Welcome to this newly redesigned San Bernardino County Voter Information Guide (VIG) that explains how, when, and where to vote for the 2022 General Election on November 8. As a result of your valuable feedback, we have increased the overall size to more accurately show the sample ballot for the election and made the text size larger for easier reading.

Sample ballot pages are created from images of official ballot cards. Given the number of candidates in some contests, they may span multiple pages. In these cases, you can follow the list of candidates from each column to the corresponding column on the next page (see below).

You can vote by mail by mailing your voted ballot using the U.S. Postal Service. The postage is free. Or, you can drop that same voted ballot at an Early Vote Site or in one of the more than 70 Mail Ballot Drop-Off locations across the county. To find an Early Vote Site or Mail Ballot Drop-Off location near you, visit **SBCountyElections.com**. Polling places will be open on Election Day Tuesday, November 8. Your polling place location is provided on the back cover of this guide. Since polling places may have significant wait lines on Election Day, I encourage you to vote before November 8.

Marking your official ballot

1. To vote, use only **Blue** or **Black** ink pen or marker. Completely fill in the oval voting target \bigcirc to the left of your choice like this: \bigcirc NO RED INK.



- 2. To vote for a candidate for Chief Justice of California; Associate Justice of the Supreme Court; Presiding Justice, Court of Appeal; or Associate Justice, Court of Appeal, completely fill in the oval voting target to the left of the word **"YES"**. To vote against that candidate, completely fill in the oval voting target to the left of the word **"NO"**.
- 3. To vote for a candidate whose name appears on the ballot, completely fill in the oval voting target to the left of the candidate's name. Where two or more candidates for the same office are to be elected, completely fill in the oval voting targets to the left of the names of all candidates for the office for whom you desire to vote. Do not vote for more candidates than the number indicated for each office.
- 4. To vote for a qualified write-in candidate, write the person's name in the blank space provided for that purpose after the names of the other candidates for the same office.
- 5. To vote on any measure, completely fill in the oval voting target to the left of the word **"YES"** or to the left of the word **"NO"**.
- 6. Marking the ballot outside of the designated space to vote for a candidate or measure may compromise the secrecy of the ballot.
- 7. If you make a mistake or damage your ballot, request a replacement ballot.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF BOND MEASURE A

This Impartial Analysis of Bond Measure A has been prepared by County Counsel pursuant to Section 9500 of the California Elections Code.

This Measure was placed on the ballot by a resolution adopted by the Board of Education of the Rialto Unified School District. A "yes" vote by at least fifty-five percent of the voters voting on this measure will authorize the District to issue bonds to benefit the District in the amount of \$340,000,000. A "no" vote means that the District will not be authorized to issue and sell the \$340,000,000 in bonds set forth in the measure.

The District's Resolution No. 22-23-02 was adopted pursuant to California Education Code sections 5304, 5322, 15100 et seq., and 15266, and paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Section 1 of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution and subdivision (b) of Section 18 of Article XVI of the California Constitution. The bond proceeds may only be used for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses. The Bond Project List attached as Exhibit A to the full text of the Measure provides for the specific projects the District proposes to finance with proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this ballot Measure and such proceeds may only be applied to those specific projects.

The District will conduct financial and performance audits annually to ensure that bond proceeds are spent only on the school facility projects listed in Exhibit A and will appoint an independent citizens' oversight committee to enforce the restrictions of Education Code section 15278 et seq.

Information regarding the estimated tax rate to repay these bonds is found in the "Tax Information Statement" prepared by the District, attached as Exhibit B to the full text of the Measure. The projected tax rate is based on projections and estimates from official sources and are not binding upon the District.

The bonded debt will be a general obligation of the District and will be financed by taxes levied annually on taxable property located within the District.

TAX RATE STATEMENT FOR BOND MEASURE A

An election will be held in the Rialto Unified School District (the "District") on November 8, 2022, to authorize the sale of up to \$340,000,000 in bonds of the District to finance school facilities as described in the proposition. If the bond proposition is approved by at least 55% of the voters of the District voting on the bond proposition, the District expects to issue the bonds in multiple series over time. Principal and interest on the bonds will be payable from the proceeds of tax levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400 through 9405 of the California Elections Code.

1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is 5.412 cents per \$100 (\$54.12 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation. The final fiscal year in which the tax to be levied to fund this bond issue is anticipated to be collected is fiscal year 2059-60.

2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is 5.982 cents per \$100 (\$59.82 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2032-33 and such tax rate is expected to continue through fiscal year 2033-34.

3. The best estimate of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all of the bonds are issued and sold is approximately \$636,256,576.

Voters should note that estimated tax rates are based on the ASSESSED VALUE of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls, <u>not</u> on the property's market value, which could be more or less than the assessed value. In addition, taxpayers eligible for a property tax exemption, such as the homeowner's exemption, will be taxed at a lower effective tax rate than described above. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon the District's projections and estimates only, which are not binding upon the District. The average annual tax rate, the highest tax rate, the final fiscal year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected and the year or years in which they will apply, and the actual total debt service, may vary from those presently estimated for a variety of reasons, including, without limitation, due to variations in the timing of bond sales, the amount or amortization of bonds sold, market conditions at the time of each sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The dates of sale and the amount or amortization of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on need for project funds and other factors, including the legal limitations on bonds approved by a 55% affirmative vote. Market conditions, including, without limitation, interest rates, are affected by economic and other factors beyond the control of the District and will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process. The growth or decline in assessed valuation is the result of a number of economic and other factors outside the control of the District.

FULL TEXT FOR BOND MEASURE A

RIALTO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT CLASSROOM UPGRADE/HEALTH/SAFETY MEASURE

This proposition may be known and referred to as the "Rialto Unified School District Classroom Upgrade/Health/Safety Measure" or as "Measure A".

BOND AUTHORIZATION

By approval of this proposition by at least 55% of the voters of the Rialto Unified School District (the "District") voting on the proposition, the District shall be authorized to issue and sell bonds of up to \$340,000,000 in aggregate principal amount to provide financing for the specific school facilities projects listed under the heading entitled "BOND PROJECT LIST" below (the "Bond Project List"), and qualify to receive State of California matching grant funds, subject to all of the accountability safeguards specified below.

ACCOUNTABILITY SAFEGUARDS

The provisions in this section are specifically included in this proposition in order that the voters and taxpayers of the District may be assured that their money will be spent to address specific school facilities needs of the District, all in compliance with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution, and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Sections 15264 and following of the California Education Code).

Evaluation of Needs. The Board of Education of the District (the "Board") has evaluated the facilities needs of the District in order to determine which projects to finance from a local bond at this time. In order to address the facilities needs of the District, the Board deems it necessary and advisable to fund the specific school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List. The Board hereby certifies that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction and information technology needs in developing the Bond Project List.

Limitations on Use of Bonds. Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses. More specifically, the Bond Project List provides for the specific projects the District proposes to finance with proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition and such proceeds shall be applied only to those specific purposes.

Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee. In accordance with and pursuant to California Education Code Section 15278 *et seq.*, the Board shall establish an independent citizens' oversight committee, within 60 days of the date that the Board enters the election results on its minutes pursuant to Section 15274 of the California Education Code, to ensure that (a) bond revenues are expended only for the purposes specified in Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution, and (b) that no funds are used for any teacher or administrative salaries or other school operating expenses. In accordance with Section 15282 of the California Education Code, the citizens' oversight committee shall consist of at least seven members and shall include a member active in a business organization representing the business community located within the District, a member active in a senior citizens' organization, a member active in a bona fide taxpayers' organization, a member that is a parent or guardian of a child enrolled in the District and active in a parent-teacher organization. No employee or official of the District and no vendor, contractor or consultant of the District shall be appointed to the citizens' oversight committee.

Annual Performance Audits. In compliance with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3)(C) of the California Constitution, and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000, the Board shall conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition have been expended only on the school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List. These audits shall be conducted in accordance with the Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States for performance audits. The results of these audits shall be made publicly available and shall be submitted to the citizens' oversight committee in accordance with Section 15286 of the California Education Code.

Annual Financial Audits. In compliance with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3)(D) of the California Constitution, and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000, the Board shall conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition until all of those proceeds have been spent for the school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List. These audits shall be conducted in accordance with the Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States for financial audits. The results of these audits shall be made publicly available and shall be submitted to the citizens' oversight committee in accordance with Section 15286 of the California Education Code.

