bond Measure F has been prepared by County Counsel pursuant to Section 9500 of the California Elections Code.

Bond Measure F is submitted to the voters by the Barstow Unified School District ("District") to authorize the District to repair/upgrade aging classrooms and restrooms, and fix leaky roofs in order to maintain student health/safety and retain/attract quality teachers; to remove hazardous materials such as asbestos and lead paint, upgrade security, improve outdated plumbing/electrical systems/gas lines, technology, computer/science labs; repair, construct, and acquire school facilities, sites and equipment.

A "yes" vote by at least fifty-five percent (55%) of the voters voting on this measure will authorize the Board of Trustees of the District to issue and sell bonds to benefit the District in the amount of thirty nine million dollars (\$39,000,000). If fewer than fifty-five percent (55%) of the voters voting on this measure vote "yes", the Board of Trustees of the District will not be authorized to issue and sell the \$39,000,000 in bonds set forth in the measure.

The bond proceeds may not be used for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries or pensions and other school operating expenses.

The District will conduct financial and performance audits annually and will appoint a citizens oversight committee to ensure that bond proceeds are spent only on the school facility projects listed in the measure.

The bonded debt will be a general obligation of the District and will be financed by property taxes levied annually on taxable property located within the District in an amount necessary to pay the annual debt obligation.

\$.045000 per \$100 of assessed valuation, which equates to \$45.00 per \$100,000.

First fiscal year after the first sale of bonds: 2017-2018.

2. The best estimate from official sources of the tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund principal and interest payments during the first fiscal year after the last sale of bonds and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on assessed valuations available at the time of the election and taking into account estimated future growth, is as follows:

\$.045000 per \$100 of assessed valuation, which equates to \$45.00 per \$100,000.

First fiscal year after last sale of bonds: 2026-2027.

3. "BARSTOW UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT CLASSROOM REPAIR, STUDENT SAFETY/ EDUCATION IMPROVEMENT MEASURE. To repair/ upgrade aging classrooms, restrooms/ fix leaky roofs in order to maintain student health/ safety, retain/ attract quality teachers, remove asbestos/ lead paint, upgrade security, outdated plumbing/ electrical systems/ gas lines, improve technology, computer/ science labs, repair, construct, acquire school facilities, sites/ equipment, shall Barstow Unified School District issue \$39,000,000 in bonds, at legal rates, requiring audits, citizens' oversight, no money for administrators' salaries/ pensions, all funds staying local?"

PROJECT LIST

The Board of Trustees of the Barstow Unified School District is committed to improving the quality of education in local schools with safe, secure, upgraded classrooms and labs for career and technology education to help our students succeed in the 21st century economy. To that end, the Board evaluated the District's urgent and critical facility needs, including **basic repairs** and **student safety**, class size reduction, computer and information technology in developing the scope of projects to be funded. The District conducted a facilities evaluation and received public input in developing this Project List. Teachers, staff, community members and the Board have prioritized the key health and safety needs so that the most critical facility needs are addressed. **The Board concluded that upgrading 60-year old schools and removing asbestos, lead paint, and fixing leaky roofs is critical for children to have a safe, healthy place to learn.** Therefore, in approving this Project List, the **Board of Trustees determines that the District must:**

- (i) **Retain all funds to support local students and ensure that money cannot be taken away by the State; and**
- (ii) **Recruit and retain quality teachers; and**
- (iii) **Upgrade school safety systems; and**
- (iv) **Provide clean and safe classrooms; and**
- (v) **Qualify for State matching funds to meet our schools' and children's needs; and**
- (vi) **Adhere to specific fiscal accountability safeguards such as:**
 - (a) All expenditures must be subject to annual independent financial audits.
 - (b) No funds can be used for administrators' salaries and pensions.
 - (c) An independent citizens' oversight committee must be appointed to ensure that all funds are spent only as authorized.
 - (d) **Require public reports documenting how bond funds have been used.**

The Project List includes the following types of upgrades and improvements at District schools and sites:

LOCAL FUNDING FOR BASIC SCHOOL REPAIRS TO CREATE SAFE AND HEALTHY LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS

Goals and Purposes: All money raised by the measure will stay local to support Barstow schools and students. It cannot be taken away by the State or used for other purposes.

Since most of our schools were built more than 60-years ago, they need basic repairs. This measure will remove asbestos and lead paint from classrooms; fix deteriorating classrooms, restrooms, and leaky roofs; and replace outdated air conditioning systems; so children can have a safe, healthy place to learn.

Barstow Unified School District is eligible for matching funds from the State. Nearly all classrooms are out of date and in need of safety upgrades. This measure will allow the school district to qualify for matching funds from the State to meet our schools' and our children's needs.

- **Repair aging classrooms, restrooms and leaky deteriorating roofs.**
- **Remove hazardous asbestos and lead paint.**
- Upgrade fire safety doors, smoke alarms and detectors.
- Upgrade outdated heating, plumbing and electrical systems and gas lines.
- Replace aging water pipes.
- Provide an adequate number of restrooms at each school sites.
- **Upgrade school safety to prevent campus intruders.**
- Repair drinking fountains.

ATTRACTING QUALITY TEACHERS AND IMPROVING STUDENT SAFETY, CAREER TECH AND STEM PROGRAMS

Goals and Purposes: This measure will upgrade school security to prevent accidents and violent intruders from entering campuses, and prevent tragedies at our neighborhood schools. By funding the installation of special door locks for emergency school lockdowns, upgrading playgrounds, and installing up-to-date security cameras so police can arrest people who vandalize schools, our schools will be safer.

In order to succeed in the twenty-first century economy, our students need skills in the fields of science, technology, engineering, and math. Our local schools are lacking the up-to-date technology students need to succeed. This measure will upgrade classrooms, science labs, and computer labs, as well as improve electrical systems and wiring for computers and internet access, to ensure our students will have equal access to competitive twenty-first century learning.

- Provide clean and safe classrooms.
- Improve access to school facilities for students with disabilities.
- **Upgrade school safety.**
- Provide competitive 21st Century learning facilities.

- Upgrade classrooms for career technical and vocational programs.
- Upgrade science and computer labs.
- Upgrade moldy portable classrooms.
- Upgrade classrooms for science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY

This bond measure has strict accountability requirements including:

1. All money will benefit local schools and CANNOT BE TAKEN BY THE STATE.
2. NO MONEY can be used for ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES or administration
3. Require CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT and yearly reports to the community to keep the District accountable for how the funds are spent.
4. NO ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES. Proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher or administrator salaries, pensions and other operating expenses.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY. THE EXPENDITURE OF BOND MONEY ON THESE PROJECTS IS SUBJECT TO STRINGENT FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS. BY LAW, PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL AUDITS WILL BE PERFORMED ANNUALLY, AND ALL BOND EXPENDITURES WILL BE MONITORED BY AN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO ENSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT AS PROMISED AND SPECIFIED. THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATION OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE ALLOWED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

* * *

The listed projects will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program/project management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including the reduction or retirement of interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from the Project List; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master and needs assessments plans preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects. In addition to the projects listed above, the repair and renovation of each of the existing school facilities may include, but not be limited to, some or all of the following: renovate student and staff restrooms; install signage and fencing; repair and replace heating A/C and ventilation systems; upgrade of facilities for energy efficiencies; upgrade or installation energy

management systems; repair and replace worn-out and deteriorated roofs, windows, walls, doors and drinking fountains; improve school facilities for disability access; improve air quality, install wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices and needs; upgrade or construct classrooms, labs, support facilities and spaces, physical education (including playground equipment, tracks, bleachers, gyms and locker rooms), library media centers, visual and performing arts facilities and classrooms for transitional kindergarten and pre-school programs; repair and replace gas, water and sewer systems and lines, fire alarms, emergency communications and security systems; resurface or replace hard courts, asphalt, turf and irrigation systems; expand or add parking areas and drop-off areas; interior and exterior painting and floor covering; demolition; construct various forms of storage, common areas and support spaces and classrooms; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems; improve or add cafeterias and kitchens and lunch facilities, playgrounds and athletic fields; replace outdated security fences and security and surveillance systems (including access control systems); provide indoor space for assemblies or for rainy day lunch; enhance facilities for earthquake safety; install shade structures and water conservation systems; upgrade career training and tech facilities and equipment. The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, Wi-Fi and other wireless technology systems, firewalls and computer security systems, phone systems, PA, bells, alarms, cameras and other A/V systems, instructional technology such as projections systems digital whiteboards, document cameras and other classroom computer equipment and other miscellaneous equipment and classroom furniture. The allocation of bond proceeds will be affected by the District's receipt of State matching funds and the final costs of each project. The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. Some projects throughout the District may be undertaken as joint use projects in cooperation with other local public or non-profit agencies. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans and construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/ restoration may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to bond projects.

Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the specific purposes identified herein. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

NO ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES: PROCEEDS FROM THE SALE OF THE BONDS AUTHORIZED BY THIS PROPOSITION SHALL BE USED ONLY FOR THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION, RECONSTRUCTION, REHABILITATION, OR REPLACEMENT OF SCHOOL FACILITIES, INCLUDING THE FURNISHING AND EQUIPPING OF SCHOOL FACILITIES, AND NOT FOR ANY OTHER PURPOSE, INCLUDING TEACHER AND SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES AND OTHER OPERATING EXPENSES.

A "yes" vote by at least fifty-five percent (55%) of the voters voting on this measure will authorize the District to issue bonds to benefit the District in the amount of seven hundred fifty million dollars (\$750,000,000). If fewer than fifty-five percent (55%) of the voters voting on this measure vote yes, the Board of Education of the District will not be authorized to issue and sell the \$750,000,000 in bonds set forth in the measure.

The bond proceeds may only be used to upgrade neighborhood schools and retain/attract quality teachers by repairing deteriorating classrooms/restrooms; replace deteriorating, rusty pipes to ensure safe drinking water; remove asbestos and lead paint; upgrade fire safety, science/computer labs, wiring, classroom technology; repair, construct, and acquire educational facilities, sites, equipment.

The proceeds may not be used for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries or pensions and other school operating expenses.

The District will conduct financial and performance audits annually and will appoint a citizens oversight committee to ensure that bond proceeds are spent only on the school facility projects listed in the measure.

The bonded debt will be a general obligation of the District and will be financed by property taxes levied annually on taxable property located within the District in an amount necessary to pay the annual debt obligation.

TAX RATE STATEMENT FOR BOND MEASURE G

An election will be held in Chino Valley Unified School District (the "District") on November 8, 2016 for the purpose of submitting to the electors of the District the question of incurring bonded indebtedness of the District in the principal amount of \$750,000,000. If such bonds are authorized and sold, the principal thereof and interest thereon will be payable from the proceeds of taxes levied on the taxable property in the District. The following information regarding tax rates is given in compliance with Section 9401 of the California Elections Code. This information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District and other demonstrable factors.

Based upon the foregoing and projections of the assessed valuations of taxable property in the District, and assuming the entire debt service on the bonds will be paid through property taxation:

1. The best estimate from official sources of the tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue during the first fiscal year after the first sale of the bonds, based on assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction or other demonstrable factors is \$59.47 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed for the year 2017-18.

2. The best estimate from official sources of the tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue during the first fiscal year after the last sale of the bonds, and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, are \$59.55 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed and the year 2033-34.

3. The best estimate from official sources of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, are \$59.57 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed and the year 2029-30.

4. The best estimate from official sources of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is \$1,677,522,000.

Attention of voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates. The actual timing of sales of the bonds and the amount to be sold at any time will be governed by the needs of the District and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold, which will not exceed the maximum permitted by law, will depend upon the bond market at the time of sale. The actual assessed valuations in future years will depend upon the value of property within the District as determined in the assessment and the equalization process. Therefore, the actual tax rates and the years in which those tax rates will be applicable may vary from those presently estimated and stated above.

Bond Measure G is envisioned to encompass projects as represented in the District's Long Range Facilities Master Plan. Listed projects will be completed as needed at a particular school or District facility site according to Board-established priorities, and the order in which such projects appear on the Project List is not an indication of priority for funding or completion. Each project may include construction-related costs, such as project and construction management, design, planning, approvals, administration and construction, architectural, engineering, soils testing, inspection and similar planning and testing costs, demolition, storage and interim housing costs, costs related to the independent annual financial and performance audits, a contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs and other costs incidental to and necessary for completion of the listed projects.

Additional Construction, Upgrade/Repair of Existing Buildings, Site Upgrades/Furnishings

- Remove or abate asbestos, lead paint, mold and other hazardous materials from older buildings
- Upgrade fire alarm systems, repair and replace fire safety equipment, add sprinklers and fire safety doors, as necessary
- Make exterior and interior improvements to District facilities to conserve power, increase the efficiency of existing lighting, security and alarm features and conserve and/or reclaim water resources
- Repair deteriorating gas, electrical and sewer lines and leaky roofs; replace or upgrade existing water, sewer, plumbing and storm drain systems to conserve or reclaim water and meet current codes, including the elimination of lead-containing fixtures
- Upgrade aging and deteriorating restrooms
- Upgrade emergency communication systems, public address and fire communication systems; install new security systems, such as security (surveillance) cameras, indoor/outdoor lighting, walkways, signage, fencing and classroom door locks
- Modernize, upgrade, renovate, re-configure and/or expand classrooms, classroom buildings, labs, restrooms, common areas and school support facilities, whether permanent, portable or modular, including interior and exterior doors, windows, door and window hardware, roofs, rain gutters and downspouts, walls, ceilings and floors, and finishes, paint, siding, insulation, casework, cabinets, carpets, drapes, window coverings, lighting, sinks, drinking fountains, fixtures, signage, fencing, furniture and equipment
- Construct, renovate, improve, upgrade, repair and equip classrooms, classroom buildings, labs, restrooms, libraries, computer labs, instructional space, facilities and student service areas (including multi-purpose rooms, performing arts/theater, food storage, preparation and service, school offices and administrative offices/staff support facilities, teacher preparation work areas, staff workrooms, cafeterias, kitchen areas, nurse's offices, media centers, indoor and outdoor eating areas), and associated improvements, signage, fencing and fixtures, and furnish and equip such facilities
- Replace existing portable buildings with permanent classrooms, restrooms, staff support space, and administrative areas at existing CVUSD sites
- Construct new, permanent buildings to create space for classrooms, labs, career-tech, performing arts and physical education instructional space, multi-purpose rooms, cafeteria/food service, administrative space, libraries/media centers and restrooms at new and existing CVUSD sites
- Acquire property, design/plan and construct new CVUSD schools
- Upgrade, repair and equip classrooms, athletic and other laboratories. Update and replace classroom furniture, equipment and instructional aids, playground equipment, indoor and outdoor play areas

- Renovate, repair, resurface, upgrade, expand, equip, construct and/or install and improve gymnasiums, fitness labs, locker rooms, hardcourts, athletic and sports fields and tracks; acquire, improve, replace and/or upgrade equipment and fixtures related to such facilities
- Replace, refurbish and/or upgrade flooring, wall surfaces, ceilings, cabinetry, water fountains, doors/hardware, windows, restroom fixtures/surfaces/accessories, roofing, heating, ventilation, air conditioning (HVAC), electrical and plumbing systems
- Construct, renovate, improve sites, upgrade classrooms and building accessways in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and State of California earthquake safety standards
- Reconfigure, renovate, repair, resurface, improve and/or expand roads, sidewalks, parking lots and related areas, bus zones and student pick-up and drop-off zones to improve ingress/egress and safety, and increase capacity to meet site usage
- Replace/upgrade existing signage, bells and clocks
- Upgrade and replace computers, hardware and software systems. Upgrade media and audio/visual equipment. Upgrade and expand: cable infrastructure, network, wireless systems, telecommunications and internet access. Upgrade technology infrastructure (includes, but is not limited to: computers, projectors and projection systems; media control stations; portable interface devices; centralized storage and backup systems; uninterruptable power supplies; racks; servers; switches; routers; modules; sound systems; access control systems; printers; digital white boards; document projectors and cameras; upgraded voice-over IP; communications software systems; collaborative systems; network management software; enterprise-wide software system replacement or upgrade; network security/firewall; wiring and cabling; and other miscellaneous equipment and software
- Upgrade science, engineering and technology classrooms and labs
- Replace, refurbish, expand and/or upgrade parking lots, site lighting, utility piping (water, gas, sewer, storm drain), pavement, fencing, playfields and irrigation systems, play equipment and surfacing, shade and lunch shelters along with ADA and security upgrades on existing CVUSD sites
- Replace, refurbish and/or upgrade instructional and administrative furniture and technology systems and equipment at existing and future CVUSD sites
- Replace existing wiring systems to meet current electrical and accessibility codes
- Provide more updated information and technology systems and equipment, including cable infrastructure, network expansion, wireless access points and other communications and administrative systems

The allocation of bond proceeds may be affected by the District's receipt of State matching funds and the final costs of each project. In the absence of State matching funds, which the District will aggressively pursue to reduce the District's share of the costs of the projects, the District may undertake fewer than all of the projects listed above.

NO ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES. PROCEEDS FROM THE SALE OF THE BONDS AUTHORIZED BY THIS PROPOSITION SHALL BE USED ONLY FOR THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION, RECONSTRUCTION, REHABILITATION, OR REPLACEMENT OF DISTRICT FACILITIES, INCLUDING THE FURNISHING AND EQUIPPING OF FACILITIES, AND NOT FOR ANY OTHER PURPOSE, INCLUDING TEACHER AND ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES OR PENSIONS OR OTHER OPERATING EXPENSES.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY. THE EXPENDITURE OF BOND MONEY ON THESE PROJECTS IS SUBJECT TO STRINGENT FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS. BY LAW, PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL AUDITS WILL BE PERFORMED ANNUALLY, AND ALL BOND EXPENDITURES WILL BE MONITORED BY AN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE (EDUCATION CODE SECTION 15278 ET SEQ.) TO ENSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT AS PROMISED AND SPECIFIED. THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATIVES OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE ALLOWED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

BOND AUTHORIZATION

By approval of Bond Measure G by at least 55 percent of the registered voters voting on the bond measure, the District will be authorized to issue and sell bonds of up to \$750,000,000 in aggregate principal amount at interest rates not in excess of the legal limit and to provide financing for the specific school facilities projects listed in the Project List described above, subject to the accountability requirements specified below. The Bonds may be issued under the provisions of the California Education Code (starting at Section 15100), under the provisions of the California Government Code (starting at Section 53506), or under any other provision of law authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds by school districts. The Bonds may be issued in series by the District from time to time, and each series of Bonds shall mature within the legal limitations set forth in the applicable law under which the Bonds are issued.

FUNDS PROTECTED FOR LOCAL USE

Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by Bond Measure G will be used solely on local projects and will not be subject to appropriation by agencies outside of the District.

ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS

The provisions in this section are specifically included in Bond Measure G in order that the voters and taxpayers in the District may be assured that their money will be spent wisely. Expenditures to address specific facilities needs of the District will be in compliance with the requirements of Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3), of the State Constitution and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Education Code Sections 15264 and following). The proceeds from the sale of the bonds will be deposited into a Building Fund to be held by the San Bernardino County Treasurer, as required by the California Education Code, and will be used only for the purposes specified in Bond Measure G and not for any other purpose.

Evaluation of Needs: The Board has identified detailed facilities needs of the District and has determined which projects to finance from a local bond at this time. The Board hereby certifies that it has evaluated enrollment growth, student safety, class size accommodation, repairs/upgrades to older schools, and information technology needs in developing the Project List shown above.

Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee: The Board shall establish an Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee under Education Code Section 15278 to ensure bond proceeds are expended only on the school facilities projects listed above. The committee will be established within 60 days of the date when the results of the election appear in the minutes of the Board.

Performance Audits: The Board shall conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the school facilities projects listed below.

Financial Audits: The Board shall conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent for the school facilities projects listed above.

Annual Report: The Superintendent of the District is required to cause an annual report to be filed with the Board, the first report to be filed not later than one year after the issuance of the first series of the Bonds, which report shall contain pertinent information regarding the amount of funds collected and expended, as well as the status of the projects listed in Bond Measure G as required by Sections 53410 and 53411 of the Government Code.

COMPLETION OF PROJECTS

Completion of the bond projects listed above is subject to the availability of adequate funding to the District. Approval of the bond measure does not guarantee that the proposed projects in the District that are the subject of bonds under the bond measure will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by the bond measure. The District's proposal for the projects may assume the receipt of matching State funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a Statewide bond measure. The proceeds from the sale of the District's bonds will be used only for the purposes specified in Bond Measure G, and not for any other purpose.

SCOPE OF PROJECTS

Bond proceeds will be expended to update, repair, replace, renovate, construct, acquire, equip, furnish, rebuild and otherwise improve educational and support facilities within the District. Projects which are described above include all related and incidental costs, including their share of the costs of the election and bond issuance and costs of design, engineering, architectural and other professional services, inspections, site preparation, utilities, landscaping, construction management and other planning, legal, accounting and similar costs, independent annual financial and performance audits, a customary construction contingency, and other costs incidental to and necessary for completion of the listed projects.

Bond proceeds may also be expended to acquire real property (or any interest in real property) for future educational and support facilities and to acquire and install furniture, fixtures and equipment at any classrooms and other educational facilities within the District. The District may alter the scope and nature of any of the specific projects which are described above as required by conditions that arise during the course of design and construction.

Whenever specific items are included in the above list, they are presented to provide examples and are not intended to limit the generality of the broader description of authorized projects. The order in which particular projects are listed is not intended to indicate priority for funding or completion. Projects at each site will be accomplished to address the individual site deficiencies and priorities as enumerated in the District's Master Facilities Plan.

STATEMENT REQUIRED UNDER EDUCATION CODE SECTION 15122.5

Approval of Bond Measure G does not guarantee that the proposed project or projects in the Chino Valley Unified School District that are the subject of bonds under Bond Measure G will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by Bond Measure G. The school district's proposal for the project or projects may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF BOND MEASURE H

This Impartial Analysis of Bond Measure H has been prepared by County Counsel pursuant to Section 9500 of the California Elections Code.

Bond Measure H is submitted to the voters by the Alta Loma School District ("District"). A "yes" vote by at least fifty-five percent (55%) of the voters voting on this measure will authorize the District to issue bonds to benefit the District in the amount of fifty eight million dollars (\$58,000,000). If fewer than fifty-five (55%) of the voters voting on this measure vote yes, the Board of Trustees of the District will not be authorized to issue and sell the \$58,000,000 in bonds set forth in the measure.

The bond proceeds may only be used to fund the replacement or repair of deteriorating roofs, plumbing, electrical and air conditioning systems; improvements allowing better access for students and families with disabilities; improvements to school safety and security systems; updating and modernization of classrooms to keep pace with educational technology and support student programs in science, technology, English, arts, and math.

The proceeds may not be used for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries or pensions and other school operating expenses.

The District will conduct financial and performance audits annually and will appoint a citizens oversight committee to ensure that bond proceeds are spent only on the school facility projects listed in the measure.

The bonded debt will be a general obligation of the District and will be financed by property taxes levied annually on taxable property located within the District in an amount necessary to pay the annual debt obligation.

TAX RATE STATEMENT FOR BOND MEASURE H

An election will be held within the boundaries of Alta Loma School District ("School District") on November 8, 2016 to authorize the sale of up to \$58,000,000 in bonds to finance facilities as described in the proposition. If the bonds are approved, the School District expects to sell the bonds in multiple series. Principal and interest on the bonds will be payable from the proceeds of tax levies made upon the taxable property located within the School District. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400-9404 of the California Elections Code.

1. The best estimate of the tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue during the first fiscal year after the sale of the first series of bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$0.030 per \$100 (\$30.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed for the year 2017-18.
2. The best estimate of the tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue during the first fiscal year after the sale of the last series of bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$0.030 per \$100 (\$30.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed for the year 2025-26.
3. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, or on a projection based on experience within the District or other demonstrable factors, is \$0.030 per \$100 (\$30.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed, which is projected to be the same in every fiscal year that the bonds remain outstanding.
4. The best estimate of total debt service, including principal and interest, which would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is \$110,000,000. This estimate is based on the assumption there will be no bonds issued with a term over 30 years.

Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the School District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

By approval of this proposition by at least fifty-five percent (55%) of the registered voters voting thereon, the Alta Loma School District shall be authorized to issue and sell bonds of up to \$58 million in aggregate principal amount to provide financing for the specific school facilities projects listed below in the Bond Project List, subject to all of the accountability safeguards specified herein.

KEY FINDINGS

The Alta Loma School District is committed to continuing a strong, high-quality educational program for the students in all of its local public schools.

Specifically, the Board of Trustees desires, among other projects, to:

ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES

The provisions in this section are included in this proposition in order that the voters and taxpayers of the District may be assured that their money will be spent to address specific facilities needs of the District, all in compliance with the requirements of Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3) of the State Constitution, and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Section 15264 *et seq.* of the California Education Code).

Evaluation of Needs. The Board of Trustees has evaluated the facilities needs of the District, and has identified projects to finance from a local bond measure at this time. The Board of Trustees hereby certifies that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction and information technology needs in developing the Bond Project List.

Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee. The Board of Trustees shall establish an independent Citizens' Oversight Committee in accordance with Education Code Sections 15278-15282 and applicable Board policy, to ensure bond proceeds are expended only for the school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List. The committee shall be established within sixty (60) days of the date when the Board of Trustees enters the results of the election in its official minutes.

Annual Performance Audit. The Board of Trustees shall conduct or cause to be conducted an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the school facilities projects described in the Bond Project List.

Annual Financial Audit. The Board of Trustees shall conduct or cause to be conducted an annual, independent financial audit of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent for the school facilities projects described in the Bond Project List.

Annual Report to Board. Upon approval of this measure and the sale of any bonds approved, the Board of Trustees shall take actions necessary to establish an account in which proceeds of the sale of bonds will be deposited. As long as any proceeds of the bonds remain unexpended, the Superintendent shall cause a report to be filed with the Board of Trustees no later than January 1 of each year, commencing on the first January 1 after bonds have been issued and proceeds spent, stating (1) the amount of bond proceeds received and expended in the past fiscal year, and (2) the status of any project funded or to be funded from bond proceeds. The report may be incorporated into the annual budget, annual financial report, or other appropriate routine report to the Board.

BOND PROJECT LIST

This Bond Project List, which is an integral part of this proposition, describes the specific projects the District proposes to finance with proceeds of the bonds.

Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this measure shall be used only for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities on the Bond Project List, including the furnishing and equipping of said school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for said school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

In order to meet all identified facilities needs, the District intends to complete projects using a combination of funding sources. These sources may include joint-use funds, development impact fees, state funds (if available), and other available funds. The District will pursue state matching funds if and when they become available, and if received, they will be used for and mainly applied to projects on the Bond Project List or other high priority capital outlay expenditures as permitted in Education Code Section 17070.63(c). No project is dependent on the receipt of state funding for completion.

Specific projects to be funded by the bond measure include, without limitation, the following:

I. SCHOOL UPGRADES AND REPAIRS TO KEEP EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES SAFE, CLEAN AND IN GOOD CONDITION

- Replace portable classrooms and childcare buildings with permanent wings and buildings;
- Improve access and education facilities for students with disabilities and special medical needs;
- Update playground equipment and surfacing;
- Refurbish playfields with smart irrigation clocks;
- Replace old, outdated, and inefficient electrical, plumbing, heating, lighting and ventilation systems;
- Install security systems on school campuses;
- Install and improve site fencing to ensure safe access and security and improve curb appeal in the community;
- Improve student safety and traffic circulation by upgrading or providing additional school drop-off areas and parking lots;
- Repurpose and/or convert computer labs into flexible learning spaces for varied uses;
- Modernize schools with new or improved roofing, HVAC, and LED lighting systems.

II. EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY AND FACILITY UPGRADES FOR 21ST CENTURY LEARNING

- Renovate and reconstruct aging classrooms;
- Construct and equip multipurpose rooms, libraries and fitness rooms where needed;
- Renovate school and office interiors, and create distinct pre-kindergarten and transitional kindergarten spaces and classrooms;
- Equip classrooms with new 21st Century flexible furniture;
- Install systems for improved data connectivity in the classroom;
- Establish a new District-wide phone system;
- Update energy management systems.

Listed projects, repairs, improvements, rehabilitation projects and upgrades will be completed only as feasible, and the listing of projects does not imply a particular prioritization among such improvements. Listed projects may be completed at any and all District schools, sites and education buildings where such project is determined necessary, and not all projects will be completed at every site. Decisions regarding the scope, timing, prioritization or other facets of project implementation will be made solely

by the Board of Trustees by subsequent action. Where terms such as "renovate," "update," and "improve" are used in the Bond Project List, the Board of Trustees shall determine the best method for accomplishing the project's objective. For any listed project involving renovation or modernization of a building or the major portion of a building, the District may proceed with new replacement construction instead (including any necessary demolition), if the District determines that replacement and new construction is more practical than renovation, considering the building's age, condition, expected remaining life, comparative cost, and other relevant factors. In addition, where feasible, projects may be completed in partnership with other agencies on a joint-use basis using bond proceeds.

Each project is assumed to include its share of costs of bond issuance, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, construction management, bond project staff and consultants, staff development and training expenses associated with learning construction techniques and approaches, new bond-funded equipment and systems, and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. In addition to the projects listed above, the Bond Project List also includes payment of the costs of preparation of all facilities planning and project implementation studies, feasibility and assessment reviews, master planning, environmental studies, permit and inspection fees, and temporary housing and relocation costs for dislocated programs or activities caused or necessitated by construction projects.

ADDITIONAL SPECIFICATIONS

No Administrator Salaries. Proceeds from the sale of Bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities on the Bond Project List, including the furnishing and equipping of said school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for said school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

Single Purpose. All of the purposes enumerated in this proposition shall be united and voted upon as one single proposition, pursuant to Section 15100 of the California Education Code, and all the enumerated purposes shall constitute the specific single purpose of the bonds and proceeds of the bonds shall be spent only for such purpose.

Other Terms of the Bonds. The bonds may be issued and sold in several series, and in accordance with a financing plan determined by the Board of Trustees pursuant to requirements of law. When sold, the bonds shall bear interest at an annual rate not exceeding the statutory maximum and with a maximum term not exceeding the statutory maximum, provided that the average useful life of bonds sold will not exceed one hundred twenty percent (120%) of the average life of the projects being financed or as otherwise provided by federal tax law. Bond funds may be used to reimburse the District for Bond Project list expenditures incurred prior to the election and bond issuance, in accordance with federal tax law.