<u>Special Bond Proceeds Account; Annual Report to Board</u>. In compliance with the requirements of California Government Code Section 53410 and following, upon approval of this proposition and the sale of any bonds approved, the Board shall take actions necessary to establish an account in which proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition shall be deposited. In compliance with the requirements of California Government Code Section 53411, as long as any proceeds of the bonds remain unexpended, the chief fiscal officer of the District shall cause a report to be filed with the Board at least once a year, stating (a) the amount of funds collected and expended in that year, and (b) the status of any project required or authorized to be funded from bond proceeds. The report may relate to the calendar year, fiscal year, or other appropriate annual period as the chief fiscal officer of the District shall determine, and may be incorporated into the annual budget, audit, or other appropriate routine report to the Board.

FURTHER SPECIFICATIONS

Single Purpose. All of the purposes enumerated in this proposition shall be united and voted upon as one single proposition, pursuant to California Education Code Section 15100, and all the enumerated purposes shall constitute the specific single purpose of the bonds, and the proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition shall be spent only for such purpose, pursuant to California Government Code Section 53410.

Bonds may be Issued in Excess of Statutory Bonding Limit. Issuance of all of the authorized bonds might require the outstanding debt of the District to exceed its statutory bonding limit (currently 2.50% of the total assessed valuation of taxable property in the District). In that event, the District intends to seek a waiver of its bonding limit from the State Board of Education, which has the power to waive certain requirements of the California Education Code applicable to the District. By approval of this proposition, the voters have authorized the District to seek such a waiver, and to issue authorized bonds in excess of the District's statutory bonding limit as the State Board of Education may approve. No such waiver has yet been sought or granted.

<u>Other Terms of the Bonds</u>. When sold, the bonds shall bear interest at an annual rate not exceeding the statutory maximum, and that interest shall be made payable at the time or times permitted by law. The bonds may be issued and sold in several series, and no bond shall be made to mature more than the statutory maximum number of years from the date borne by that bond.

ESTIMATED BALLOT INFORMATION

The District is required by law to include in the statement of the bond proposition to be voted on estimates of the amount of money to be raised annually to repay the bonds and the rate and duration of the tax to be levied for the bonds. As of the time this proposition was placed on the ballot, the District estimated an average tax rate of approximately 6 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation (annual repayment amount averaging \$16,314,271) while the bonds are outstanding (estimated to be approximately 39 years). Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that such information is based upon the District's projections and estimates only, which are not binding upon the District. The amount of money to be raised annually and the rate and duration of the tax to be levied for the bonds may vary from those presently estimated due to variations from these estimates in the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold and market interest rates at the time of each sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The dates of sale and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on need for project funds and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

BOND PROJECT LIST

The Bond Project List below lists the specific projects the District proposes to finance with proceeds of the bonds. The Bond Project List shall be considered a part of this bond proposition and shall be reproduced in any official document required to contain the full statement of the bond proposition. Listed projects will be completed as needed at a particular school or school facility site according to Board-established priorities, and the order in which such projects appear on the Bond Project List is not an indication of priority for funding or completion. In so far as permitted by law, each project is assumed to include its share of costs of the election and bond issuance, construction-related costs, such as project and construction management, architectural, engineering, inspection and similar planning and testing costs, demolition and interim housing costs, legal, accounting and similar fees, costs related to the independent annual financial and performance audits, a contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs, and other costs incidental to or necessary for completion of the listed projects (whether the related work is performed by the District or third parties). The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized, construction bids are awarded, and projects are completed. In addition, certain project funds expected from non-local bond sources, including State of California grant funds for eligible projects, have not yet been secured. Therefore, the Board cannot guarantee that the bond proceeds will provide sufficient funds to allow completion of all listed projects. Alternatively, if the District obtains unexpected funds from non-local bond sources with respect to listed projects, such projects may be enhanced, supplemented or expanded to the extent of such funds. Some projects may be subject to further government approvals, including by State officials and boards and/or local environmental or agency approval. Inclusion of a project on the Bond Project List is not a guarantee that the project will be completed (regardless of whether bond funds are available).

SAFETY, SECURITY AND HEALTH PROJECTS

- Acquire, replace, upgrade and/or install safety and security systems, including lighting, fencing, smoke detectors, fire alarms, sprinklers, security alarms, signage, safety doors, safety locks and hardware, cameras and emergency communication systems.
- Improve, upgrade, construct and/or re-configure entryways and exits, perimeter fencing, and controlled access points at school campuses.

- Renovate, repair, resurface, upgrade, expand, construct and/or install and improve paved and other hard surfaces, playgrounds, playfields and landscaping, and acquire, improve, replace and/or upgrade playground and student recreational equipment and fixtures.

21ST CENTURY LEARNING AND INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY PROJECTS

- Acquire, install and upgrade technology equipment, fixtures and infrastructure, including interactive educational technology and projection systems, computers, tablets, laptops, printers, scanners, digital projectors and cameras, audio systems, video systems, phone and sound projections systems, peripherals, smart boards, education software, telecommunications software, security software, monitors, network equipment (including servers, network interface devices, network switches and routers, wireless network equipment, firewalls, network security equipment, racking, power and cooling equipment, wiring and uninterruptible power supplies); furnishing and equipping shall include initial purchases, and scheduled and necessary replacements, upgrades and updating of technology.
- Rehabilitate and replace such technology equipment, fixtures and infrastructure as needed in the future as well as acquire, install and upgrade technology equipment, fixtures and infrastructure developed in the future.
- Renovate, replace, upgrade, acquire, install and integrate electrical (including wiring and related infrastructure for modern technology) and data systems, equipment, power sources and supplies and related technology infrastructure.
- Renovate, reconfigure and/or upgrade school facilities as needed to install or accommodate new technology and equipment systems.
- Improve, upgrade, renovate, install and/or construct and equip classroom and lab facilities and related support facilities, including for career technical education and student job training.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS, CLASSROOM AND SUPPORT FACILITIES, AND CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION FACILITIES PROJECTS

- Improve, upgrade, renovate, and/or construct and install classroom and lab facilities and related support facilities, including such facilities needed to support the career technical education requirements for student job training, career placement, and college preparation.
- Renovate, rehabilitate, re-configure, replace, expand, upgrade and/or construct portable and permanent classrooms, classroom buildings, labs and school support facilities, including interior and exterior doors, windows, door and window hardware, roofs, rain gutters and downspouts, walls, marker boards, ceilings and floors and finishes, paint, siding, insulation, casework, cabinets, carpets, drapes, window coverings, lighting, sinks, fixtures, signage, fencing, furniture and equipment.
- Improve, upgrade, replace, expand, and/or construct student playgrounds, athletic fields, stadiums, aquatic facilities, gymnasiums, multipurpose rooms, and related facilities and equipment, including student recreational and athletic equipment, lighting, and locker-room facilities.
- Acquire and install and/or replace heating, ventilation and air conditioning and lighting systems.
- Furnish and equip school facilities; furnishing and equipping shall include initial purchases, and scheduled and necessary replacements, upgrades and updating of technology.
- Acquire sites and construct new school facilities, including facilities needed to accommodate future development or changes in educational programs.
- Upgrade, expand and/or construct community engagement facilities.
- Renovate, repair, upgrade, expand, construct and equip central kitchen and school site kitchen facilities.
- Improve, upgrade, renovate, and/or construct visual and performing arts facilities, including performing arts centers and auditoriums.
- Acquire sites and construct early education school facilities, including facilities needed to support transitional kindergarten and full day kindergarten education programs.
- Renovate, re-configure, replace, expand, upgrade and/or construct transportation support facilities and warehouse facilities, including facilities for maintenance and storage.

All listed bond projects include the following as needed:

- Planning, designing and providing temporary housing necessary for listed bond projects.
- The inspection, sampling and analysis of grounds, buildings and building materials to determine the presence of hazardous materials or substances, including asbestos, lead, etc., and the encapsulation, removal, disposal and other remediation or control of such hazardous materials and substances.
- Seismic and historical evaluations, site surveys (including topographic, geological and utility surveys), and infrastructure analyses.
- Necessary onsite and offsite preparation or restoration in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable buildings or other temporary buildings, including demolition of structures; removing, replacing, or installing irrigation, drainage, utility lines (gas, water, sewer, electrical, data and voice, etc.), trees and landscaping; and relocating fire access roads or ingress/egress pathways.
- Address other unforeseen conditions revealed by construction, renovation or modernization (including plumbing or gas line breaks, dry rot, seismic and structural deficiencies, etc.).