PROJECT LIST FOR THE BOND MEASURE

The Board of Trustees of the Etiwanda School District is committed to safe, clean schools with upgraded classrooms, libraries, science technology engineering and mathematics (STEM) labs and up-to-date technology systems to keep pace with 21st century learning standards. To that end, the Board evaluated the District's urgent and critical facility needs, including safety issues, class size, computer and information technology, enrollment trends and needs analysis in developing the scope of projects to be funded. The District conducted a facilities evaluation and received extensive public input in developing the plan through school site meetings, community presentations, opinion leader input, and interactive materials. Teachers, staff, parents, community members and the Board have prioritized the key health and safety needs so that the most critical facility needs are addressed. Improvements and Equipment to Support 21st Century Learning And Classroom Instructional Technology Academic Programs

Goal and Purpose: To ensure all students have equal access to up-to-date classrooms and library programs, and to upgrade classroom computers and computer technology to allow our teachers and students to use up-to-date teaching methods and enhance instruction in core academic subjects like math, science and technology, make improvements, including, but not limited to, the following types of improvements:

- Improve and update classroom instructional technology needed for improved student learning.
- Upgrade and/or install up-to-date technology, data and communication equipment.
- Update, expand and install science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) lab facilities and technology equipment.
- Upgrade and expand school library facilities and equipment.
- Rehabilitate and replace such equipment, fixtures and infrastructure as needed in the future; technology equipment, fixtures and infrastructure includes existing technology equipment, fixtures and infrastructure as well as technology equipment, fixtures and infrastructure developed in the future.
- Renovate, replace, upgrade, acquire, install and integrate electrical (including wiring and related infrastructure for modern technology) and data systems, equipment, power sources and supplies and related technology infrastructure.
- Acquire, install and upgrade technology equipment, fixtures and infrastructure, including interactive educational technology and projection systems, computers, tablets, laptops, printers, scanners, digital projectors and cameras, audio systems, video systems, phone and sound projections systems, peripherals, smart boards, education software, telecommunications software, security software, monitors, network equipment (including servers, network interface devices, network switches and routers, wireless network equipment, firewalls, network security equipment, racking, power and cooling equipment, wiring and uninterruptible power supplies), as needed for classroom instructional technology systems.

Other School Facility and District-Wide Projects

- Planning, designing and providing temporary housing necessary for listed bond projects.
- The inspection, sampling and analysis of grounds, buildings and building materials to determine the presence of hazardous materials or substances, including asbestos, lead, etc., and the encapsulation, removal, disposal and other remediation or control of such hazardous materials and substances.
- The inspection and analysis of grounds, buildings and structures to assess health and safety risks to students, faculty, staff, parents and the public and compliance with local, state and federal building, health, safety, access and other related requirements, including seismic safety requirements, Field Act requirements and access requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and the improvement, correction, repair or renovation of such grounds, buildings and structures or portions thereof identified as such health and safety risks or acquire, install and/or construct other improvements to comply with such laws and requirements.
- Acquisition and improvement of real property and the construction of new school facilities needed to accommodate future increases in student enrollment and/or from reductions in the number students per classroom.
- Acquisition of all or a portion of any school site or facility, or an interest therein, or make lease payments with respect to any school site or facility, encumbered in order to finance or refinance the listed bond projects pursuant to a lease, certificate of participation or lease revenue bond financing.
- Address other unforeseen conditions revealed by construction, renovation or modernization (including plumbing or gas line breaks, dry rot, seismic and structural deficiencies, etc.).
- Furnishing and equipping of school facilities; furnishing and equipping shall include initial purchases, and scheduled and necessary replacements, upgrades and updating of technology.
- All other costs and work necessary and incidental to the listed bond projects.

The listed projects set forth above will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency, and escalation for unforeseen design and construction costs. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility assessment reviews, environmental studies, construction documentation, inspection and permit fees, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by bond projects. The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, computers, projectors, portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, smart boards, sound projection systems, printers, digital white boards, document projectors, upgrade voice-over-IP, phone systems, call manager and network security/firewall, and other miscellaneous equipment and software. The access to up-to-date classrooms includes but is not limited to the acquisition of school sites and the construction of new schools or additions to existing schools. The repair of school facilities includes the upgrading/replacing of school site parking, campus accessibility, utilities, and grounds, playground equipment, hard court surfaces, shade structures for student assembly to protect students from inclement weather during lunch, libraries, District support facilities; enhanced signage; fire sensors; damaged and unsafe gym bleachers; music, performing arts rooms; electrical wiring; athletic and play fields turf which may be upgraded for safety and operational efficiency; solar power and water recycling systems; constructing new facilities and classrooms; renovating and paint interior and exterior building surfaces to extend their useful life; physical education facilities improvements; security, safety and communication systems and equipment; window and floor coverings (including tiles and carpeting); kitchen equipment; upgrade irrigation systems; improvements and furnishings and/or other electronic equipment and systems.

The allocation of bond proceeds may be affected by the District's receipt of State matching funds and the final costs of each project. In the absence of State matching funds, the District will make an effort to reduce the District's share of the costs of the projects, however, the District may not be able to complete some of the projects listed above.

The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized, construction bids are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/restoration and landscaping, may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, redirecting fire access, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property.

Bond proceeds shall be expended only for the specific purposes identified herein. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to the bond projects. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY: IN ACCORDANCE WITH EDUCATION CODE SECTION 15272, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES WILL APPOINT A CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE AND CONDUCT ANNUAL INDEPENDENT AUDITS TO ASSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT ONLY ON DISTRICT PROJECTS AND FOR NO OTHER PURPOSE. THE EXPENDITURE OF BOND MONEY ON THESE PROJECTS IS SUBJECT TO STRINGENT FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS. BY LAW, PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL AUDITS WILL BE PERFORMED ANNUALLY, AND ALL BOND EXPENDITURES WILL BE MONITORED BY AN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO ENSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT AS PROMISED AND SPECIFIED. THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATION OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE ALLOWED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

No Administrator Salaries: Proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and school administrator salaries and other operating expenses.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF BOND MEASURE J

This Impartial Analysis of Bond Measure J has been prepared by County Counsel for Kern County pursuant to Section 9500 of the California Elections Code.

The Board of Trustees of the Kern Community College District ("District") placed Bond Measure J on the ballot. A "Yes" vote by at least fifty-five percent (55%) of the voters voting on this measure in Kern County, San Bernardino County, and Tulare County will authorize the District to issue bonds to benefit the Kern Community College District Facilities Improvement District No. 1 ("Improvement District"), which is made up of all District territory located in Kern, San Bernardino, and Tulare Counties. The aggregate principal amount of the bonds will be five hundred two million, eight hundred twenty-one thousand dollars (\$502,821,000).

The bond proceeds may only be used to fund the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities. The measure lists the specific projects for which the proceeds will be used. The proceeds may not be used for any other purposes, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

The Board of Trustees will conduct financial and performance audits annually and will appoint a citizens' oversight committee to ensure that bond proceeds are spent only on the school facilities projects listed in the measure.

The bonded debt will be a general obligation of the District and will be financed by property taxes levied annually on taxable property located within the improvement District in an amount necessary to pay the annual debt obligation. The District's Tax Rate Statement provides an estimate of the tax rates that will be required to fund the bonds issued.

An election will be held in Kern Community College District (the "District") on November 8, 2016 to authorize the sale of \$502,821,000 in general obligation bonds. The following information is submitted in compliance with Sections 9400-9404 of the California Elections Code.

1. The best estimate of the tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue during the first fiscal year after the sale of the first series of bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$0.02438 per \$100 (\$24.38 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2017-18.
2. The best estimate of the tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue during the first fiscal year after the sale of the last series of bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$0.02438 per \$100 (\$24.38 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2033-34.
3. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, is \$0.02438 per \$100 (\$24.38 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation.
4. The best estimate of the average tax rate required to fund this bond issue, based on a projection of assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$0.02438 per \$100 (\$24.38 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation.
5. The best estimate of the total debt service, including principal and interest that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is \$536,807,464.

These estimates are based on projections derived from information obtained from official sources. The actual tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary depending on the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold at each sale and actual increases in assessed valuations. The timing of the bond sales and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the needs of the District. Actual assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

The Board of Trustees of the Kern Community College District, to be responsive to the needs of its community, evaluated each of Bakersfield College's, Cerro Coso Community College's and Porterville College's urgent and critical facility needs, and its capacity to provide students, active military, and **Veterans** with support and **job training** facilities, an **affordable education** and prepare them for success in **college** and **good-paying** jobs. **Job training** facilities, safety issues, class size and offerings, and information and computer technology were each considered in developing the scope of projects to be funded, as such are outlined in the District's Facilities Master Plans for each of the Colleges and for the District, incorporated herein by reference in their entirety (the "Master Plan"), and available for review on the District's website (www.kccd.edu). In addition to the listed projects stated above, authorized projects also include the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, fiscal reporting, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, and temporary housing of dislocated college activities caused by construction projects. In addition to the projects listed above, repair, renovation and construction projects include the following: renovation of student and staff restrooms; replace aging electrical and plumbing systems; repair and replacement of heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems; acquire vehicles; upgrade of facilities for energy efficiencies, including photovoltaic/solar installations and energy management systems; repair and replacement of worn-out and leaky roofs, windows, walls, doors and drinking fountains; replace or remove outdated buildings and classrooms and construction of new classrooms and support buildings; installation of wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices and needs; upgrade facilities to meet current environmental sustainability and State compliance standards; repair and replacement of fire alarms, emergency communications and security systems; upgrading, resurfacing, replacing or relocating of hard courts, fields, turf and irrigation systems; install artificial turf on athletic fields; upgrade classrooms; build or upgrade facilities and classrooms, including for math, physical sciences, fine arts, theatre arts, student services and agriculture and environmental science programs, planetarium; construct, expand or reconfigure facilities to create large lecture classrooms; upgrade, resurfacing and reconditioning existing parking lots or build parking structures; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems; replace water lines and valves, sewer lines and other plumbing systems; construct, upgrade, acquire or expand multi-use classrooms and labs, culinary and health services buildings, fine arts and visual and performing arts facilities, learning resources center, physical education/aquatic facilities, locker rooms, field lights, bleachers, press box, track replacement, administrative offices, conference center, maintenance and operations building, student service/campus center and instructional buildings, trades

and technology buildings, library, athletic fields, student services buildings; improve water conservation and energy efficiency; replace or upgrade outdated security and safety systems; replace existing window systems with energy-efficient systems to reduce costs; improve insulation, weatherproofing and roofs to reduce costs; improve access for the disabled; install and repair fire safety equipment, including alarms, smoke detectors, sprinklers, emergency lighting, and fire safety doors; replace broken concrete walks, deteriorated asphalt; replace/upgrade existing signage, bells and clocks; demolition of unsafe facilities; install new security systems, such as security (surveillance) cameras, burglar alarms, handrails, outdoor lighting, fencing, gates and classroom door locks and door hardware; replace sewer lines and improve drainage systems to prevent flooding; upgrade roadway and pedestrian paths for improved safety and access for emergency vehicles, site parking, utilities and grounds. The project list also includes the refinancing of outstanding lease obligations. The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, upgrading classroom technology, the funding of state-of-the-art projectors, computers, portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, information systems, printers, digital white boards, upgrade voice-over-IP, communication systems, audio/visual and telecommunications systems, WAN, LAN and SAN updates, call manager and network security/firewall, Internet connectivity, wireless systems, technology infrastructure, and other miscellaneous IT and instructional equipment, DATA storage, fiber/copper infrastructure, phones, identity access cards and management information systems. At Bakersfield College, the Project List also includes the construction, expansion or improvement of a student access center (student union), an agriculture center, science and engineering building, woman's field house, Veteran Resource Center, fire technology and public safety center and outreach facilities at Arvin/Lamont/Greenfield and Shafter. At Cerro Coso Community College, the Project List also includes the construction, expansion or improvement of the main building, KRV remodel, IT building, athletic facility upgrades, ADA compliance, new classrooms, field house and Southern outreach facility in California City. At Porterville College, the Project List also includes the construction, expansion or improvement of an allied health facility, a career technology building, fine arts building, student and Veteran Center, student services building modernization, campus center, human performance and kinesiology center and updating maintenance and operation facilities.

The allocation of bond proceeds shall be as follows: (a)(1) all funds in a county that has a facility determined to need improvement by the Board shall be entitled to 100% of the funds of that county up to the amount of the needed improvements as determined by the Board; (2) all funds collected in a county that has two or more facilities determined to need improvement by the Board shall be entitled to 100% of the funds of that county up to the amount of the needed improvements as determined by the Board; and (b) all funds collected in any county which has no facility, and/or any funds remaining from the distribution formula in subsection (a) above, shall be distributed by the Board to any facility determined by the Board to need funding. Some projects may be undertaken as joint use projects in cooperation with other local public or non-profit agencies. The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans and construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site

preparation/restoration may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to bond projects.

Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the specific purposes identified herein. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

Bond Measure K is submitted to the voters by the Ontario-Montclair School District ("District") to authorize the District, in order to maintain student health/safety and retain/attract quality teachers, to repair aging classrooms remove asbestos and lead paint, repair restrooms and leaky, deteriorating roofs; upgrade disabled access, school security, and fire safety; increase water conservation and energy efficiency, improve technology, and computer and science labs; repair, construct, acquire and retrofit school facilities, sites, and equipment.

A "yes" vote by at least fifty-five percent (55%) of the voters voting on this measure will authorize the Board of Trustees of the District to issue and sell bonds to benefit the District in the amount of one hundred fifty million dollars (\$150,000,000). If fewer than fifty-five percent (55%) of the voters voting on this measure vote "yes", the Board of Trustees of the District will not be authorized to issue and sell the \$150,000,000 in bonds set forth in the measure.

The bond proceeds may not be used for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries or pensions and other school operating expenses.

The District will conduct financial and performance audits annually and will appoint a citizens oversight committee to ensure that bond proceeds are spent only on the school facility projects listed in the measure.

The bonded debt will be a general obligation of the District and will be financed by property taxes levied annually on taxable property located within the District in an amount necessary to pay the annual debt obligation.

TAX RATE STATEMENT FOR BOND MEASURE K

TAX RATE STATEMENT REGARDING PROPOSED \$150,000,000 ONTARIO-MONTCLAIR SCHOOL DISTRICT GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS

An election will be held in Ontario-Montclair School District (the "District") on November 8, 2016 for the purpose of submitting to the electors of the District the question of issuing bonds of the District in the principal amount of \$150 million. If such bonds are authorized and sold, the principal thereof and interest thereon will be payable from the proceeds of taxes levied on the taxable property in the District. The following information regarding tax rates is given to comply with Section 9401 of the California Elections Code. This information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District and other demonstrable factors.

Based upon the foregoing and projections of the assessed valuations of taxable property in the District, and assuming the entire debt service on the bonds will be paid through property taxation:

1. The best estimate from official sources of the tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue during the first fiscal year after the first sale of the bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or on a projection based on experience within the District or other demonstrable factors, is \$0.030 per \$100 (\$30.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed for the year 2017-18.

2. The best estimate from official sources of the tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue during the first fiscal year after the last sale of the bonds and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or on a projection based on experience within the District or other demonstrable factors, is \$0.030 per \$100 (\$30.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed and the year 2025-26.

3. The best estimate from official sources of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund the bond issue and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of the filing of this statement, or on a projection based on experience within the District or other demonstrable factors, is \$0.030 per \$100 (\$30.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation of all property to be taxed, which is projected to be the same in every fiscal year that the bonds remain outstanding.

4. The best estimate from official sources of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is \$300 million.

Attention of voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates. The actual timing of sales of the bonds and the amount to be sold at any time will be governed by the needs of the District and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold, which will not exceed the maximum permitted by law, will depend upon the bond market at the time of sale. The actual assessed valuations in future years will depend upon the value of property within

the District as determined in the assessment and the equalization process. Therefore, the actual tax rates and the years in which those tax rates will be applicable may vary from those presently estimated and stated above.

"ONTARIO-MONTCLAIR SCHOOL DISTRICT REPAIR, STUDENT SAFETY, CLASSROOM TECHNOLOGY MEASURE. To repair aging classrooms in order to maintain student health/safety and retain/attract quality teachers, remove asbestos/lead paint, repair restrooms/leaky, deteriorating roofs, upgrade disabled access, school security/fire safety, increase water conservation/energy efficiency, improve technology/computer/science labs, repair, construct, acquire/retrofit school facilities, sites/equipment, shall Ontario-Montclair School District issue \$150,000,000 in bonds, at legal rates, requiring independent audits, citizens' oversight, keeping all funds local?"