- Acquire or construct other improvements required to comply with building codes, including seismic safety requirements, the Field Act, and access requirements.
- Acquisition of any rights-of-way, easements, licenses and/or real property made necessary by listed bond projects, or lease of real property made necessary by the listed bond projects.
- Acquire or construct storage facilities and other space on an interim basis, as needed to accommodate construction materials, equipment, and personnel.
- Furnishing and equipping of classrooms and other school facilities; furnishing and equipping shall include initial purchases, and scheduled and necessary replacements, upgrades and updating of technology.
- Acquisition of all or a portion of any school site or facility, or an interest therein, or make lease payments with respect to any school site or facility, encumbered in order to finance or refinance the listed school facilities projects.
- All other costs and work necessary or incidental to the listed bond projects.

PROJECTS INVOLVING RENOVATION, REHABILITATION OR REPAIR

For any project involving renovation, rehabilitation or repair of a building or the major portion of a building, the District shall be authorized to proceed with new replacement construction instead (including any necessary demolition) if the Board of Education determines that replacement new construction is more practical than renovation, rehabilitation or repair, considering the building's age, condition, expected remaining life, comparative cost and other relevant factors.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Interpretation. The terms of this bond proposition and the words used in the Bond Project List shall be interpreted broadly to effect the purpose of providing broad and clear authority for the officers and employees of the District to provide for the school facilities projects the District proposes to finance with the proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition within the authority provided by law, including Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution, California Education Code Section 15000 *et seq.* and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, such words as repair, improve, upgrade, expand, modernize, renovate, and reconfigure are used in the Bond Project List to describe school facilities projects in plain English and are not intended to expand the nature of such projects beyond, or have an effect on, and shall be interpreted to only permit, what is authorized under Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Education Code Section 15000 *et seq.* and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000. In this regard, the Bond Project List does not authorize, and shall not be interpreted to authorize, expending proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition for current maintenance, operation or repairs. The school facilities projects on the Bond Project List only authorize capital expenditures.

<u>Headings</u>. The headings or titles of the sections of the bond proposition, including any headings or titles included in the Bond Project List, are solely for convenience of reference and shall not affect the meaning, construction or effect of the bond proposition.

<u>Severability</u>. The Board hereby declares, and the voters by approving this bond proposition concur, that every section and part of this bond proposition has independent value, and the Board and the voters would have adopted each provision hereof regardless of every other provision hereof. Upon approval of this bond proposition by the voters, should any part be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid for any reason, all remaining parts hereof shall remain in full force and effect to the fullest extent allowed by law, and to this end the provisions of this bond proposition are severable.

STATEMENT REQUIRED UNDER EDUCATION CODE 15122.5

Approval of Measure A does not guarantee that the proposed project or projects in the Rialto Unified School District that are the subject of bonds under Measure A will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by Measure A. The District's proposal for the project or projects may assume the receipt of matching State funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure.

MEASURE D COUNTY OF SAN BERNARDINO

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE D

This Impartial Analysis of Measure D has been prepared by County Counsel pursuant to Section 9160 of the California Elections Code.

This Measure would amend the San Bernardino County Charter to add section 207 to Article II. Section 207 would require that before any tax increase could be imposed by the County (1) the Board of Supervisors (Board) must approve the proposed tax increase by a 4/5ths vote of the Board, and (2) the proposed tax increase must be placed on the ballot at the next statewide general election and approved by the voters. These requirements also apply when the Board is acting as the governing body of a Board-governed Special District, the San Bernardino County Fire Protection District or the San Bernardino County Flood Control District. If a tax is proposed by property owners these requirements do not apply.

This Measure would also amend Charter section 204 to revise the timing for the limit on Supervisors serving three fouryear terms. Any term served prior to January 2, 2023 for the Second and Fourth Districts and prior to January 6, 2025 for the First, Third and Fifth Districts would not count for purposes of the term limits.

This Measure would amend Section 209 of Article II of the County Charter to state that any increase in salary for a Board member shall only become effective after there has been an election for any member of the Board. The County Charter sets the total compensation for each member of the Board at an annual base salary that is equal to 80% of the annual base salary received by Judges of the Superior Court of San Bernardino County, and provides, to the extent legally permissible, that the Supervisors receive the regular benefits that are offered to Exempt Group employees in the benefits category for department heads.

This Measure was placed on the ballot by an ordinance adopted by the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors.

If the proposed Charter Amendments in this Measure are approved by the voters, they would replace the provisions in Measure "K". Measure "K," which was approved by the voters on November 3, 2020, was found unconstitutional by the San Bernardino Superior Court in Board v. Monell (Case No. CIVSB2025319). The Court's ruling has been appealed and as of August 22, 2022, there is no final decision on the appeal. Measure "K" would amend the County Charter to limit each Supervisor to one four-year term. Measure "K" would set total compensation for each Supervisor at \$5,000 per month. This compensation amount would include the actual cost to the County of all benefits including, but not limited to salary, allowances, credit cards, health insurance, life insurance, leave, retirement, memberships, portable communication devices, and vehicle allowances.

A yes vote on this Measure requires that before any tax increase could be imposed by the County (1) the Board must approve the proposed tax increase by a 4/5ths vote, and (2) the proposed tax increase must be placed on the ballot for a vote. The Measure revises the timing for the limit on Supervisors serving three four-year terms and sets a Supervisor's salary equal to 80% of a Judge's salary, plus benefits.

A no vote on this Measure will keep the County Charter as it is currently written, including any voter approved amendments to the County Charter found constitutional by the courts.

ATTACHMENT "A" MEASURE "D" TAXPAYER PROTECTION AND GOVERNMENT REFORM

Section I. Statement of Purpose

The purpose of this measure is to prohibit the elected Board of Supervisors of San Bernardino County from increasing taxes without a vote of the people, prevent elected County Supervisors from voting to increase their salary, and facilitate effective representation in county government.

Section II. Charter Amendment

A. Article II of the Charter of San Bernardino County is hereby amended as follows (with new language underlined and repealed language in strikeout text):

Article II: Board of Supervisors

Section 201. Governing Body.

The Board of Supervisors is the governing body of San Bernardino County. The Board of Supervisors shall consist of five persons, hereafter identified as Members or Supervisors.

Section 202. Election.

Supervisors shall be elected by Supervisorial District. Each candidate for the office of <u>County</u> Supervisor shall be an elector in the District which the candidate seeks to represent and shall be elected by the electors of such District. Except as otherwise provided in this Charter, candidates shall be nominated and elected pursuant to the general law. The five Supervisorial Districts shall be apportioned by ordinance pursuant to the general law and this Charter. A <u>County</u> Supervisor must reside in his or her District during the Supervisor's incumbency.

Section 203. Term of Office.

At each general election, there shall be elected two or three Supervisors, as the case may be, for a term of four years beginning at noon on the first Monday after the first day of January next following their election and ending at noon on the first Monday after the first day of January four years thereafter. Supervisors shall be elected from the First, Third, and Fifth Supervisorial Districts in those years in which a presidential election is held, and Supervisors shall be elected from the Second and Fourth Supervisorial Districts in those years in which a gubernatorial election is held.

However, the term for the <u>County</u> Supervisors elected from the First, Third, and Fifth Supervisorial Districts on either March 3, 2020, or November 3, 2020, shall commence at noon on Monday, December, 7, 2020, and end at noon on Monday, January 6, 2025. The term for the <u>County</u> Supervisors elected from the Second and Fourth Supervisorial Districts on either June 5, 2018, or November 6, 2018, shall end at noon on Monday, January 2, 2023.

Section 204. Term Limits.

No person may serve for more than three terms as <u>County</u> Supervisor, regardless of the District represented. <u>For the</u> <u>First, Third, and Fifth Supervisorial Districts, any term or portion of a term served prior to noon on Monday, January 6,</u> 2025, shall not count toward the term limit. For the Second and Fourth Supervisorial Districts, any term or portion of a term served prior to noon on Monday, January 2, 2023, shall not count toward the term limit. For the First, Third and Fifth Supervisorial Districts, after noon on Monday, January 6, 2025, and for the Second and Fourth Supervisorial Districts, after noon on Monday, January 2, 2023, anyAny County Supervisor who serves more than one-half of a term, either through election or appointment, shall be deemed for purposes of this section to have served a full term. For the First, Third and Fifth Supervisorial Districts, after noon on Monday, January 2, 2023, anyAny County</u> Supervisor who resigns or is removed from office with less than one-half of a term remaining shall be deemed for purposes of this section to have served a full term. This section shall only apply to those Supervisors who are first elected to the Board of Supervisors after the effective date of this section, and who have not previously served on the Board of Supervisors. Members of the Board of Supervisors who were elected before the effective date of this section may serve only the number of terms allowed at the time of the last election before the effective date of this section.

Section 205. Chair and Vice Chair of the Board of Supervisors.

The Board of Supervisors shall elect from among its Members a Chair and a Vice Chair of the Board of Supervisors. The election, term of office, duties, and removal of the Chair and Vice Chair shall be provided for by ordinance, resolution, or policy of the Board of Supervisors.

Section 206. Powers and Duties of the Board of Supervisors.

The Board of Supervisors has all the powers granted to it by the Constitution of California, the general law, and this Charter. The Board of Supervisors shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as are required by the Constitution of California, this Charter, and ordinance, and by the general law except as otherwise provided in the Constitution of California, this Charter, and any ordinance adopted pursuant to this Charter.

Given the size and complexity of San Bernardino County, the <u>elected</u> office of <u>County</u> Supervisor is recognized as a position that requires a considerable investment of time and due diligence from Board Members in order to effectively fulfill their duties in service to the public. These duties include but are not limited to: ensuring fiscal responsibility; representing the interest of the public during public meetings and hearings of the Board of Supervisors; participating in the response to natural disasters and other emergencies; conducting meetings with members of the public; ensuring that the County is effectively represented with respect to federal, state, and other local government agencies; and reviewing issues impacting the County and its residents, businesses, built and natural environment, and health and safety. The <u>elected</u> position of <u>County</u> Supervisor requires Supervisors to be responsive to the needs of the public on a 24 hours a day, seven days a week basis.

Furthermore, Members of the Board of Supervisors also have duties with respect to, and must attend the meetings of, many other public entities and other entities. Each member of the Board of Supervisors shall serve on such public entity or other entity governing boards, commissions and committees, as designated by or appointed in accordance with, and perform such duties as are required by, the Constitution of California, this Charter, general law, ordinance, or contract, as may be amended from time to time. Such public entities and other entity governing boards, commissions, and committees include, without limitation, as of <u>August 1, 2022</u> July 28, 2020, the following:

Section 207. Limitations on Taxing Authority.

Any tax increase passed by the Board of Supervisors must be approved by a 4/5's vote of the Board of Supervisors and be placed on the ballot at the next available statewide general election, following the timelines in the Elections Code, for approval by qualified voters. Additionally, the Board of Supervisors, when acting as the governing body of a Board-governed Special District, the San Bernardino County Fire Protection District, or the San Bernardino County Flood Control District must approve any tax increase by a 4/5's vote and place the tax increase on the ballot at the next available statewide general election, under the timelines in the Elections Code, for approval by qualified voters. If a tax is proposed by property owners this section does not apply.

Section 2087. Filling of Vacancies.

If there is a vacancy in the office of <u>County</u> Supervisor, the remaining Members of the Board of Supervisors shall within 60 days of the effective date of the vacancy either appoint a replacement Supervisor or call a special election. The appointee shall be from among the qualified electors of the Supervisorial District in which such vacancy exists. Nomination and election of a Supervisor shall be by district as provided in Section 202.

If the effective date of the appointment is no less than 130 days from the statewide general election in November of an even-numbered mid-term year of the vacant office, the appointment is provisional to the first Monday after the first day of January next following the election. When making the appointment, the remaining Members of the Board of Supervisors shall call for a special election for this office for the remaining term and shall order the special election to be consolidated with such statewide general election. The special election shall be a single-winner election. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes is elected.

If the effective date of the appointment is less than 130 days from the statewide general election in November of an even-numbered mid-term year of the vacant office, then the appointee shall serve the remainder of the term of the office.

If the remaining Members of the Board of Supervisors do not make an appointment and instead call a special election, the special election shall be held on the next established election date, as defined in Division 1 (commencing with Section 1000) of the Elections Code, that is no less than 130 days from the date that the special election is called. When calling a special election to be held on the next established election date that is no less than 130 days from the date that the election is called, the remaining members of the Board of Supervisors may authorize the election to be conducted wholly by mail, provided that the special election is not held on the same date as a statewide primary or general election or is not consolidated, as defined in Elections Code section 10400, with any other election. The special election shall be a single-winner election. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes is elected.

If the remaining Members of the Board of Supervisors do not make an appointment or call a special election within 60 days of the effective date of the vacancy, then a special election shall be held to fill the vacancy. The special election shall be held on the next established election date, as defined in Division 1 (commencing with Section 1000) of the Elections Code, that is no less than 130 days from the 60th day after the effective date of the vacancy. In the discretion of the Register of Voters, the special election to be held on the next established election date that is no less than 130 days from the 60th day after the vacancy may be conducted wholly by mail, provided that the special election is not held on the same date as a statewide primary or general election or is not consolidated, as defined in Elections Code section 10400, with any other election. The special election shall be a single-winner election. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes is elected.

If an election is required pursuant to this section and the date of such election as required by one of the preceding paragraphs of this section would be less than 180 days from the statewide primary election applicable to the Supervisorial District as set forth in Section 203, then notwithstanding such preceding paragraph, the regular nomination and election process shall be followed pursuant to Sections 202, 203, and 204.

Section 20<u>9</u>8. Compensation of the Board of Supervisors.

Members of the Board of Supervisors shall be paid an annual base salary that is equal to 80 percent of the annual base salary prescribed by law for Judges of the Superior Court of San Bernardino County, and shall be provided, to the extent legally permissible, the regular benefits that are offered to Exempt Group employees in the benefits category for department heads as provided by ordinance.

Thereafter, the annual base salary of the Members of the Board of Supervisors shall be changed at such times and in such percentages as changes made by law to the Judges of the Superior Court of San Bernardino County, except as otherwise provided in this paragraph. Any increase in the salary of the Members of the Board of Supervisors pursuant to this paragraph shall <u>only</u> become effective <u>after there has been an election for any member of the Board of</u> <u>Supervisors. only if such increase is ratified pursuant to an ordinance that is introduced at a noticed public hearing and is thereafter approved. The Board of Supervisors may approve a salary increase that is less than the amount permitted under this paragraph.</u>

Thereafter, the benefits provided to the Members of the Board of Supervisors shall be changed at such times and in such amounts as changes made to Exempt Group employees in the benefits category for department heads as provided by ordinance, except as otherwise provided in this paragraph. Any increase in the benefits of the Members of the Board of Supervisors pursuant to this paragraph shall <u>only</u> become effective <u>after there has been an election for</u> <u>any member of the Board of Supervisors.</u> only if such increase is ratified pursuant to an ordinance that is introduced at a noticed public hearing and is thereafter approved. The Board of Supervisors may approve a benefit increase that is less than the benefit increase permitted under this paragraph.

The salary and benefits that members of the Board of Supervisors are eligible to receive shall be posted on the County website and accessible from a link located on the home page of the County website.

This section shall only apply to those Supervisors who are elected to the Board of Supervisors after the effective date of this section.

Section 2<u>1009</u>. Staff Members of the Board of Supervisors.

The staff members of the Board of Supervisors shall serve in the unclassified service at the pleasure of the Board of Supervisors. The terms and conditions of employment of such staff members shall be established by contract approved by the Board of Supervisors. A contract for any such staff members may be terminated without cause, by the individual employing Supervisor or by action of the Board of Supervisors by four votes.

Section 2110. Removal of a Supervisor.

Any Supervisor may be removed from office in the manner provided by law.

Section 2124. Rules of Order.

The Board of Supervisors shall adopt by ordinance, from time to time, rules of order for the conduct of meetings of the Board of Supervisors.

SECTION III. Information regarding Measure "K" which was approved by the voters on November 3, 2020 but has not taken effect.

A. Measure "K" was found unconstitutional by the San Bernardino County Superior Court in *Board of Supervisors v. Monell* (Case No.: CIVSB2025319). The case is currently on appeal and as of July 26, 2022, there is no final decision on the appeal.