PROJECT LIST

The Board of Trustees ("Board") of the Ontario-Montclair School District is committed to repairing its old schools and attracting and retaining quality teachers by fixing deteriorating classrooms, leaky, deteriorating roofs, and ensuring the safety and security of all students. To that end, the Board received input from teachers, staff and the community and evaluated the District's urgent and critical facility needs, including the need for up-to-date technology, safety issues, class size reduction, computer and information technology, and prepared a Facilities Master Plan presented to the Board on May 5, 2016, which the Plan is incorporated herein in its entirety, in developing the scope of projects to be funded. Therefore, in approving this Project List, the Board of Trustees determines that the District must:

- (i) Attract and retain quality teachers; and
- (ii) Provide clean and safe classrooms, and a quality learning environment for current and future students; and
- (iii) Remove hazardous materials like asbestos from older school sites; and
- (iv) Update accessibility for disabled persons; and
- (v) Adhere to specific fiscal accountability safeguards such as:
 - (a) Ensure all funds are only used locally,
 - (b) Prohibit the State from taking any of the funds raised,
 - (c) Require that expenditures must be subject to annual independent financial audits, and
 - (d) Require independent citizens' oversight of bond funds

The Project List includes the following types of upgrades and improvements at District schools and sites:

**REPAIR OLD SCHOOLS; WATER EFFICIENCY:
Renovation, Repair, Recycling, and Upgrade Projects**

Goal and Purposes: Many local schools were built decades ago and need significant repairs – including schools that are over 75 years old. This measure will fix deteriorating classrooms, bathrooms, and leaky, deteriorating roofs, remove asbestos and lead paints, and replace outdated air conditioning so children can learn in safe, healthy classrooms.

California's drought has made conserving water and saving money on utilities more important than ever. We need to make improvements that will help our schools use water more efficiently, including installing water recycling systems and upgrading water pipes and drinking fountains, which can significantly reduce costs in the long run and protect our water supply.

- Remove asbestos
- Replace aging water pipes, and drinking fountains
- Repair aging classrooms, bathrooms and leaky, deteriorating roofs
- Improve accessibility for disabled persons

By funding the installation of special door locks for emergency school lockdowns, and up-to-date security cameras so police can arrest people who vandalize schools, we can make our schools safer.

- Upgrade electrical systems and wiring for computer technology and internet access.
- Upgrade elementary and middle school computer and science labs.

The listed projects will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency, and escalation for unforeseen design and construction costs. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility assessment reviews and master plans, environmental studies, construction documentation, inspection and permit fees, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by bond projects. The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, servers, switches, routers, modules, computers, district-wide computer labs upgrades, smart boards, cameras, sound projection systems, wiring every classroom for internet connectivity, wireless networks, wireless access points and controllers, portable interface devices, mobile device management systems, printers, upgraded voice-over-IP, phone systems, call manager and network security/firewall, and other miscellaneous equipment. The repair and improvement of school facilities includes the following types of projects: install or acquire energy efficiency improvements for school buildings, including solar projects; install energy efficient lighting, air conditioning, heating, insulation and ceiling systems, and windows; construct, upgrade, repair or install school site parking, campus accessibility, utilities, plumbing, gas lines, playground equipment, hard court surfaces, general site paving, learning walls, tack boards, cabinets, tutoring rooms, restrooms, interior and exterior lighting, water heaters, boilers, walkway covers and casework, signage, electronic marquees, asphalt, fire sensors, shade structures, outdated heating and air conditioning systems, physical education facilities, gyms, lockers, bleachers, multipurpose rooms used for after-school programs, assemblies, sports, performing arts and serving meals, playgrounds, play fields, including turf and artificial turf; provide on-campus health care clinics and after-school tutoring space; improve food service facilities; enlarge, upgrade or build media/library centers, kitchens and lunch shelters, site classrooms and administration buildings, staff lounges; construct or upgrade child care facilities; upgrades and reconfigure parking lots and drop off/pick up zones to improve student safety; upgrade electrical wiring and systems; renovate and paint interior and exterior building surfaces to extend their useful life; improve security, install safety, security and communication systems and equipment, windows and floor coverings (including tiles and carpeting); build or upgrade irrigation systems; make improvements and acquire furnishings and/or other electronic equipment and systems. The allocation of bond proceeds may be affected by the District's receipt of State matching funds and the final costs of each project. In the absence of State matching

funds, which the District will aggressively pursue to reduce the District's share of the costs of the projects, the District may not be able to complete some of the projects listed above. The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. Some projects throughout the District may be undertaken as joint use projects in cooperation with other local public or non-profit agencies. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized, construction bids are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/restoration and landscaping, may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, redirecting fire access, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property.

Bond proceeds shall be expended only for the specific purposes identified herein. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to the bond projects. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY: IN ACCORDANCE WITH EDUCATION CODE SECTION 15272, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES WILL APPOINT A CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE AND CONDUCT ANNUAL INDEPENDENT AUDITS TO ASSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT ONLY ON DISTRICT PROJECTS AND FOR NO OTHER PURPOSE. THE EXPENDITURE OF BOND MONEY ON THESE PROJECTS IS SUBJECT TO STRINGENT FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS. BY LAW, PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL AUDITS WILL BE PERFORMED ANNUALLY, AND ALL BOND EXPENDITURES WILL BE MONITORED BY AN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO ENSURE THAT FUNDS ARE SPENT AS PROMISED AND SPECIFIED. THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE, AMONG OTHERS, REPRESENTATION OF A BONA FIDE TAXPAYERS ASSOCIATION, A BUSINESS ORGANIZATION AND A SENIOR CITIZENS ORGANIZATION. NO DISTRICT EMPLOYEES OR VENDORS ARE ALLOWED TO SERVE ON THE CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

No Administrator Salaries: Proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and school administrator salaries and other operating expenses. Bond funds shall not be temporarily transferred to the District's general fund for administrative purposes.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE L

This Impartial Analysis of Measure L has been prepared by Special Counsel pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

The measure placed on the ballot by the Council would replace the existing charter, significantly reducing its length and complexity. No change is proposed in the City's boundaries, name, powers, personnel system, property or obligations. All ordinances, resolutions, and policies consistent with the new charter will remain in effect. Existing litigation would be unaffected.

The City would have a council-manager form of government, with the City Manager running the City's day-to-day operations, supervising all City employees. There would be a full-time directly elected Mayor and seven member Council, elected by ward. The Mayor's duties would be reduced. The Mayor would preside at Council Meetings, but vote only to break a tie, veto a matter or appoint and set compensation of the City Manager, City Attorney, City Clerk and for Commission and Committee appointments. The Mayor appoints members of Council Committees, is chief spokesperson and ceremonial head of government, represents the City in intergovernmental relations, and executes ordinances and contracts.

The Council will continue as the City's primary policy-making body, and with the Mayor ensure municipal functions are carried out for public health and safety, and the City's fiscal integrity. Most Council actions require a simple majority, but only five votes can override the Mayor's veto. The Mayor's and Council's compensation will be set by ordinance, after a public hearing and input from an advisory commission. Any ordinance takes effect at commencement of council terms following the next regular election. The Mayor and Council must follow state and local conflict of interest codes. None may be a City employee.

The proposed charter would change the City Attorney and City Clerk from elective to appointive officials hired and their compensation set by the City Council.

Existing City departments would continue; the City Manager can establish new departments with Council approval. The charter requires a municipal police department. Council must also provide for community development, finance, fire, emergency medical services, information technology, library, parks, recreation, personnel, public works, water and wastewater.

Existing Commissions and Committees would continue in effect, including the Library Board of Trustees, Personnel Board (who serve without compensation), and the Water Board (compensation set after public hearing).

The charter requires an annual budget and capital improvement plan be adopted after public hearing and an annual independent audit.

City elections would move to November of even-numbered years, consolidated with the statewide general election. Existing terms would be extended one year to facilitate transition. Council members would continue to be elected by ward, for staggered terms of four years. Boundary adjustments would comply with state and federal law. The citizens' powers of initiative, referendum and recall would be as provided in state law.

The Council will provide for periodic Charter review to identify potential amendments enhancing clarity, efficiency, and principles of council-manager form of government. Charter amendments shall be made pursuant to state law.

CHARTER SUMMARY OF MEASURE L

August 10, 2016

Summary and Ballot Description of the Proposed Amendments to the Charter of the City of San Bernardino Pursuant to California Government Code section 34458.5

In 1905, the citizens of San Bernardino voted to become a charter city giving the City greater control over municipal affairs. The charter has been amended several times since then by a vote of the people. The City of San Bernardino proposes amending the City's charter to significantly reduce its length and complexity.

California Government Code Section 34458.5 mandates any charter amendment include a ballot description enumerating the new authorities established by the charter including, but not limited to, whether the city council will have the power to raise its own compensation and the compensation of other city officials authorized without voter approval. The full text of the proposed charter, as amended, is attached hereto, however, it is summarized below as follows:

Article I: Name, Boundaries, Powers, Rights & Succession, Intergovernmental Relations. No change is proposed in the City's boundaries, name, powers, property or obligations. All ordinances, codes, resolutions currently in effect would remain in effect. Additionally, Article I authorizes the City to contract with other governmental entities to provide services to the City.

Article II: Council Manager Form of Government.

The City would have a council-manager form of government meaning that the City Manager runs the City's day-to-day operations while the Mayor and City Council are responsible for setting policies of the City.

Article III: City Council & Mayor.

Article III provides for a full-time directly elected Mayor and seven councilmembers elected by ward. In comparison to the existing charter, the Mayor's duties would be reduced. Article III provides the powers and duties of the City Council and Mayor. For example, the City Council and the Mayor are required to develop a code of conduct and maintain the City's fiscal integrity.

The position of Mayor would continue to be a full-time position with duties that include serving as the head of the City for all ceremonial purposes, representing the City in intergovernmental relations and executing all ordinances, resolutions and contracts approved by the City Council.

The Mayor would preside at council meetings, but vote only to break a tie, veto a matter or appoint and set compensation of the City Manager, City Attorney, City Clerk and for Commission and Committee appointments. Most Council actions require a simple majority, but only five votes can override the Mayor's veto.

Article III does not require voter approval for any changes in compensation of the Mayor and City Council. It does require Mayor and City Council compensation to be set by ordinance following a public hearing and recommendations of an advisory commission. Article III prohibits increases in councilmember compensation during an existing term so that any salary increase shall only become effective after the terms of council members elected at the next regular election.

In addition to the powers authorized, Article III prohibits the Mayor and the City Council from holding any other office, having any conflict of interest, appointing or removing any employee overseen by the City Manager or interfering with the day-to-day operations of the City.

Article IV: City Manager.

Article IV governs the position of City Manager including his or her qualifications, the authority of the Mayor and City Council to appoint or remove the City Manager; and the City Manager's responsibilities to oversee employees, attend City Council meetings and keep the Mayor and City Council informed on the financial condition and needs of the City. Article IV gives the City Council the authority to set the compensation of the City Manager. No vote of the people is required.

Article V: Departments, Services, Officers and Employees.

Article V authorizes the City Manager to establish new departments subject to City Council approval and determine the functions of each department. With the exception of the City Attorney, City Clerk, Library Board of Trustees and Water Board, all departments would operate under the direction of the City Manager. The proposed charter would change the City Attorney and City Clerk from elected to appointed positions hired by the Mayor and City Council with compensation set by the City Council (as is currently the case). Employee oversight for each department would be the responsibility of the department's executive and the hiring and promotion of all employees would be subject to a merit system.

Article V sets forth the services to be provided by the City. The City is required to have a municipal police department. In addition, the City must provide the following services: community development, finance, fire and emergency medical services, information technology, library, parks and recreation, personnel, public works, water and wastewater services.

Article VI: Boards, Commissions and Committees.

Boards existing at the time the charter amendment is adopted would continue in effect. Article VI provides for the appointment, removal, term of office, and procedural rules of board, commission, and committee members. Article VI also provides the specific powers and duties of the Library, Water and Wastewater and Personnel boards and commission. The Board of Library Trustees and Personnel Board serve without compensation. The Water Board compensation is set after a public hearing.

Article VII: Financial Management.

The charter requires an annual budget and capital improvement plan be adopted after public hearing.

Article VII requires an annual independent audit of all City accounts by a certified public accountant, chosen through a competitive bidding process, to perform the audit in accordance with General Accepted Auditing Standards (GAAS) and Generally Accepted Governmental Auditing Standards (GAGAS).

Article VIII: Elections.

City elections would move to November of even-numbered years, consolidated with the statewide general election. The terms of the Mayor and Council Members would be extended one year to facilitate transition from odd-numbered years' elections to even-numbered years. Council members would continue to be elected by ward, for staggered terms of four years. Boundary adjustments would comply with state and federal law. The citizens' powers of initiative, referendum and recall would be as provided in state law.

Article IX: Initiative, Referendum and Recall.

Article IX provides that the City continue to follow state law with respect to initiative, referendum and recall of elected officials.

Article X: Charter Amendments.

Article X provides that any amendment to the Charter would be approved in accordance with state law and requires the City to establish a process for the intermittent review of the City's charter.

Article XI: Severability.

Article XI provides that if any provision of the charter is invalidated or otherwise unenforceable, the remaining provisions will remain enforceable to the extent permitted by law.

This Impartial Analysis of Bond Measure M has been prepared by County Counsel for Kern County pursuant to Section 9500 of the California Elections Code.

The Board of Trustees of the Muroc Joint Unified School District ("District") placed Bond Measure M on the ballot. A "Yes" vote by at least fifty-five percent (55%) of the voters voting on this measure will authorize the District to issue bonds to benefit the District in the amount of twenty-one million dollars (\$21,000,000).

The bond proceeds may only be used to fund the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities. The measure lists the specific projects for which the proceeds will be used. The proceeds may not be used for any other purposes, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

The Board of Trustees will conduct financial and performance audits annually and will appoint a citizens' oversight committee to ensure that bond proceeds are spent only on the school facilities projects listed in the measure.

The bonded debt will be a general obligation of the District and will be financed by property taxes levied annually on taxable property located within the District in an amount necessary to pay the annual debt obligation. The Tax Rate Statement included in the measure provides an estimate of the tax rates that will be required to fund the bonds issued.

2. The best estimate of the tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue during the first fiscal year after the sale of the last series of bonds, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$.06000 per \$100 (\$60.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2022-23.
3. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, is \$.06000 per \$100 (\$60.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation. This vote is projected to apply in each fiscal year that the bonds are outstanding.
4. The best estimate from official sources of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold will be approximately \$46,900,000.

These estimates are based on projections derived from information obtained from official sources. The actual tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary depending on the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold at each sale and actual increases in assessed valuations. The timing of the bond sales and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the needs of the District. Actual assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined in the assessment and the equalization process.

To that end, in developing the scope of projects to be funded, the Board evaluated the District's urgent and critical facility needs, including safety issues, class size, and computer and information technology. The District evaluated current facilities and received public input in developing this Project List. Teachers, staff, community members and the Board have prioritized key health and safety projects so that the most critical facility needs are addressed.