- B. Measure "K" seeks to amend the San Bernardino County Charter to include the following language:
 - i. "At each general election, there shall be elected two or three supervisors, as the case may be, for a term of four years beginning at noon on the first Monday in December next following their election and ending at noon on the first Monday in December four years thereafter. Supervisors shall be elected from the First, Third, and Fifth Supervisorial Districts in those years in which a presidential election is held, and supervisors shall be elected from the Second and Fourth Supervisorial Districts in those years in which a gubernatorial election is held. No person shall be elected and qualified for the office of member of the Board of Supervisors if such person has been elected or served in such office for one term. This shall apply to all Supervisors of all Districts beginning in December 2020. The limitation on terms shall not apply to any unexpired term to which a person is elected or appointed if the remainder of the unexpired term to which a person is elected or appointed if the full four-year term of office."
 - "The total compensation of each member of the Board of Supervisors shall be five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) per month, which amount shall include the actual cost to the County of all benefits of whatever kind or nature including but not limited to salary, allowances, credit cards, health insurance, life insurance, leave, retirement, memberships, portable communications devices, and vehicle allowances. This compensation shall be in full compensation for all services by the respective member of the Board of Supervisors. The forgoing compensation provisions shall not be changed except by a vote of the people at the time of a general election."
- C. If the proposed Charter Amendments in Section II of this Measure are approved, they would replace the provisions contained in Measure "K".

SECTION IV. Effective Date

- A. To the extent permitted by law, the provision of these Charter Amendments shall be effective upon voter approval of the initiative as provided by California law.
- B. On the effective date of this measure as provided by California law (the "Effective Date"), all provision of this amendment are inserted into and become part of the San Bernardino County Code of Ordinances.
- C. No provision of the San Bernardino County Code of Ordinances that is inconsistent with this measure shall be enforced after the Effective Date.

SECTION V. Severability

If any word or words of this measure, or its application to any situation, are held invalid or unenforceable, in a final judgment that is no longer subject to rehearing, review, or appeal by a court of competent jurisdiction, then that word or those words are severed and the remaining part of this measure, and the application of any part of this measure to other situations, shall continue in full force and effect. We, the people of San Bernardino County, declare that we would have adopted this measure, and each word to it, irrespective of the fact that any other condition, word, or application to any situation, be held invalid.

SECTION VI. Determining Consistency

- A. To ensure that the intent of this measure prevails and is subject to express, objective standards that cannot be changed through subsequent discretionary actions or interpretations, words shall be incorporated according to the intent expressed in this measure and shall be applied in accordance with their plain meaning, rather than according to any contrary provisions or interpretation of the Charter of San Bernardino County.
- B. Adoption of this measure is essential to the preservation of the quality of life, property, values, and the health, safety, and general welfare interests of residents and property owners within San Bernardino County.

SECTION VII. Conflicting Measures

If any measure, appearing on a future ballot, addresses the issues of Supervisor terms or Supervisor compensation, in a way that conflicts with the treatment of these subjects in this measure, and if that measure is approved by a majority vote of those voting on the measure, then Section 207 (on taxation) of the Charter of San Bernardino County will be repealed.

SECTION VIII. Amendment

No term or provision of this measure may be changed or amended without a majority vote of the people on a ballot measure submitted to the electorate at a county-wide general election.

MEASURE EE COUNTY OF SAN BERNARDINO

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE EE

This Impartial Analysis of Measure EE has been prepared by County Counsel pursuant to Section 9160 of the California Elections Code.

This Measure asks voters for their opinion on whether they want San Bernardino County elected representatives to study and advocate for all options to obtain the County's fair share of state funding, including secession from the State of California. These options would include studying any steps needed to obtain approval to form a new state from the California State Legislature and the United States Congress.

This is an advisory vote. California Elections Code section 9603, subdivision (c) governs the purpose and effect of an advisory vote. It states that an advisory vote is "an indication of general voter opinion regarding the ballot proposal. The results of the advisory vote will in no manner be controlling on the sponsoring legislative body."

The opinion expressed in this advisory vote, while of interest to the Board of Supervisors, is not in any way legally controlling on the Board of Supervisors, including on the use of County revenues.

This Measure was placed on the ballot by an ordinance adopted by the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors.

MEASURE H CITY OF BARSTOW

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE H

This Impartial Analysis of Measure H has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

Summary:

Measure H asks the voters whether the City of Barstow's Mayor will continue to be directly elected or instead will be converted to a regular City Council Member with the office of Mayor to be appointed from among the five elected City Council Members. If adopted, the City Council would then complete a redistricting process to draw five City Council Member districts before the November 2024 election.

Background:

In 1976, the City's voters adopted Measure G, which established a directly elected Mayor with a two year term. In 1984 the City's voters adopted a ballot measure that changed the term of the Office of Mayor of Barstow from two to four years. The office of Mayor of the City of Barstow is a separate office elected at-large by the City's voters under Section 2.54.020 of the Municipal Code.

The City of Barstow is a general law and in general law cities, the office of Mayor may be directly elected by the voters or chosen by the City Council.

Mayor's Power and Duties:

The Mayor of the City of Barstow is a City Council Member, with all its rights and privileges. The Mayor has additional powers provided by statute and the Barstow Municipal Code. These powers include presiding over City Council meetings; signing City ordinances, resolutions, and contracts; making appointments to the City's commissions and boards, with City Council approval; and certain ceremonial duties. The Mayor receives the same compensation as the rest of the City Council.

The City Council's terms are currently staggered, as the voters will elect two four-year City Council Members in November 2022 and will elect a four-year Mayor and two four-year City Council Members in November 2024. This pattern repeats every two years.

If adopted Measure H would maintain the current balance of City Council terms, as the voters would elect two four-year City Council Members in November 2022 and three four-year City Council Members in November 2024, repeating every four years. If the voters reject Measure H and continue with a directly elected Mayor, then the current staggering of Mayoral and City Council elections would continue.

A YES VOTE on Measure H would repeal 1976's Measure G, convert the directly elected Mayor to an elected City Council Member and return the office of Mayor to an appointed position, selected by the City Council from among the five elected City Council Members. In 2024, after the expiration of the final directly elected Mayor's term, the City Council would appoint one of its Members to serve as the Mayor. The City Council would also then complete a redistricting process to draw five City Council Member districts before the November 2024 election. An appointed Mayor would have the same powers and duties as the directly elected Mayor, subject to revisions of the Barstow Municipal Code.

A NO VOTE on Measure H means the Mayor would continue to be directly elected.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE O

This Impartial Analysis of Measure O has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

INITIATIVE MEASURE AMENDING THE CITY'S MUNICIPAL CODE TO LIMIT THE NUMBER OF VACATION RENTAL LICENSES AND RENTAL CONTRACTS IN THE CITY AND TO ENACT ADDITIONAL LIMITATIONS AND REGULATIONS ON VACATION RENTALS

Measure O was placed on the ballot by citizens' initiative petition and, if approved by a majority of Big Bear Lake voters, would amend the City's Municipal Code to enact further limitations and regulations on "vacation rentals," meaning any residential dwelling unit, or portion thereof, that is leased for 28 or fewer consecutive days.

To date, the City has issued approximately 2,600 vacation rental licenses under the current Code. Measure O would establish a citywide cap of 1,500 vacation rental licenses, not including licenses for "home sharing", as defined. Those licenses applied for or held in good standing prior to the "cut-off date" may be renewed within 30 days after expiration notwithstanding the cap. Measure O provides that upon a sale or other change of property ownership, the existing vacation rental license automatically expires and any grandfathering ends. The new owner would have to obtain a new vacation rental license under Measure O's current rules, which would not allow the issuance of new vacation rental licenses, except for home sharing licenses, until the total number of licenses falls to less than 1,500. Spousal transfers, including through death and divorce, would not trigger a change in ownership and a grandfathered license would remain effective.

Measure O defines "cut-off date" as either (i) the date the City Council adopts it without an election or (ii) if placed on the ballot, the date of the election for this measure.

Measure O would also establish an annual limit of 30 vacation rental contracts per property, starting January 1, 2024. This contract limit would not apply to occupants on the owner's "friends and family list" or to properties used exclusively for home-sharing. In order to qualify occupants for the friends and family exception, an owner must file a list with the City, identifying up to five persons who must occupy the unit at no cost and may occupy the property without the owner present.

Current Code allows an owner to possess up to two vacation rental licenses. Measure O provides that, after the cutoff date, no owner may possess more than one license. However, owners with two licenses prior to the cut-off date may continue to use both until a license terminates or expires.