The Project List includes the following types of upgrades and improvements at the following District schools:

Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program/project management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, the reduction or retirement of outstanding lease obligations and interim or bridge funding incurred to advance fund projects from the Project List; installation of signage and fencing; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects. In addition to the projects listed above, the repair and renovation of each of the existing school facilities may include, but not be limited to, some or all of the following: repair and replace heating/boiler, plumbing, gas, water/sewer, drainage and ventilation systems; renovate student and staff restrooms; acquire land and facilities for educational and administrative purposes; improve outdoor learning spaces and shade structures; repair and replace worn-out roofs, windows, walls, doors, doorframes and drinking fountains; improve school facilities for disability access; install or upgrade wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices and needs; upgrade or construct classroom and support facilities, including administrative, physical education, warehousing, wood shop, cafeteria, multi-purpose rooms, classrooms, auditorium, science building, media centers and maintenance yards; replace portable classrooms; repair and replace fire alarms, emergency communications, intercoms, and security systems; resurface or replace hard courts, asphalt, turf and drainage/irrigation systems and campus landscaping; improve or expand parking and traffic circulation flow; enhance fire and maintenance access roads; interior and exterior painting and floor covering; or replace; construct various forms of storage and support spaces; upgrade classrooms; repair, upgrade or install interior and exterior lighting systems; improve or construct gymnasium, locker rooms, wrestling rooms, athletic fields/stadiums/pools/ courts, restrooms lockers, tracks, bleachers and concession areas; construct tennis courts; improve handicapped accessibility; replace outdated security fences and security systems. The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, servers, switches, routers, network security/firewall, wireless technology systems and other miscellaneous equipment. The allocation of bond proceeds will be affected by the final costs of each project. The District may not be able to complete some of the projects listed above. The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control. Some projects throughout the District, such as gyms, fields and performing arts facilities, may be undertaken as joint use projects in cooperation with other local public or non-profit agencies. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans and

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construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. The allocation of bond proceeds may be affected by the District's receipt of State matching funds and the final costs of each project. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/restoration or geological stabilization may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property.

Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the specific purposes identified herein. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

- * Having at least one security guard on-site;

- * Must only operate between 9:00 a.m. and 11 p.m.

- * Restricted to new marijuana business overlay zones, identified by parcel number, established by the ballot measure;
- * Located 600 feet from schools;

Commercial Cannabis Activities, except Dispensaries, would be:

- * Restricted to Industrial zones OIP, IL, IH, and IE;
- * Located 600 feet from schools, parks, libraries, and recreation centers;
- * Located 100 feet from residential zones and religious facilities.

Dispensaries would be:

- * Restricted to Industrial zones OIP, IL, IH, and IE;
- * Located 1000 feet from schools, parks, libraries, recreation centers and religious facilities;
- * Located 300 feet from residential zones.

Commercial Cannabis Activities, including Dispensaries, would be required to follow operating standards, including:

- * Having at least one security guard on-site;
- * Must not sell alcohol or tobacco products;
- * All employees must go through criminal background checks and will be denied approval if they have been convicted of or plead guilty or no contest to a felony, or a misdemeanor drug or weapons charge;
- * Delivery would not be permitted within the City;
- * Must only operate between 10:00am and 8:00pm Monday through Saturday and from 11:00am and 7:00pm on Sundays;
- * Must submit to an annual license renewal process.

If this Council measure and either or both of the initiative measures are approved by a majority of the voters, only the measure that receives the most votes will become effective.

Furthermore, if the Council measure is approved, the Council would be authorized to amend or repeal the measure without voter approval.

This measure must be approved by a majority of the voters and must receive a higher number of votes than the competing measures. A "yes" vote is a vote in favor of adopting the City proposition to regulate commercial cannabis activities. A "no" vote is a vote against permitting and regulating commercial cannabis activities in the City of San Bernardino.

San Bernardino City Council rushed Measure P to compete with citizen-backed initiatives. "We only had a month to put it together," said Deputy City Attorney Steven Graham at the August City Council meeting, "We weren't able to meet with all of the stakeholders that we wanted."

Not surprisingly, Measure P includes major flaws:

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE Q

This Impartial Analysis of Measure Q has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

Measure Q asks Rancho Cucamonga voters whether they favor a change to elect four members of the City Council in a "by district" system at future elections. To elect members "by district" means that City Council candidates must reside in a specific district and be elected only by the registered voters who live in that district. Currently, the voters elect members of the Rancho Cucamonga City Council "at large," which means that candidates may live anywhere in the City and voters throughout the City vote for all four members of the City Council. The City of Rancho Cucamonga's directly elected Mayor currently is elected "at large" and shall continue to be elected "at large" whether or not Measure Q is approved by the voters.

Measure Q would divide the City into four City Council districts defined in the measure. If the measure passes, candidates would run and be elected "by district" when existing City Council terms expire beginning in 2018. Two City Council Members would be elected "by district" in 2018 and the remaining two would be elected "by district" in 2020. This measure would not shorten any term of office, or change the number of members of the City Council. The measure would allow the City Council to adjust district boundaries periodically to respond to population or demographic changes.

A "yes" vote on Measure Q would favor changing the current system for electing four members of the City Council to a "by district" system and would create the four City Council districts in the City. A "no" vote would keep the current "at large" system in place.

The City presently is defending a lawsuit which asserts that the at large election of Council Members violates the California Voting Rights Act. That litigation most likely will continue if Measure Q is not approved by the electorate.

Measure Q was placed on the ballot by the City Council of the City of Rancho Cucamonga.

ORDINANCE NO. 887

AN ORDINANCE OF THE VOTERS OF THE CITY OF RANCHO CUCAMONGA PROVIDING FOR THE ELECTION OF FOUR MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL BY FOUR DISTRICTS WITH A MAYOR ELECTED AT LARGE, ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARIES AND IDENTIFICATION NUMBER OF EACH DISTRICT, ESTABLISHING THE ELECTION ORDER OF EACH DISTRICT AND ADDING CHAPTER 2.11 OF THE RANCHO CUCAMONGA MUNICIPAL CODE

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF RANCHO CUCAMONGA HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to Government Code Section 34871 and 34872, it has been proposed that the voters of the City of Rancho Cucamonga elect four members of the City Council by the voters of four City Council districts rather than at-large. The election of the Mayor shall remain at-large. This proposal is submitted for the approval of the voters of Rancho Cucamonga.

Section 2. Title 2 of the Rancho Cucamonga Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding Chapter 2.11 to the existing Title to read as follows:

2.11 – City Council Elections

2.11.010 At-Large Election – Mayor. The mayor shall be voted on at-large.

2.11.020 City Council Districts Established. Four City Council districts are hereby established in the City of Rancho Cucamonga. The boundaries and identifying number of each district shall be as described on the Council District Map attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference.

2.11.030 Election of Members of the City Council by District.

a. Following the effective date of this Ordinance and upon the commencement of "by district" elections in the order established in Section 2.11.040 of this Code, Members of the City Council shall be elected "by District" as defined in California Government Code Section 34871 or any successor statute. Except for the mayor, a person shall not be eligible to be elected to be a Member of the City Council unless he or she is otherwise qualified as required by law and resided in the district, and both resided in the geographical area making up the district from which he or she is nominated to be elected and was a registered voter of the City of Rancho Cucamonga at the time nomination papers are issued to the candidate as provided for in Section 10227 of the California Elections Code. It is the intent of the voters that no term of any Member of the City Council that commences on or prior to the effective date of this Ordinance shall be affected prior to its expiration date.

b. Registered voters signing nomination papers or voting for a Member of the City Council shall be residents of the geographical area making up the district from which the Member is to be elected.

c. The terms of the office of each Member elected to the City Council, including the mayor, shall remain four (4) years.

2.22.040 Commencement of district elections. It is the intent of the voters that this Ordinance shall not affect any term of office in existence or commencing on or before the effective date of this Ordinance. Commencing with the general municipal election in November of 2018 and thereafter, the voters in districts 2 and 3 shall elect Members of the City Council by district and

the Mayor shall be elected at large for full four (4) year terms. At the general municipal election in 2020 and thereafter, the voters in districts 1 and 4 shall elect Members of the City Council by district for full four (4) year terms.

2.22.050 Adjustment of boundaries. Pursuant to Elections Code Section 21601, as it may be amended, the City Council shall adjust the boundaries of any or all of the districts following each decennial federal census. Using the census as a basis, the City Council shall adjust the boundaries so that the districts shall be as nearly equal in population as practicable and in compliance with all applicable provisions of law. Any adjustment of district boundaries shall be made by ordinance adopted by the City Council before the first day of November of the year following the year in which each decennial federal census is taken. Prior to the public hearing approving the adjustment of the district boundaries, the City Council shall hold a public hearing on the proposed district boundaries as required by Election Code Section 21607.

At the time of any annexation of territory to the City, the City Council shall designate, by resolution adopted by a vote of at least a majority of the City Council, the contiguous district to which the annexed territory shall be a part and shall amend the district boundaries if necessary in accordance with Election Code section 21603, as it may be amended.

Pursuant to Elections Code Section 21606, the term of office of any council member who has been elected and whose term of office has not expired shall not be affected by any change in the boundaries of the district from which he or she was elected. At the first election for council following adjustment of the boundaries of the districts, a person meeting the requirements of Government Code Section 34882 shall be elected to the City Council for each district under the readjusted district plan that has the same district number as a district whose incumbent's term on the council is due to expire."

Section 3. Effective Date. If a majority of the voters voting at an election on this measure approve this Ordinance, it shall take effect ten (10) calendar days following the City Council's final certification of the election result, as required by applicable law and shall affect City Council terms that commence thereafter.

Section 4. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall nonetheless remain in full force and effect. The People of the City of Rancho Cucamonga hereby declare that they would have adopted each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions of this Ordinance be declared invalid or unenforceable.

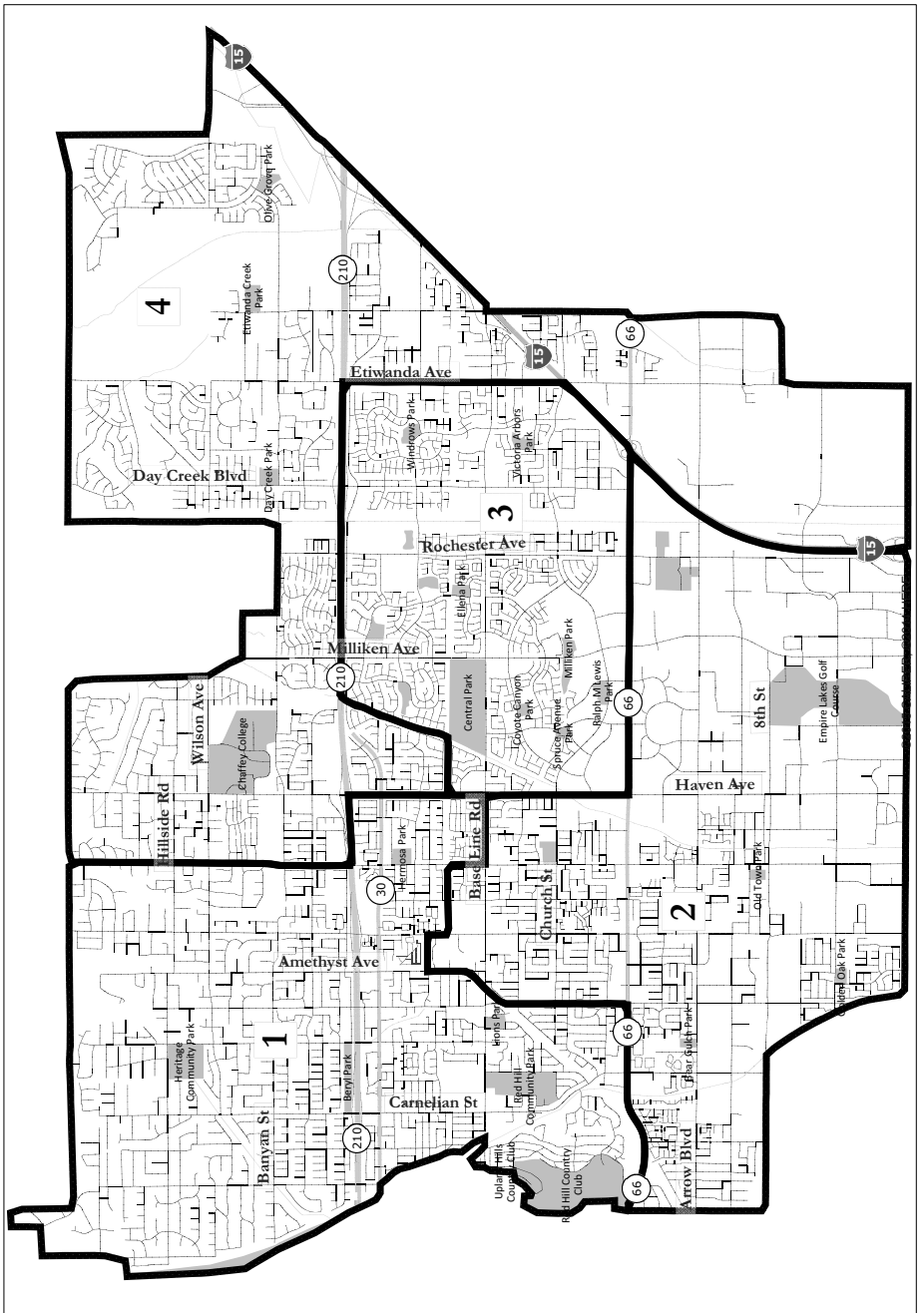

CITY OF ADELANTO**

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE R

This Impartial Analysis of Measure R has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

This measure authorizes the Adelanto City Council to adopt general excise taxes on businesses engaged in commercial marijuana activities within the City of Adelanto ("City"). As set forth by this measure, the City Council may adopt taxes of up to five percent of the revenue attributable to commercial marijuana activities occurring within the City. Taxable commercial marijuana activities include all business activities licensed, authorized, or otherwise permitted by State or local law.

The City adopted an ordinance on May 25, 2016 authorizing the cultivation and manufacturing of medical marijuana pursuant to permits issued by the City. This measure would authorize the City Council to adopt taxes of up to five percent of the revenue attributable to each of these activities within the City. Other commercial activities which may be subject to taxation could include transportation/distribution, testing, and dispensing of marijuana.

All revenues received by the City from these taxes must be deposited in the general fund to be used locally for the benefit of the City.

A "Yes" vote is in favor of adopting this measure and this commercial marijuana activity tax. A "No" vote is against adopting this measure and prevents the imposition of these taxes on commercial marijuana activities. If a majority of voters vote "Yes," then this measure will authorize the City Council for the City of Adelanto to adopt resolutions and ordinances imposing the prescribed taxes. This measure was placed on the ballot by the City Council.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE S

This Impartial Analysis of Measure S has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

This measure authorizes the City Council for the City of Adelanto ("City") to adopt a tax on all businesses licensed or operating in the City proportional to the revenue earned by that business within the City. The City Council would be authorized to impose a new tax of up to one-twentieth of one percent (0.05%) of the gross revenue earned by each business in the City unless otherwise exempt by law. This measure would authorize the City Council to adopt any appropriate tax amount provided it does not exceed the 0.05% of each business's gross revenue. The tax will result in increased general fund revenues for the City over the current business tax system from most business earning more than \$200,000 in gross revenue per year, while relieving the tax burden on most small businesses earning less than \$200,000 in gross revenue per year.

For example, a small business operating solely within the City of Adelanto earning \$100,000 in gross revenue could owe up to, but not more than, \$50, which is less than the current flat tax of \$100 for most businesses. A business with total statewide revenues equal to \$20 Million, with \$500,000 attributable to business activity within the City, could owe up to, but no more than, \$250, which would be \$150 over the current flat tax of \$100 for most businesses.

This measure would authorize the imposition of a new business tax in addition to other taxes and fees. This measure is intended to allow the City Council to replace the existing flat business tax structure that the City currently employs. The City Council would be authorized to impose this tax in addition to other legitimate licensing fees imposed by the Adelanto Municipal Code.

All revenues received by the City from this tax must be deposited in the general fund to be used locally for the benefit of the City.

A "Yes" vote is in favor of adopting this measure and this business tax. A "No" vote is against adopting this measure and prevents imposition of this new business tax structure. If a majority of voters vote "Yes," then this measure will authorize the City Council for the City of Adelanto to adopt resolutions and ordinances imposing the prescribed tax. This measure was placed on the ballot by the City Council.

Larger more profitable businesses reaping greater financial rewards from the City will shoulder a larger proportional tax burden whereas smaller businesses deserve relief from burdensome taxes.

This Argument Against Measure S was submitted pursuant to Section 9282 of the California Elections Code. It is the opinion of the author(s), and has been printed exactly as submitted.

The Measure S Tax is deceptive and misleading. Supporters of Measure S insist that this is not a tax on all Adelanto residents. **But that is not true!**

Increasing taxes on businesses in Adelanto will lead to higher costs for Adelanto families and residents. The cost of groceries, gas, and goods will be higher for Adelanto residents than other High Desert citizens. **That is not right!**

REBUTTAL TO ARGUMENT AGAINST MEASURE S

This Rebuttal to Argument Against Measure S was submitted pursuant to Section 9285 of the California Elections Code. It is the opinion of the author(s), and has been printed exactly as submitted.

There is nothing misleading or deceptive about the tax proposed in Measure S. The City Council has been completely forthright about the large budget deficits that this City faces, the risks of municipal bankruptcy, and the dire need to find sources of revenue. Measure S is designed to restructure the business tax system to both relieve the tax burden on small businesses and provide a minor, but stable, source of revenue from businesses generating annual revenue of over \$200,000.

Contrary to the argument submitted against Measure S, this tax measure does not authorize double taxation. Instead, all business license taxes would be limited to 0.05 percent of the business' revenue generated within the City of Adelanto. Therefore, the proposed tax would decrease the local tax burden on small businesses generating less than \$200,000 of annual revenue in the City. Further, the 0.05 percent tax on larger businesses would be extremely minimal.

Of course, businesses will still be subject to all applicable State and federal taxes and licensing fees, but many small business in the City will see a reprieve from the local business tax pursuant to this Measure. As a result, this tax will not drive businesses or jobs away from the City; rather it will encourage business ventures and entrepreneurship in Adelanto.

CITY OF COLTON**

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE T

This Impartial Analysis of Measure T has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

The City of Colton currently imposes a transient occupancy tax ("TOT"), also generally known as a "hotel" tax, at the rate of ten percent (10%) of rent paid by guests to occupy a room or space in a hotel or similar lodging (referred to herein as a "hotel"). This TOT is imposed upon occupancy of a room or hotel space within the City, for dwelling, lodging, or sleeping purposes, for a period of thirty (30) consecutive days or less. The TOT currently provides approximately \$600,000 annually to the General Fund to pay for general City services and programs.

Measure "T" was placed on the November, 2016 ballot by the City Council. It would amend and update the City's Municipal Code as follows:

- Increases the rate of TOT from ten percent (10%) to twelve and one-half percent (12.5%) of the rent paid by guests to occupy a room or space in a hotel. It is anticipated that this rate increase will generate an additional \$150,000 in new revenues;
- Expressly provides that the 2.5% TOT rate increase is a "special tax", and therefore those revenues shall be spent only for a specific purpose: the construction, maintenance and/or rehabilitation of athletic/recreational fields and facilities within the City of Colton. The current basic 10% TOT rate will remain a "general tax" and those revenues will continue to be spent on general City services and programs.
- Clarifies that if a guest occupies a hotel for longer than 30 consecutive days, the TOT will apply only to the first 30 days of hotel occupancy;
- Includes online travel companies (e.g., Expedia, Travelocity), online short term rental companies (e.g., AirBnB) and other similar third parties as hotel "operators" for the purpose of collecting the City's TOT from guests who purchase a hotel room or similar space via the Internet, or by similar electronic means;
- Clarifies that the taxable rent paid for a hotel room or space includes all rates and fees commonly charged for hotel occupancy, such as room rates, service charges, parking fees, block or group reservation charges, retail markup, commissions, processing fees, cancellation charges, and online booking fees;
- Addresses "block reservation" arrangements by providing that the period of taxable occupancy is measured by the length of an individual guest's stay, not the length of the "block reservation" or similar agreement entered into by the guest's employer or agent; and
- Includes certain clarifying amendments regarding exemptions from the TOT.

Measure "T" is a "special tax", the revenues from the increased TOT can only be used for athletic/recreational fields and facilities within the City of Colton, as described above. Therefore, pursuant to California Proposition 218, Measure "T" must be approved by a two-thirds (2/3) supermajority of the voters.

A "Yes" vote on Measure "T" will authorize the 2.5% TOT rate increase as a special tax.

A "No" vote on Measure "T" will not authorize the 2.5% TOT rate increase as a special tax.

ORDINANCE NO. O-14-16

AN ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF COLTON AMENDING THE CITY'S TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY (ROOM) TAX CODE BY INCREASING THE RATE FROM 10% TO 12.5%, DEDICATING THE ADDITIONAL 2.5% OF THE TAX RATE ABOVE 10% FOR SPECIFIC PURPOSES, AND ADDRESSING ONLINE TRAVEL COMPANY AND OTHER THIRD PARTY BOOKINGS, AND MAKING VARIOUS CONFORMING CHANGES.

(NOTE: additions are highlighted in ***bold italics*** and deletions are highlighted in ~~strikeout~~)

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF COLTON, CALIFORNIA DO HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Section 3.24.020 of Chapter 3.24 of Title 3 of the Colton Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"3.24.020. Definitions.

Except where the context otherwise requires, the definitions given in this section govern the construction of this chapter.

"Block Reservation" means an arrangement whereby a person reserves, whether on an exclusive or non-exclusive basis, a room or block/group of rooms for a defined period of time under a written or oral agreement with an operator, intending for such room(s) to be occupied by that person's employees or agents on an intermittent, periodic or "as needed" basis during that defined period of time.

"Hotel" means any structure, or any portion of any structure, which is occupied or intended or designed for occupancy by transients for dwelling, lodging or sleeping purposes, and includes any hotel, inn, tourist home or house, motel, studio hotel, bachelor hotel, lodging house, rooming house, apartment house, dormitory, public or private club, mobile home or house trailer at a fixed location, or other similar structure or portion thereof.

"Occupancy" means the use or possession, or the right to use, or possession of any room or rooms or portion thereof (***whether or not the person entitled to the use or possession actually uses or possesses such room or rooms or portion thereof***), in any hotel for dwelling, lodging or sleeping purposes. ***The use or possession or right to use or possess any room or any suite of connecting rooms as office space, banquet or private dining rooms, or exhibits, sample or display space shall not be considered "occupancy" within the meaning of this definition unless the person exercising occupancy uses or possesses, or has the right to use or possess all or any portion of such room or suite of rooms for dwelling, lodging or sleeping purposes.***

"Online Short Term Rental Company" shall mean any person, whether operating for profit or not for profit, which facilitates the connection between transients aiming to purchase occupancy in any hotel via the Internet, or by similar electronic means.

"Online Travel Company" shall mean any person, whether operating for profit or not for profit, which enables transients to purchase occupancy in a hotel via the Internet, or by similar electronic means.

"Operator" means the person who is proprietor of the hotel **or any other person who has the right to rent rooms within the hotel to customers or to facilitate the rental of rooms via an online short term rental company**, whether in the capacity of owner, lessee, sublessee, mortgagee in possession, licensee, **seller, reseller**, or any other capacity. Where the operator performs his functions through a managing agent **or booking agent** of any type or character, other than an employee (**including, but not limited to, an online travel company or online short term rental company**), the managing agent **or booking agent** shall also be deemed an operator for the purposes of this chapter and shall have the same duties and liabilities as his principal. **Full** ~~Compliance~~ compliance with the provisions of this chapter by either the principal or the managing agent **or booking agent** shall, however, be considered to be compliance by both.

"Person" means any individual, firm, partnership, joint venture, association, social club, fraternal organization, joint stock company, corporation, estate, trust, business trust, receiver, trustee, syndicate, or any other group or combination acting as a unit.

"Rent" means the **total** consideration charged **to the transient, (including but not limited to, room rates, service charges, parking fees, purchase price, advance registration, block or group reservation charges, assessments, retail markup, commission, processing fees, cancellation charges, attrition fees, or online booking or broker fees)**, whether or not received, for the occupancy of space in a hotel valued in money, whether to be received in money, goods, labor or otherwise, including all receipts, cash, credits and property and services of any kind or nature, without any deduction therefrom whatsoever. **Nothing in this definition shall be construed to mean that rent is charged directly or indirectly for occupancy in a hotel when a room is provided to the transient as a compliment for the operator and where no consideration is charged to or received from any other person. Further, bona fide charges for food and beverages which are subject to tax under the California Sales and Use Tax Law (Revenue and Taxation Code Sections 6001 et. seq.) shall not be deemed rent subject to the tax imposed by this Part.**

"Tax Administrator" means city manager or such other city employee/official, as shall be designated by the City Council **manager**.

"Transient" means any person who exercises occupancy or is entitled to occupy by reason of concession, permit, right of access, license or other agreement for a period of thirty consecutive calendar days or less, counting portions of calendar days as full days. **The following rules shall apply to this definition:**

- A.** Any such person so occupying space **or entitled to occupy a room** in a hotel shall be deemed to be a transient until the period of (30) **calendar** days has expired ~~unless there is an agreement in writing between the operator and the occupant providing for a longer period of occupancy.~~ Any individual who exercises or is entitled to occupancy for a period of thirty **consecutive** calendar days or less shall be deemed to be a transient, regardless of whether the reservation and payment or payment for occupancy is made directly by the individual exercising **or entitled to** occupancy or another person or entity. The intent is to tax the individual occupying **or having the entitlement to occupy** the hotel room.

For purposes of this definition, the exercise of or entitlement to occupancy shall be evidenced by any of the following:

1. An individual's signature on a Hotel registration card or form, a Hotel invoice or receipt or any other document associated with an individual's Occupancy in a Hotel; and/or
 2. An individual's providing identification to Hotel staff as proof of employment, membership or affiliation ~~with a Person as defined in subsection D. of this section~~ as a condition of or in connection with exercising Occupancy in a Hotel.
- B.** In determining whether a person is a transient, uninterrupted periods of time extending both prior and subsequent to the effective date of this Part may be considered.
- C.** *In the event a person exercises or is entitled to occupancy for a continuous and uninterrupted period of longer than 30 calendar days, he or she shall be deemed a transient and subject to the tax for only the first 30 calendar days of occupancy and shall cease being a transient and the tax shall not apply on the 31st calendar day of occupancy and following. However, any break or interruption in occupancy shall start a new 30 day period subject to the tax.*
- D.** *In the case of a block reservation, a person's employee or agent shall be deemed a transient if that employee or agent exercises or is entitled to occupancy of a room for a period of 30 consecutive calendar days or less, regardless of the duration of any block reservation agreement. By way of example, if a corporation enters into a one-year block reservation agreement with an operator and one of the corporation's employees occupies a room for 30 calendar days, the employee shall be deemed a transient whose occupancy is subject to the tax, notwithstanding the fact that the block reservation agreement has a duration longer than 30 calendar days."*

SECTION 2. Section 3.24.030 of Chapter 3.24 of Title 3 of the Colton Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"3.24.030 Imposition—Rate—Purposes of Tax.

- A.** For the privilege of occupancy in any hotel, each transient is subject to and shall pay a tax in the amount of ~~40~~ **12.5** percent of the rent charged by the operator. This tax constitutes a debt owed by the transient to the City which is extinguished only by payment to the operator of the hotel at the same time the rent is paid. If the rent is paid in installments, a proportionate share of the tax shall be paid with each installment. The unpaid tax shall be due when the transient ceases to occupy space in the hotel **occupancy**. If for any reason the tax due is not paid to the operator of the hotel, the Tax Administrator may require that such tax shall be paid directly to the Tax Administrator.
- B.** *The basic 10% rate of the tax is and shall remain a general tax, the revenues from which shall be deposited into the City's general fund and which may be used to pay for any valid general expenditures of the City of Colton.*
- C.** *The additional 2.5% of the tax rate is hereby declared to be a special tax, the revenues from which shall be deposited into a special fund of the City and which may only be expended for the following specific purposes: The construction, maintenance and/or rehabilitation of athletic/recreational fields and related facilities located within the City of Colton.*

SECTION 3. Section 3.24.040 of Chapter 3.24 of Title 3 of the Colton Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"3.24.040. Exemptions.

No tax shall be imposed upon:

- A. Any person as to whom, or any occupancy as to which, it is beyond the power of the City to impose the tax herein provided;
- B. Any federal or State of California officer or employee when occupying a room while on official government business. For purposes of this section, non-employee students, supporters and volunteers of California public universities and colleges shall not be deemed to be officers or employees of the State of California.
- C. Any officer or employee of a foreign government who is exempt by reason of express provision of federal law or international treaty.
- D. No exemption shall be granted except upon a claim therefor made at the time rent is collected and under penalty of perjury upon a form prescribed by the Tax Administrator. ***Any federal or State of California officer or employee when on official government business claiming such an exemption shall provide to the operator as conclusive evidence that his or her occupancy is for the official business of his or her employer:***
 - (1) ***Travel orders from his or her government employer; or a government warrant issued by his or her employer to pay for the occupancy; or a government credit card issued by his or her employer to pay for the occupancy; and***
 - (2) ***proof of his or her governmental employment as an employee or officer as described in subsection (B), and proof, consistent with these provisions, that his or her occupancy is for the official business of his or her governmental employer.***

It shall be the duty of an operator to keep and maintain for a period of three (3) years written documentation in support of each exemption granted under this Section."

SECTION 4. **Effective Date.** Pursuant to California Constitution Article XIII C §(2)(d) and California Elections Code §9217, if a two-thirds (2/3) supermajority of the qualified voters voting in the election on Measure "T" vote in favor of the adoption of such measure, this ordinance shall be deemed valid and binding and shall be considered as adopted upon the date that the vote is declared by the City Council, and shall go into effect ten (10) days after that date.

SECTION 5. **Severability.** If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this ordinance. The People of the City of Colton hereby declare that they would have adopted this ordinance and each section, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more section, subsections, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 6. **Certification/Summary.** Following the City Clerk's certification that the citizens of Colton have approved this Ordinance, the Mayor shall sign this Ordinance and the City Clerk shall cause the same to be entered in the book of original ordinances of said City; and shall cause the same, or a summary thereof, to be published as required by law.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE U

This Impartial Analysis of Measure U has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

This proposed measure was placed on the ballot by a petition signed by the requisite number of voters. The purpose of the proposed measure is to repeal existing local laws prohibiting medical marijuana dispensaries and replace them with a system for regulating and permitting a maximum of three medical marijuana dispensaries within the City.

Currently the medical marijuana dispensaries, mobile medical marijuana dispensaries and cultivation of marijuana are prohibited in the City of Upland. The proposed measure would repeal these existing prohibitions, and would adopt a new Chapter 17.158 to permit and establish standards for the operation of marijuana dispensaries within the City and payment of fees to the City.

The proposed new Chapter 17.158 would create a new definition for "marijuana dispensaries," which would apply to all sites, facilities, locations, uses, collectives, associations, cooperatives, or businesses that distribute, store, sell, exchange, process, deliver, give away, possess, and/or cultivate medical marijuana within the City. Dispensaries are proposed to be permitted in the Community Commercial Zone, only along Foothill Boulevard west of Airport Drive and east of Monte Vista Boulevard, with a maximum total of three permitted. The proposed regulations would prohibit Marijuana Dispensaries from being within certain specified distances from sensitive uses (schools - 1000', parks - 500' and residences - 100'). Dispensaries would be required to comply with laws generally applicable to all businesses, such as parking, and building, fire and health and safety codes. Dispensaries must also follow additional requirements: non-alcohol or tobacco sales; warning signs required; dispensing to qualified patients only; marijuana not visible; smoking prohibited; underage dispensing restricted; and business exterior must be compatible with surrounding properties. Though smoking is prohibited, consumption of edible marijuana products, marijuana tinctures, and/or vaporizing of marijuana is permitted.