After the cut-off date, Measure O would prohibit a business and other legal entity from receiving a license; only a natural person or personal/family trust could obtain a license. However, a business or other legal entity with a license prior to the cut-off date may continue to use it until it terminates or expires.

Current Code allows each unit in a duplex, triplex and four-plex (2-4 attached units) to be licensed as a vacation rental. Measure O would limit a vacation rental to only one unit within a duplex, triplex or four-plex.

Measure O enacts further limitations, regulations and obligations with regard to vacation rental (i) events and gatherings, (ii) parking standards, (iii) rental contract information, (iv) inspections and (v) penalties for non-compliance.

Measure O requires simple majority voter approval.

- In 2021, visitors spent \$436,600,000 in Big Bear Lake, supported 3,757 jobs, and generated \$21,800,000 in local tax revenue.
- The Report says the limits in this measure could mean a loss of \$249,800,000 in visitor spending and cutting jobs by 2,100—reducing spending and jobs by more than half.
- Even when compared to pre-COVID levels in 2019, the reduction in visitor spending would be over 40%.

ORDINANCE NO. 2022-___

AN ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF BIG BEAR LAKE, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 4.01 OF TITLE 4 OF THE BIG BEAR LAKE MUNICIPAL CODE TO LIMIT THE NUMBER OF VACATION RENTAL LICENSES AND RENTAL CONTRACTS IN THE CITY AND TO ENACT ADDITIONAL LIMITATIONS AND REGULATIONS ON VACATION RENTALS.

WHEREAS, the rental of private homes to visitors on a short-term basis presents the potential for disruption of the tranquility of the city's residential communities if such rentals are too great in number or are insufficiently regulated;

WHEREAS, the preservation of the residential character of Big Bear Lake's neighborhoods enhances the quality of life for residents;

WHEREAS, the current regulations applicable to private home rentals on a short-term basis have resulted in disturbances to residents and visitors in the city's residential neighborhoods;

WHEREAS, the People of the City of Big Bear Lake propose this initiative ordinance, which may be referred to as the "Big Bear Lake United to Limit Short-Term Rentals Initiative," to comprehensively regulate the rental of private homes to visitors on a short-term basis within the residential neighborhoods of the City of Big Bear Lake;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF BIG BEAR LAKE, CALIFORNIA, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT TO MUNICIPAL CODE. Subject to the approval of a majority of the voters of the City of Big Bear Lake at the General Municipal Election so designated by the City Council in a separate resolution placing the proposal on the ballot for such election, Chapter 4.01 of Title 4 of the Big Bear Lake Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

(Note: strikeout is deleted text and bold underlined is new text)

"Title 4 Visitor serving uses and tourism

Chapter 4.01 Vacation Rentals

Section 4.01.010. Purpose

This chapter is intended to provide a procedure to allow the rental of private homes to visitors on a short-term basis as vacation rentals. The city seeks to promote regulate and limit vacation rentals, promote responsible visitor behavior, and protect the residential character of its neighborhoods. The city seeks to balance the needs of visitors and residents in a way that makes visitors the priority in the city's commercial districts, including the city's commercial visitor zone, and makes residents the priority in the city's residential zones.

Section 4.01.020. Definitions

For purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases are defined as follows:

- A. "Agent" means a person or entity, who does not hold any interest in the property and who has authority to act on behalf of the owner.
- B. "Bedroom" means a room designed primarily for sleeping that meets the definition of the California Building Codes currently adopted by the city.
- C. "Business entity" means a corporation, partnership, or other legal entity that is not a natural person or a personal or family trust.
- C.<u>D</u>. "Check in" means the arrival of a guest at a vacation-rental property or agent's office.
- E. "Contract" means an agreement or evidence of any tenancy that allows or provides for occupancy of a vacation-rental property. A contract is any occupancy of a property other than occupancy that includes the owner or that includes a person on the Friends and Family list, regardless of whether compensation is paid for such occupancy or whether occupancy is evidenced in an agreement or document. A contract is not required for home-sharing. as defined herein.
- F. "Cut-off date" means either the date that City Council adopts the Initiative as law or, if it is placed on the ballot, the date of the election.
- G. "Dwelling unit" shall mean one or more rooms in a building or portion thereof, designed, intended to be used or used for occupancy by one family or household for living and sleeping quarters, and containing only one kitchen, not including hotels or motels.
- H.
 "Effective date" means either the date the City Council adopts this Initiative as law upon its gualification or, if it is placed on the ballot, the date that the elections official certifies the vote on the Initiative by the voters of the City of Big Bear Lake.
- I.
 "Friends and Family list" means a list of up to five (5) persons designated by the Owner and filed

 with the city, who must occupy the unit at no cost and who may occupy the unit without requiring the presence of the Owner on the premises.
- J. "Good Neighbor Policy" means a document prepared by the city that summarizes the general rules of conduct, consideration, and respect, including, without limitation, provisions of this code and other applicable laws, rules or regulations pertaining to the use and occupancy of vacation rentals.

- D. K. "Home-sharing" or "home sharing property" means the rental of no more than two bedrooms in a detached single-family unit, for compensation, for a term of 28 or fewer consecutive days while the owner of the unit is present lives on-site and living in the unit home, throughout the visitor's stay.
- E. L. "Hosting platform" or "hosting sites" means a person or entity who participates in home-sharing or vacation rentals by collecting or receiving a fee, directly or indirectly through an agent or intermediary, for conducting a booking transaction using any medium of facilitation. Examples include, but are not limited to, VRBO.com, Airbnb.com, homestay.com and other internet and non-internet based services that facilitate bookings for a fee.
- F. M. "Owner" means a person(s) or entity, who holds record fee title to the property, except that "owner" does not include the holder of a leasehold interest in the property. "Owner" also includes a personal or family trust consisting solely of natural persons. An "owner" can be a business entity only if holding a license issued prior to the Cut-off date; any "owner" who holds a license on the Cut-off date is deemed an "owner" for purposes of this ordinance until the license is terminated or is not renewed.
- G. N. "Responsible party" means the lessee of a vacation-rental property.
- H. O. "Vacation rental" or "vacation-rental property" means either (1) a residential dwelling unit, or any portion thereof, that is leased for a term of 28 or fewer consecutive days. "Vacation rental" or "vacation-rental property" includes properties where home-sharing property takes place unless expressly indicated otherwise.

Section 4.01.030. License Required

- <u>A.</u> A current, valid annual license issued by the city to the owner is required for each property prior to advertising, offering to lease, or leasing the property as a vacation-rental property. The license shall be posted inside of the <u>Each dwelling unit used as a</u> vacation-rental property <u>requires a license</u>.
- B. The license number shall be conspicuously posted inside of the vacation-rental property and on all advertisements or solicitations for the property, including, but not limited to Hosting sites, websites, social media postings, emails, and print ads.
- C. A license shall not be issued to any business entity. A natural person or personal or family trust shall not maintain any financial interest in more than one vacation rental. For this purpose, financial interest includes both legal and beneficial ownership as well as any arrangement that provides for receipt of any portion of the revenues generated by the vacation rental. An owner shall only be issued, and can only maintain one license for any vacation rental within the City of Big Bear Lake at any time.
- D. Paragraph C shall apply only to licenses issued after the Cut-off date. The purpose of this exception is to afford current owners of vacation rental property a reasonable opportunity to recoup costs reasonably invested for vacation rental use.
- E. Upon sale or change of property ownership, the license shall automatically expire and the property shall not be used as a vacation rental until the new or successor owner obtains a license for the vacation rental. A change in ownership of a business entity that owns a vacation rental property such that the property is subject to reassessment constitutes a change of ownership for the purposes of this provision and results in the termination of the license. A change of ownership between or among spouses, including as a result of death or divorce, is not considered a change of ownership that terminates a license. Within seven days of a sale or change of property ownership, the owner holding a license must cancel the license through a procedure to be developed by the city.

Section 4.01.040. Licensing Procedure and Maximum Number of Licenses

- A. An owner shall apply to the city for a license annually for each vacation-rental property and pay a fee established by resolution of the city council. <u>The fee shall be sufficient to allow for comprehensive</u> <u>and complete enforcement of the regulations in this section.</u> The city shall provide an application form and list of application and insurance requirements.
 - 1. At the time of renewal of any license, all business entities, limited liability companies, and person or family trusts must provide the names, contact information, and any other information deemed necessary by the city, of each natural person holding a legal, equitable, or beneficial interest in any business entity, limited liability company, or personal or family trust, and the address of each vacation rental owners by each such entity.
 - 2. When reviewing applications for new licenses, the city shall utilize the information provided under Paragraph A.1. to ensure that no natural person has any legal, equitable, or beneficial interest in any existing licenses prior to issuing a new license, as limited in Paragraph B.
 - 3. The owner at the time an application or renewal is submitted can designate and file with the city the names of up to five (5) persons who may occupy the vacation-rental property at no cost and without requiring the presence of the owner on the premises of the vacation-rental property. Each such occupancy shall fully comply with all other provisions of this Chapter.
- B. An owner may not hold more than two licenses, except that an owner holding <u>one license for a</u> <u>vacation-rental property.</u>
- <u>C.</u> <u>The city shall not issue</u> more than two licenses as of September 16, 2021, may renew these one license to any owner. In addition, the city shall not issue more than one license per parcel.
- D. The city shall not issue more than 1,500 licenses unless they have been revoked or not. However, licenses applied for or held in good standing on the Cut-off date and renewed within 30 days of after expiration may be renewed in accordance with this chapter even if the total number of licenses exceeds 1,500. This cap on licenses does not apply to properties that are used exclusively for home-sharing.
- E. Licenses issued after the Cut-off date and before the Effective date shall be valid for a period of one (1) year and cannot be renewed if, at the time of renewal, the total number of active licenses exceeds 1,500.
- F. For 24 months after the Effective date, license holders that held a license on or before the Cut-off date may choose to remove their property from the program to provide a long-term lease of at least 12 months. In such cases, property owners are eligible to apply for a license after the longterm lease expires, but only within three years of removing the property from the program. A license may be issued in this instance exceeding the limit of 1,500.
- <u>G.</u> An application for a vacation-rental property license that was not submitted and paid, for prior to or on the Cut-off date shall not be processed by the city until the number of vacation rental licenses is below 1,500. When the number of active licenses is less than 1,500, the city can once again issue licenses, but the total number may not exceed 1,500. If there are more applicants than available licenses, the city will establish a fair and equitable system to determine which applications will be processed.
- H. The city shall not renew any licenses for units with outstanding fines if all administrative appeals have been exhausted.

Section 4.01.050. Transient Occupancy Tax

- A. Except as provided in Paragraph B below, the owner is responsible for collecting and remitting transient occupancy tax and tourism business improvement district assessments to the city and shall comply with all provisions of Chapter 3.20 of this code concerning transient occupancy taxes.
- B. Beginning January 1, 2022, hosting **Hosting** platforms shall be responsible for collecting all applicable transient occupancy taxes and tourism business improvement district assessments and remitting the same to the city. The hosting platform shall be considered an agent of the host for purposes of transient occupancy tax collections and remittance pursuant to Chapter 3.20.
- C. Owners shall be responsible for submitting transient occupancy tax forms reporting nightly stays and gross receipts even if a hosting platform is remitting the taxes due on their behalf.
- D. Licensees making two or more late submittals in a 12-month period shall not have their license renewed upon expiration.

Section 4.01.060. Operational Requirements

- A. The owner and owner's agent shall ensure that the vacation rental Prior to check-in or guest arrival, the owner or the owner's agent shall provide a contract summary to the city on a form to be developed by the city. The contract summary shall contain, at a minimum, the license number, the dates of the stay, and the contract number for the year, and any other information as deemed appropriate by the city. This requirement does not apply to home-sharing.
- **B.** Prior to or at check in, the owner or the owner's agent shall obtain from the Responsible Person the individual's name, email address, and a copy of a government-issued identification.
- C. No more than 30 contracts for occupancy of a vacation-rental property shall be allowed in any calendar year. A contract is any occupancy of a property other than occupancy that includes the owner or that includes a person on the Friends and Family list, regardless of whether compensation is paid for such occupancy or whether occupancy is evidenced in an agreement or document. In order to allow for any existing reservations and allow the city time to establish a system to monitor and track contracts, this limitation commences at the start of the first day of the calendar year 2024.
 - 1. The city shall track and enforce the 30 contract per year rental limitation, except the 30 contract per year limit shall not apply to occupancies that meet the definition of homesharing. No contract is required for home-sharing.
 - 2. If it is determined by the city that a vacation-rental property has been rented without providing the contract summary, the owner shall be deemed in violation of this Ordinance, regardless of the number of contracts in the city's records for the current calendar year.
 - 3. The owner or the owner's agent shall maintain a record of all contracts for a period of at least three years, subject to audit by the city.
- D. The owner and owner's agent shall ensure that the vacation-rental property complies with all applicable codes regarding fire, building and safety, health and safety, zoning, lighting, and all other laws and regulations.
- E. The rules and regulations rewarding usage, quiet hours, parking, and occupancy applicable to visitors renting the vacation-rental properties are also applicable to owners occupying their own vacation rental properties and to occupancies by persons designated on the owner's Friends and Family list.
- B.F. All guest check-ins must be performed in person by the owner or the owner's agent. The responsible party must be present in person at the check-in, The responsible party must sign a copy of the City's city's Good Neighbor Policy prior to or during check- in. A copy of the signed policy shall be provided to the city by the owner or owner's agent upon request. An owner or agent may provide an electronic process for guests to sign and acknowledge the City's City's Good Neighbor Policy at check-in.

- C.G. Occupancy of the vacation-rental property shall always be limited to the limit stated on the license. Such occupancy shall not exceed two adults per bedroom, plus two additional adults, not including persons under 18 years of age; but the total number of persons, including persons under 18 years of age, may not exceed one person per 200 square feet of living space or 16 persons, whichever is less. Properties without all the parking spaces that are required by Section 17.25.070 are limited to two adults per parking space provided.
- D.H. No party, wedding, Events or other gathering gatherings exceeding occupancy limits is <u>are not</u> <u>permitted</u> without prior written approval by, <u>unless</u> the city manager or the city manager's designee at least 30 days in advance. City approval is discretionary and may be subject to reasonable conditions. has given prior written approval on or before the Cut-off date.
- E.I. Off-street parking spaces shall be provided on the vacation-rental property sufficient for all vehicles and trailers associated with the vacation-rental property or its occupants in accordance with Section 17.25.070. Parking is allowed only in designated driveways and garages and is not allowed in the yard or street at any time. The maximum number of vehicles at a vacation rental property at any time is also the minimum number of parking spaces required. Gravel parking spaces approved for vacation-rental properties licensed before January 11, 2021, and originally constructed after January 1, 2004, shall continue to be allowed until January 1, 2026. Properties licensed before January 11, 2021, that do not contain off-street parking spaces shall continue to be allowed until January 1, 2026. The maximum number of vehicles that may be parked at a vacation rental is the number of existing conforming spaces or the number listed below based upon lot size, whichever is fewer:
 - 1. For a lot less than 5,000 square feet, two cars maximum;
 - 2. For a lot between 5,000 to 10,000 square feet, three cars maximum; and
 - 3. For a lot greater than 10,000 square feet, four cars maximum.
 - 4. Cars parked in a fully enclosed garage are not included in these maximum limitations.
- **F.J.** Upon the request of the city, the owner or the owner's agent shall respond in person at the vacation-rental property within 30 minutes of dispatch of notice by the city to correct **a** <u>any</u> violation of this chapter or any other provision of this code, prevent a recurrence of such conduct by those occupants or guests, and evict one or more of the guests when requested by the City's agent.
- G.K. No radio receiver, musical instrument, phonograph, loudspeaker, sound amplifier, or other any machine or device for the producing or reproducing of any sound may be operated on the vacation-rental property unless it is within a fully enclosed structure and is not audible at the property line of the vacation-rental property.
- H.<u>L.</u> Outdoor activity that disturbs the peace and the use of an outdoor spa are prohibited between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.
- H.M. Each vacation-rental property shall be equipped with no more than one informational sign as described in the registration materials. The sign shall be clearly visible from the street, include the code enforcement hotline number, identify the maximum number of occupants and the maximum number of cars permitted plus additional information required by the city.
- J.N. Trash may not be stored at a vacant vacation rental property at any time. Trash shall be properly handled and disposed of as required by city regulations.
- K.O. Incessant barking from dogs heard beyond the property line is prohibited.
- **<u>L.P.</u>** The owner shall include notice to lessee <u>**Responsible person**</u> of the requirements of this section in all leases and post a visible notice at the entrance to the vacation-rental property.