Dispensaries would be required to obtain a permit from the City. Permits could only be denied or suspended by the City for specified reasons, such as the applicant's age (must be 18 years old or older), non-payment of fees, non-compliance with standard codes, lack of responsible manager, etc. A permit cannot be denied based on past criminal record. A decision to deny or suspend would be subject to prompt review by the planning commission, city council and/or courts. The City would be completely prohibited from considering any Federal law or guideline in denying or suspending permits. Time restrictions would be imposed on the City for processing permit applications (14 days for application completeness; 30 days for application decision). Permits would be automatically granted if time restrictions are not met. There are no provisions for revocation of permits; suspensions can be for a maximum of thirty days. Each permit holder would be required to pay an annual fee to the City of \$75,000, which could be paid in two installments after an initial permit. Violation of any of the proposed regulations would be a misdemeanor.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE U

This Argument in Favor of Measure U was submitted pursuant to Section 9282 of the California Elections Code. It is the opinion of the author(s), and has been printed exactly as submitted.

The Upland Regulate Marijuana Act of 2016 (URMA) is the common-sense, responsible legislation that the City of Upland needs now. Despite banning medical marijuana sales since 2003, Upland has seen an explosion of illegal, unregulated marijuana shops. There are 24 shops in Upland, including 9 storefronts and 15 mobile dispensaries. These illegal operations violate the city's existing ban and operate near our schools, parks and homes. URMA builds on the success of similar regulations adopted by small and large cities across California. This initiative will reduce shops, crime and citizen complaints. In addition, Upland will increase tax revenues to enforce these new regulations.

Thirteen years ago, Upland's city council banned medical marijuana businesses. This ban is completely ineffective and quite costly. *The Press Enterprise* reports that it costs roughly \$100,000 to close an illegal dispensary and that shops usually reopen nearby. Despite the existing ban, today Upland has a total of 24 illegal marijuana operations, including storefronts and mobile dispensaries. Upland has tried to end this black market, but has only wasted our taxpayer dollars in vain.

The only proven and effective approach: limit medical marijuana businesses with sensible regulation. After recognizing that bans fail, the City of San Jose passed regulations that reduced the number of dispensaries from more than 100 to only 16. Today, San Jose has 1 dispensary for every 62,500 citizens; San Diego has 1 for every 100,000; Oakland has 1 for every 103,500. Meanwhile, Upland has 1 for every 3,125 citizens! While other cities eliminated marijuana sales near their schools, parks and homes, Upland still encourages a black market to flourish.

Upland needs responsible government. Another ban will not work. Eliminate Upland's ineffective ban and regulate this market or watch our city attract more violent crime near our schools, parks and homes.

FULL TEXT FOR MEASURE U

Title 7 of the Upland Municipal Code is hereby amended with the addition of a Chapter 17.158 (Marijuana Dispensaries) as follows:

17.158 MARIJUANA DISPENSARIES

17.158.010 Purpose and Intent

A. It is the purpose of this chapter to establish criteria and standards for the establishment and conduct of Marijuana Dispensaries which will protect the public health, safety, and welfare, preserve locally recognized values of community appearance, minimize the potential for nuisances related to the operation of Marijuana Dispensaries, maintain local property values, and preserve the quality of urban life. Permitting well-regulated Marijuana Dispensaries will enable Upland's numerous qualified patients to obtain safe access to a crucial, low-impact source of medication recommended by their doctors. These regulations are designed to assure that the operations of Marijuana Dispensaries are in compliance with California law and to mitigate the adverse effects from unregulated operation of Marijuana Dispensaries.

17.158.020 Definitions

A. For the purpose of carrying out the intent of this chapter, words, terms and phrases shall be deemed to have the meaning ascribed to them in the following section covering definitions.

B. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the singular number include the plural number, and words used in the plural number include the singular number. Words used in the masculine gender include the feminine gender, and words used in the feminine gender include the masculine gender. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directive.

C. 1. "Marijuana Dispensary" means any site, facility, location, use, collective, association, cooperative or business that distributes, dispenses, stores, sells, exchanges, processes, delivers, gives away, possesses and/or cultivates marijuana for medical purposes to, with, for and/or from qualified patients, health care providers, primary caregivers or physicians pursuant to Health and Safety Code Section 11362.5 (adopted as Proposition 215, the "Compassionate Use Act of 1996") or any state regulations adopted in furtherance thereof. These establishments shall be regulated by the performance standards set forth in Section 17.158.050, as well as the zoning and locational requirements of Sections 17.158.030 and 17.158.040.

2. "Marijuana" shall have the same meaning as used in Health and Safety Code Section 11018.

17.158.030 Zoning Districts - Permitted

Any Marijuana Dispensary as defined in this chapter shall be permitted only in the CC (Community Commercial) Zone along Foothill Boulevard west of Airport Drive and east of Monte Vista Blvd. No Marijuana Dispensary shall be permitted within any other zone, nor shall any Marijuana Dispensary be located in the CC (Community Commercial) Zone east of Airport Drive or west of Monte Vista Blvd.

17.158.040 Locational Criteria

A Marijuana Dispensary shall not be located within certain distances of sensitive uses.

A. For the purposes of this chapter, all distances shall be measured in a straight line, without regard for intervening structures, from the nearest exterior wall of the unit or building containing the Marijuana Dispensary to the nearest property line of a sensitive use or zone as listed in this section, or to the nearest corner of any traffic intersection named herein.

B. In establishing a Marijuana Dispensary, the locational criteria shall apply to sensitive uses only if they are located inside the boundaries of the city.

C. The establishment or maintenance of a Marijuana Dispensary shall be subject to the locational criteria setting forth minimum distances from sensitive uses as follows:

1. School: 1,000 feet.
2. Park: 500 feet.
3. Residence: 100 feet.

If a school, park or residence is established within the minimum distances set forth above after the establishment of a Marijuana Dispensary, the Marijuana Dispensary shall be deemed a legal nonconforming use.

17.158.050 Design and Performance Standards

The establishment of a Marijuana Dispensary shall comply with the applicable site development standards, including parking, of the zone in which the dispensary is located, the building code, fire code, and the health and safety code of the city. A Marijuana Dispensary shall comply with the applicable city permit and inspection procedures. In addition, Marijuana Dispensaries shall comply with the following design and performance standards:

A. No Alcohol or Tobacco Sales. No alcohol or tobacco may be sold by Marijuana Dispensaries.

B. Mandatory Warning Sign. A sign shall be posted in a conspicuous location inside each Marijuana Dispensary stating as follows: "The diversion of marijuana for nonmedical purposes is a violation of State law, as is loitering at this location for an illegal purpose. The use of marijuana may impair a person's ability to drive a motor vehicle or operate heavy machinery."

C. Dispensing of Marijuana. Marijuana Dispensaries shall only dispense marijuana to qualified patients and/or their primary caregivers as defined by Health and Safety Code Section 11362.5, et seq.

D. No Marijuana Visible from Outside. No marijuana may be visible by the naked eye from the exterior of any Marijuana Dispensary.

E. Smoking Prohibition. While Labor Code Section 6404.5 only prohibits the smoking of tobacco products in the workplace this regulation will prohibit the smoking of marijuana in all workplaces including Marijuana Dispensaries. However, recognizing that some qualified patients may have an immediate need, consumption of edible marijuana products, marijuana tinctures, and/or vaporizing of marijuana is permitted.

F. Restriction on Underage Dispensing. No Marijuana Dispensary may dispense marijuana to anyone under the age of 18 unless he or she is a qualified patient and is accompanied by a parent or legal guardian in accordance with California law.

G. Appearance. The exterior appearance of the structure housing any Marijuana Dispensary shall be compatible with surrounding structures in the immediate vicinity to

ensure against blight, deterioration, or substantial diminishment or impairment of property values in the area.

H. City Enforcement Access. All local code enforcement officers, police officers, and other agents or employees of the City of Upland requesting admission for the sole purpose of determining compliance with the provisions of this Section shall be given unrestricted access upon reasonable notice.

I. Indemnification of City. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the City of Upland shall assume no liability whatsoever, and expressly does not waive sovereign immunity, with respect to any medical marijuana dispensed through any Marijuana Dispensary, or for the activities of any Marijuana Dispensary. Upon receiving a business permit, the primary operator (or officer or board, depending on the legal structure) of each Marijuana Dispensary shall sign an agreement indemnifying and holding the City of Upland harmless to the fullest extent permitted by law, on behalf of the Marijuana Dispensary.

J. There shall be a maximum of 3 (three) Marijuana Dispensaries permitted within the City of Upland.

17.158.060 Permit approval - Findings

A. The City shall only deny the approval of a permit for a Marijuana Dispensary for the following reasons:

1. That an applicant is under 18 years of age;
2. That an applicant has not paid the filing fee required for a standard city business permit;
3. That an applicant has failed to provide information required by this chapter or the permit application for the issuance of the permit, or that the applicant has knowingly made any false, misleading or fraudulent statement of material facts in the permit application or any other document required by the city in conjunction therewith;
4. That the premises to be used for the Marijuana Dispensary have not been approved as being in compliance with health, fire, building or zoning codes by the department or agency responsible under law for investigating the compliance;
5. That the use is not permitted in the zone in which it is proposed to be located or is not in conformity with the applicable development standards of that zone, including:
 - a. That the use is not in conformity with the zoning criteria set forth in Section 17.158.030, or the location requirements set forth in Section 17.158.040.
 - b. That the design of the site and proposed improvements are not in compliance with all applicable design provisions of UMC Section 17.158.050,
 - c. That the proposed conduct of the marijuana dispensary is not in compliance with all applicable performance standards of UMC Section 17.158.050.

B. Provided the applicant complies with the findings of this section as set forth above, the applicant shall be granted a permit to operate the Marijuana Dispensary and a business license shall be issued to the applicant for this purpose.

C. Prior to occupancy of the building approved for Marijuana Dispensary usage, the applicant shall obtain all applicable city permits and licenses.

D. If the City denies the application, the planning director shall notify the applicant in writing of the denial and state the reason(s) for the denial.

E. The City shall be guided only by the law of the State of California and this Section of the Municipal Code of Upland to make its determination to approve or deny an application. The administrative committee is expressly prohibited from using any Federal law, statute, or Federal agency guideline as a reason to deny an application for a Marijuana Dispensary.

17.158.070 Time limits for Action

An application for a Marijuana Dispensary shall be reviewed and acted upon in accordance with the following time limits:

A. Review of the Application for Completeness. Not later than 14 calendar days after submittal of an application for a Marijuana Dispensary permit, the planning director shall notify the applicant, by mail in writing, if the application is not complete. If it is not complete, the planning director shall specify those parts of the application which are incomplete and shall identify the manner by which it can be made complete. If a written determination is not mailed to the applicant within 14 calendar days after it is submitted, the application shall be deemed complete. Additional 14-day notice requirements shall apply to any subsequent submittals until the applicant files a complete Marijuana Dispensary permit application.

B. The City shall take action to approve, conditionally approve, or deny a Marijuana Dispensary permit application within 30 days after a determination has been made that the application is complete.

C. Permit Streamlining Act. If the permit requested is for a development project for construction or reconstruction subject to the Permit Streamlining Act (Government Code Section 65920 et seq.), the time limits provided in the Permit Streamlining Act shall apply to the Marijuana Dispensary permit approval or denial, except as to the shorter time period set forth in this section.

17.158.080 Suspension of Marijuana Dispensary Permit

A. The City may suspend a Marijuana Dispensary permit for a period not to exceed 30 days or until the violation has been corrected, whichever is later, if the evidence presented establishes that one or more of the following conditions exist:

1. That the conduct of the Marijuana Business does not comply with the city's fire, building, zoning or health and safety codes; or the locational criteria or design and performance standards as set forth in this chapter;
2. That there was not a responsible person over 18 years of age on the premises to act as a manager at all times during which the Marijuana Dispensary was open; or
3. That the permittee, manager, partner, director, officer, stockholder or manager has violated any provision of this chapter.

B. The review of a Marijuana Dispensary permit for its possible suspension shall be conducted by the City. The City shall make its written determination including findings therefore, in accordance with the findings indicated in this section of this chapter within 10 business days. A copy of the written determination and the findings therefore shall be provided to the permittee.

C. The City shall be guided only by the law of the State of California and this Section of the Municipal Code of Upland to make its determination to suspend a Marijuana

Dispensary Permit. The administrative committee is expressly prohibited from using any Federal law, statute, or Federal agency guideline as a reason to suspend a permit for a Marijuana Dispensary.

17.158.090 Deliveries only by Upland Licensed Marijuana Dispensaries

In recognition that some qualified patients are homebound and unable to procure they medicine they need, deliver of medical marijuana to a qualified patient within the city limits of the City of Upland will be allowed only by licensed Marijuana Dispensaries within the City of Upland that are in compliance with this code. All other deliveries of medical marijuana within the City of Upland, whether by licensed Marijuana Dispensaries outside the City of Upland or unlicensed Marijuana Dispensaries of any kind shall be subject to a \$1,000.00 fine for each and every occurrence.

17.158.100 Annual Licensing and Inspection Fee

In recognition that Marijuana Dispensaries may require greater oversight than other businesses in the City of Upland, an annual Licensing and Inspection fee of \$75,000 (seventy-five thousand dollars) will be due from any dispensary that has been granted a business license and approved for operation by the City of Upland. The initial Licensing and Inspection Fee shall be due within 10 days of the City's approval and issuance of the initial business license to the dispensary. Subsequent annual renewal fees of the Licensing and Inspection Fee shall be due in two installments. For the subsequent annual renewal fee, the first installment of the annual Licensing and Inspection Fee of \$37,500 (thirty-seven thousand five hundred dollars) shall be due February 15th of the calendar year. The second installment of the annual Licensing and Inspection Fee of \$37,500 (thirty-seven thousand five hundred dollars) shall be due on June 31st of the calendar year.

17.158.110 Prompt judicial review

After denial of a Marijuana Dispensary permit application, or the suspension or revocation of a Marijuana Dispensary permit, the applicant or permittee may seek prompt judicial review of such administrative action through the planning commission or city council. If the denial, suspension, or revocation is affirmed upon review, the administrative action shall be promptly reviewed by the court.

17.158.120 Penalties for Violation

A. No person shall violate any provision, or fail to comply with any of the requirements of this chapter. Any person violating any of the provisions or failing to comply with any of the mandatory requirements of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Any person convicted of a misdemeanor under the provisions of this chapter shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000.00. Each such person shall be guilty of a separate offense for each and every day during any portion of which any violation of any provision of this chapter is committed, continued, or permitted by such person and shall be punishable accordingly.

**MEASURE V
TOWN OF APPLE VALLEY**

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE V

This Impartial Analysis of Measure V has been prepared by the Town Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

Under current State law, the Town of Apple Valley is able to issue some forms of public debt for the acquisition, construction, improving, or financing of an enterprise without calling an election and without incurring the costs and delays associated with such an election. The Town is now in the process of acquiring the water system currently owned and operated by Liberty Utilities (Apple Valley Ranchos Water) Corp. ("Apple Valley Water System").

Measure "V" is the result of an initiative petition. On June 28, 2016, the Town Council determined that Measure "V" obtained sufficient petition signatures to qualify under State law and, on July 26, 2016, the Town Council placed it on the November 8, 2016 ballot.

Measure "V" would require the Town to seek voter approval before it may issue over \$10 million in public debt to provide funds for the acquisition, construction, improving, or financing of an enterprise, such as water, storm water, sewer, electricity, or waste disposal. For example, Measure "V" would require the Town to obtain voter approval before it could finance the acquisition of the Apple Valley Water System.

If Measure "V" is approved, the Town has identified the following potential impacts:

- The Town's proposed acquisition of the Apple Valley Water System could be delayed and will likely cost more; and
- Future projects involving enterprises (e.g., water systems, sewer systems, and storm water systems) could be delayed and will likely cost more.

The Town has also identified unresolved legal questions with Measure "V." For example, it imposes the election rules of the Revenue Bond Law of 1941 on all elections required by it regardless of whether they involve bonds or not. Neither Measure "V" nor the Revenue Bond Law of 1941 provide any guidance on how to adapt these rules for other forms of public debt.

FULL TEXT FOR MEASURE V

The people of the Town of Apple Valley do ordain as follows: Chapter 3.35 of Title 3 of the Municipal Code is added to read:

3.35 VOTER APPROVAL PRIOR TO ISSUANCE OF PUBLIC DEBT SECURED BY FEES OR CHARGES ON SERVICES

(a) No ordinance or resolution authorizing the issuance of bonds or other forms of public debt in an amount exceeding ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) to provide funds for the acquisition, construction, improving, or financing of an enterprise, secured by revenues derived from the operation of the enterprise, shall become effective unless approved by the voters, as provided herein.

(b) For purposes of this section:

- (1) The terms "bonds," "enterprise," "charges," and "revenues" shall have the same meaning as provided for the in the Revenue Bond Law of 1941 (Chapter 6 of Division 2 (commencing with section 54300) of the Government Code);
- (2) The term "public debt" includes, but is not limited to, certificates of participation, or public leaseback, secured by revenues derived from the operation of the enterprise, or lease payments made by or to advance the purpose of the enterprise.

(c) The election required shall comply with the provisions of Article 3 of Chapter 6 of Division 2 (commencing with section 54380) of the Government Code.

(d) No ordinance or resolution that authorized the issuance of bonds or public debt that would have been subject to the voter approval requirement of this section, enacted by the council after the date the notice of intent to circulate petitions was filed by the proponents proposing enactment of this section, but before its adoption by the voters, shall be implemented or enforced unless and until the voters approve that ordinance or resolution pursuant to this section.

(e) If any provision of this section, or any part thereof, is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions shall not be affected, but shall remain in full force and effect, and to this end, the provisions of this section are severable.

**MEASURE W
TOWN OF APPLE VALLEY**

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE W

This Impartial Analysis of Measure W has been prepared by the Town Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

On July 26, 2016, the Town Council voted unanimously to place Measure "W" on the November 8, 2016 ballot. Measure "W" is the Council's response to citizen requests for an alternative to Measure "V" and is designed to require voter approval for public debt unless certain safeguards are met. If adopted, Measure "W" will allow the Town to finance the acquisition of the water system currently owned and operated by Liberty Utilities (Apple Valley Ranchos Water) Corp. without the delays and costs of an election if the Town meets certain standards. If the Town cannot meet these standards, the Town must submit the matter to a vote of the people.

Under current State law, the Town of Apple Valley is able to issue some forms of public debt for the acquisition, construction, improving, or financing of an enterprise without calling an election and without incurring the costs and delays associated with such an election.

Measure "W" would generally require voter approval of any Town debt of more than \$5,000,000 where the debt is for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, improving, or financing an enterprise (e.g., water systems, sewer systems, and storm water systems) and the debt is secured against the future revenues of that enterprise with one important exception – it will not apply where the following conditions are satisfied:

- (1) The Council conducts a public hearing prior to issuing the debt;
- (2) The Council certifies (based on financial analysis) that the projected revenues from the enterprise exceed the debt payments proposed;
- (3) The Council certifies that debt will not be paid by the taxing power of the Town; and
- (4) The Council requires an annual independent audit to ensure that the proceeds of the debt are utilized in connection with the enterprise only.

This exception will not apply to revenue bonds or other forms of debt where voter approval is already required under state law.

The measure provides that in the event this measure and another measure relating to the issuance of public debt both pass, then the measure that receives the most votes will prevail over the other measure.

Measure "W" requires simple majority approval to pass.

A "Yes" vote will approve Measure "W."

A "No" vote will not approve Measure "W."

FULL TEXT FOR MEASURE W

PUBLIC SERVICE ENTERPRISE ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY ACT

The People of the Town of Apple Valley do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Title. This measure shall be known and may be cited as "The Public Service Enterprise Accountability and Transparency Act."

SECTION 2. Purpose and Intent. In enacting this measure, the people of the Town of Apple Valley find and declare as follows:

(a) The residents of the Town of Apple Valley currently receive water service from a private water company that operates the Apple Valley Water System.

(b) The Apple Valley Water System is an integrated and independent water system that primarily serves the Town. The Apple Valley Water System is currently owned and operated by Liberty Utilities (Apple Valley Ranchos Water) Corp., a subsidiary of Liberty Utilities Co., which is in turn owned by Canadian power giant Algonquin Power & Utilities Corp.

(c) In response to longstanding public concern about escalating water rates, the significantly higher water rates paid by customers of the Apple Valley Water System as compared to neighboring jurisdictions, the lack of local control over water rates, service, expenditures, and policy, the lack of responsiveness and accountability of the owners to the concerns of ratepayers within the service area, and the lack of transparency in the operation of the Apple Valley Water System, the Town undertook an exhaustive evaluation process to consider the acquisition of the Apple Valley Water System.

(d) After completing the evaluation process, the Town Council decided to proceed with the acquisition of the Apple Valley Water System in order to reduce rates, ensure local control, improve responsiveness, and increase transparency.

(e) In order to finance the acquisition of the Apple Valley Water System, the Town will need to issue debt to be repaid from the fees paid by ratepayers. If the Town decides to issue bonds to repay the debt, state law requires that the voters must approve the bonds. State law does not require voter approval for other forms of debt, however.

(f) An initiative that is intended to make it harder for the Town to acquire the water system has recently qualified for the ballot. The initiative would go much further, however, and require voter approval for any enterprise involving indebtedness over \$10 million if it is to be repaid using fees or revenues.

(g) There is an alternative. Before the Town issues more than \$5 million in debt for the acquisition of the Apple Valley Water System or any other enterprise that provides public services, the Town Council should have to satisfy four conditions to ensure transparency and accountability:

- (1) Hold a public hearing at least ten days before it considers issuing public debt;
- (2) Certify, based on a financial analysis, that the revenues from the enterprise will exceed the cost of repaying the debt;
- (3) Guarantee that the taxpayers of Apple Valley will not be on the hook for the public debt; and

- (4) Conduct an annual, independent audit to assure the residents of Apple Valley that the proceeds of the debt are only being used in connection with the public service enterprise.

(h) If the Town fails to satisfy any of the four conditions, then the debt should only be incurred with voter approval.

SECTION 3. Chapter 3.35 of Title 3 of the Municipal Code is added to read:

"3.35 VOTER APPROVAL PRIOR TO ISSUANCE OF PUBLIC DEBT SECURED BY FEES OR CHARGES ON SERVICES

(a) No ordinance or resolution authorizing the issuance of bonds or other forms of public debt in an amount exceeding five million dollars (\$5,000,000) to provide funds for the acquisition, construction, improvement, or financing of an enterprise, secured by revenues derived from the operation of the enterprise, shall become effective unless approved by the voters, except as provided herein.

(b) For purposes of this Section:

- (1) The terms "bonds", "enterprise", "charges", and "revenues" shall have the same meaning as provided for in the Revenue Bond Law of 1941(Chapter 6, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5, commencing with Section 54300, of the Government Code).
- (2) The term "public debt" includes, but is not limited to, certificates of participation, or public leaseback, secured by the revenues derived from the operation of the enterprise, or lease payments made to advance the purpose of the enterprise.

(c) An ordinance or resolution authorizing the issuance of public debt exceeding five million dollars (\$5,000,000) to provide funds for the acquisition, construction, or improvement of an enterprise, secured by revenues derived from the operation of the enterprise, shall not be subject to voter approval provided that all of the following requirements are satisfied:

- (1) The Council conducts a public hearing on the issuance of the public debt at least ten (10) days before approving an ordinance or resolution authorizing the issuance of the public debt;
- (2) The Council certifies, based on a financial analysis and following a public hearing, that the projected revenues from the enterprise exceed the amount of public debt proposed to be issued;
- (3) The ordinance or resolution specifies that the public debt shall not be secured by the taxing power of the Town; and
- (4) The ordinance or resolution includes a requirement that the Town conduct an annual, independent audit to ensure that the proceeds of the public debt are expended only in connection with the enterprise.

(d) Any election required by this Section shall comply with the provisions of Article 3, Chapter 6, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 (commencing with Section 54380) of the Government Code.

(e) The exception in subdivision (c) shall not apply to any form of indebtedness requiring voter approval under state law."

SECTION 4. Conflicting Law. If this initiative measure and another measure addressing the issuance of public debt by the Town of Apple Valley appear on the same ballot, and a majority of the voters vote in favor of both measures, then the measure receiving more votes shall become valid, binding, and adopted in its entirety, and the other measure shall be null and void in its entirety. The voters expressly declare this to be their intent, regardless of any contrary language in any other ballot measure.

SECTION 5. Severability. This initiative measure shall be interpreted and applied so as to be consistent with all federal and state laws. If any provision of this Act or part thereof, or any application thereof, is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining sections and applications shall not be affected but shall remain in full force and effect, and to this end, the provisions of this initiative measure are severable.

SECTION 6. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be deemed adopted upon the date that the vote is declared by the Council and shall go into effect ten (10) days after that date, as provided in section 9217 of the Elections Code.

MEASURE X
CITY OF VICTORVILLE

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE X

This Impartial Analysis of Measure X has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

Under California law, city councilmembers may be elected using "At-Large" or "By-District" election methods. An At-Large method permits all voters in a city to vote for each city councilmember. A By-District or district-based election method requires that voters elect city councilmembers from specific geographic sections of a city (districts) in which both the voters and the councilmember reside.

However, the California Voting Rights Act ("CVRA") places certain limitations on the At-Large election method. The CVRA prohibits At-Large elections that impair the ability of a protected class to elect preferred candidates or influence the outcome of elections. Changing from an At-Large to a By-District election method can minimize a city's risk of possible legal challenges under the CVRA.

All five City of Victorville ("City") councilmembers are currently elected At-Large, in accordance with Sections 300 and 301 of Article III of the City Charter ("Charter"). In particular, Charter Section 300 requires use of an At-Large election method, and Section 301 specifically prohibits the electing of City councilmembers "'by' districts or 'from' districts." The Charter, which effectively serves as the City's constitution, was adopted by City voters in 2008. Amendments to the Charter likewise require City voter approval.

In order to consider whether district-based elections would be appropriate for the City, Sections 300 and 301 of Article III of the Charter must be amended. The Charter amendment proposed by Measure X amends Article III of the Charter by eliminating Sections 300 and 301.

Although the City's current At-Large election method has not at this point been found to violate California law, Measure X would provide the City with the flexibility to initiate the process to transition from an At-Large to a By-District election method should compliance with the CVRA so require. Measure X does not establish districts, boundaries or any particular voting method; it merely allows the City to move forward with the process.

A "Yes" vote is a vote to amend the City Charter and allow the City to fashion a method of electing its councilmembers consistent with the CVRA and other applicable laws.

A "No" vote would keep the City Charter as is, and City councilmembers would continue to be elected At-Large.

Measure X was placed on the ballot by a vote of the Victorville City Council to address (in part) allegations that the City's current At-Large voting system may violate the CVRA. Measure X will be approved if it receives a simple majority of "Yes" votes from the City's registered voters.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE Y

This Impartial Analysis of Measure Y has been prepared by the Town Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

The Town Council has prepared and is submitting Measure Y to the voters of the Town of Yucca Valley to add a new Chapter 3.26 to the Town's Municipal Code, titled "Temporary Transactions and Use Tax." If approved at the November 8, 2016 election, Measure Y will impose a ½ cent per dollar (0.5%) transaction and use tax for general fund purposes lasting for 10 years. Specifically, Measure Y places a tax of 0.5% upon Town retailers' gross receipts from the retail sale of most tangible personal property sold within the Town for 10 years, and an excise tax upon the storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer for storage, use or other consumption within the Town at a rate of 0.5% for 10 years.

It is estimated that revenues from this tax will be on the order of \$1,500,000 annually. Funds generated by the proposed tax are not restricted and may be used for any Town general fund purposes; but the Town Council has declared certain priorities for use of the tax proceeds, including the following:

- 1) Maintaining neighborhood safety, police patrols and 911 response,
- 2) Maintaining and repairing existing neighborhood streets and alleys,
- 3) Maintaining the Town's quality of life basic programs.

Measure Y includes provisions for the establishment of an independent taxpayers' oversight committee, mandatory financial audits and yearly reports to the community.

As a sales tax, Measure Y will apply to everyone who purchases retail goods within Town limits. Visitors and tourists who visit Yucca Valley will also bear part of the tax burden imposed by their local activities and thus contribute to the Town's ability to maintain roads, sidewalks, parks, police and other general public services that they use while visiting.

The tax would be administered by the California Board of Equalization under contract with the Town of Yucca Valley.

A "YES" vote is a vote to approve a 0.5% retail transactions and use general tax. A "NO" vote is a vote against a 0.5% retail transactions and use general tax. The transactions and use tax in Measure Y would take effect only if it receives a majority "YES" vote at the November 8, 2016 general municipal election. The tax, if approved by the voters, will not be imposed before March 1, 2017.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE Z

This Impartial Analysis of Measure Z has been prepared by the Town Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

The Town Council has prepared and is submitting Measure Z to voters of the Town of Yucca Valley to add a new Chapter 3.28 to the Town's Municipal Code, titled "Sewer Implementation and Assessment Assistance and Transactions and Use Tax." If approved at the general election on November 8, 2016, Measure Z will impose a ½ cent per dollar (0.5%) special transaction and use tax for sewer purposes lasting for 10 years. Specifically, Measure Z places a tax of 0.5% upon retailers' gross receipts from the retail sale of most tangible personal property sold within the Town for 10 years, and an excise tax upon the storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer for storage, use or other consumption within the Town at a rate of 0.5% for 10 years.

Measure Z is a special tax, meaning all proceeds raised by the tax are dedicated to a specific purpose. Measure Z's proceeds would be dedicated to Town-wide sewer implementation, with the specific purpose of lowering sewer project assessments levied on Town citizens through Hi-Desert Water District's Assessment District 2014-1 and subsequent assessment districts formed or annexed in relation thereto. It is estimated that the special tax could reduce Assessment District rates by up-to 30% annually.

It is estimated that Measure Z could generate upwards of \$1,500,000 annually. To assure that Measure Z funds are properly applied to sewer assessments, the Measure includes provisions for an independent taxpayers' oversight committee, mandatory financial audits and yearly public reports.

As a sales tax, Measure Z will apply to everyone who purchases retail goods within the Town of Yucca Valley. Visitors and tourists who visit Yucca Valley will also bear part of the tax burden imposed by their local activities and will thus contribute to the Town's subsidy of sewer costs.

The tax would be administered by the California Board of Equalization under contract with the Town of Yucca Valley.

A "YES" vote is a vote to approve a 0.5% retail transactions and use special tax for sewer purposes. A "NO" vote is a vote against a 0.5% retail transactions and use special tax for sewer purposes. The special tax would take effect only if it receives a two-thirds (2/3) vote of "YES" at the November 8, 2016 municipal election. Measure Z, if voter approved, will not be imposed before March 1, 2017.

Notice To Voters

Residency Confirmation Procedure

Pursuant to California Elections Code Section 2224, following the November 8, 2016 Presidential General Election, registered voters who have not voted nor had their registrations updated during the last four (4) years will be mailed a postcard notice to confirm their residency. The postcard shall read as follows:

IMPORTANT VOTER NOTICE

You have not voted in the past four years which may indicate that you may no longer live in San Bernardino County.

- **If you still live in San Bernardino County**, please confirm your address by filling out and returning the attached postcard, or by calling us at (800) 881-VOTE.
 - If you do not confirm your address, you will not receive election materials in the mail and you may be required to provide proof of your residence address in order to vote in future elections.
- **If you no longer live in San Bernardino County**, please re-register to vote at www.registertovote.ca.gov in order to vote in future elections.
 - You may also obtain a registration form by calling your county elections office or the Secretary of State's Office.
- **If the person named on the postcard does not live at this address**, please help keep the voter rolls current and save taxpayer dollars by filling out and returning the attached postcard.

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