Section 4.01.070. Agency and Certification

An owner may grant authority to an agent to act on behalf of the owner for purposes of fulfilling some or all the requirements of this chapter. The owner shall give prior written notice to the city of any grant of authority to a notice, including the identity and contact information for the agent. The owner shall promptly give the city written notice of any change to any such grant of authority of making such change. The use of an agent shall not excuse the owner from the owner's obligations of this chapter. Agents and owners fulfilling any of the requirements of this chapter shall be annually certified by the city.

Section 4.01.080. Inspection and Audit.

- **A.** Each owner and owner's agent shall provide the city with access to the vacation-rental property and to such related records, documents, tax returns, and bank accounts at any time during normal business hours as the city may determine are necessary for the purpose of inspection or audit to determine that the objectives and conditions of this chapter are being fulfilled.
- B. Every applicant applying for a license shall provide the city access to any premises, property or dwelling which is the subject of the application, and the city shall be permitted to make any inspections as the city may determine is necessary from time to time throughout the application process. If a license is issued, the city shall be permitted access to the subject premises, property or dwelling in order to determine continued compliance with this chapter and/or any conditions of approvals set forth in the respective license.
- C. The owner shall pay to the city the actual costs of any inspections not to exceed the cost of one hour for every inspection conducted pursuant to this chapter.

Section 4.01.090. Hosting Platform Responsibilities.

- A. Subject to applicable laws, hosting platforms shall, upon written request by the city, promptly disclose to the city each vacation-rental property listing located in the city, the host ID, listing ID, and names of the persons responsible for each such listing, the address of each such listing, the length of stay for each such listing, and the price paid for each stay.
- B. A hosting platform shall promptly remove any listing upon receipt of a take-down notice from the city indicating that a listing violates applicable legal requirements.
- C. A hosting platform is responsible for collecting and remitting transient occupancy taxes and tourism business improvement district assessments on behalf of their hosts beginning January 1, 2022, in accordance with Section 1.01.050 above.
- D. A hosting platform shall require all hosts to include a valid license number in a designated field dedicated to the license number no later than January 1, 2022.

Section 4.01.100. Violations and Penalties

- A. The city may **shall** issue an administrative citation to any person who operates a vacation-rental property without a license. The administrative fine for the first citation shall be in the amount of \$5,000.00. Any person operating an unlicensed vacation-rental property shall be permanently ineligible to operate a vacation-rental property in the city, and any property that is operated as a vacation-**rental** property without the required license shall be ineligible for **a** vacation-rental property license for a period of one year from the most recent citation issued for operating without a license. If the person continues to operate a vacation-rental property without a license, the city **may shall** issue an additional administrative citation, with an administrative fine in the amount of \$10,000.00. Any additional violation shall be subject to additional citations with escalating fines provided in a schedule established by the city council by resolution. A person operating an unlicensed vacation-rental property is liable to the city for the payment of transient occupancy tax in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 3.20 of this code, including without limitation penalties and interest.
- B. For any violation of the requirement in Section 4.01.060(A) to provide contract summaries to the city, an immediate fine of \$2,500 shall be assessed against the owner, and the license for that property shall be suspended for a six-month period. A second violation at the same vacationrental property shall terminate the license for that property.

- B.C. For any violation of this chapter that is not subject to subsections A or B above or DE or F below, the city may shall impose an administrative fine for the first violation in the amount of \$500.00. The fine for each subsequent violation shall be \$1,000.00. Upon the third violation in any twelve-month period of any provision of this chapter that is not subject to subsection A or B above or E or F below, the license for that property shall be revoked.
- C.D. Each Except as stated otherwise, each administrative citation for a violation of any provision of this chapter may be levied or assessed against one or more of: the owner, the owner's agent, a hosting platform, and the responsible party. The city may initiate revocation of a license after one violation. Each day that a violation occurs is a separate violation, for which the city may shall issue a separate administrative citation and fine.
- D.E. Any person who advertises a vacation-rental property with false occupancy information, offering selfcheck-in, or without including a valid license number for the property in the advertisement shall pay a fine in the amount of \$2,500.00, and the owner's license <u>for that property</u> may be revoked. The owner's license <u>for that property</u> shall be revoked for a second offense, if not revoked already.

F. If a guest violates this ordinance and it is determined that a responsible party has not signed a copy of the city's Good Neighbor Policy as required by Section 4.01.060, the owner or their agent shall pay a fine in the amount of \$500.00, in addition to any fine levied against the guest.

- **E**.**G**. The failure of an owner or the owner's agent to comply with an order of any police officer shall result in the revocation of the license.
- **F.H.** The appeal and hearing provisions of Section 1.17.070 of this code apply to any revocation or suspension of a license. In lieu of revocation or suspension of a license, the City Manager, at his or her discretion, may place additional operating conditions on a vacation-rental property.
- G.I. In addition to, and not in lieu of, any other remedy allowed by law, all remedies prescribed under this chapter are cumulative, and the election of one or more remedies does not bar the city from pursuing any other remedy, whether criminal, civil, or administrative, through which the city may enforce this chapter or address any violation of this code or to remedy any other public nuisance.
- H.J. Owners and agents must accept all city vacation-rental-related correspondence, including, but not limited to, notices of violation, administrative citations, registration materials, notices of regulatory changes, and transient occupancy tax notices via email delivery. It is the responsibility of the owner and agent to ensure that the email address provided on the license application is active and monitored regularly.
- K. The city shall maintain a web-based database of issued vacation-rental property licenses and enforcement actions or violations assessed against each license holder. The website shall list vacation rentals by address and include at a minimum, the following information for each unit: owner, license number, and expiration date; name of any owner's agent or management company (if applicable); maximum permitted number of occupants; maximum permitted number of cars; each and every complaint that has been received, including duplicate complaints; a detailed description of each compliant and final resolution to each complaint; any fines that were levied, and whether the fines were paid or are outstanding.

Section 4.01.105. Authority to Make Rules and Regulations

<u>The city shall have the authority to establish administrative rules and regulations, which may include, but</u> are not limited to, registration conditions, reporting requirements, inspection frequencies, enforcement procedures, advertising restrictions, disclosure requirements, or insurance requirements, consistent with the provisions of this Chapter, for the purpose of implementing, interpreting, clarifying, carrying out, furthering, and enforcing the requirements and the provisions of this Chapter. No such rules may have the effect of undermining any of the provisions of this Chapter.

SECTION 2. IMPLEMENTATION.

- A. This Initiative is considered adopted and effective upon the earliest date legally possible after either the City Council adopts the Initiative as law upon its qualification or, if it is placed on the ballot, the elections official certifies the vote on the Initiative by the voters of the City of Big Bear Lake. Upon the effective date of this Initiative, the city is directed to promptly take all appropriate actions needed to implement this Initiative, including but not limited to taking any administrative steps necessary to update any and all city maps, figures, and any other documents maintained by the city so they conform to the legislative policies set forth in this Initiative.
- B. Upon the effective date of this Initiative, the provisions of Section 1 of this Initiative are hereby inserted into the City of Big Bear Lake Municipal Code. The city may reorganize, renumber, and/or reformat the provisions of Section 1 of this Initiative, provided that the full text is inserted into the Municipal Code without alteration.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> EFFECT OF OTHER MEASURES ON THE SAME BALLOT.

It is the voters' intent to comprehensively regulate the rental of private homes to visitors on a short-term basis. To ensure that this intent is not frustrated, and in the event this Initiative is not adopted by the City Council as law, this Initiative shall be presented to the voters as an alternative to, and with the express intent that it will compete with, any and all voter initiatives or city-sponsored measures placed on the same ballot as this Initiative"). In the event that this Initiative and one or more Conflicting Initiatives are adopted by the voters at the same election, then it is the voters' intent that only that measure that receives the greatest number of affirmative votes shall control in its entirety and said other measure or measures shall be rendered void and without any legal effect. In no event shall this Initiative be interpreted in a manner that would permit its operation in conjunction with the non-conflicting provisions of any Conflicting Initiative. If this Initiative is approved by the voters but superseded by law in whole or in part by any other Conflicting Initiative approved by the voters at the same election, this Initiative shall be self-executing and given full force of law.

SECTION 4. INTERPRETATION, SEVERABILITY, ENFORCEMENT

- A. This Initiative must be interpreted so as to be consistent with all federal and state laws, rules, and regulations. If any section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase, part, or portion of this Initiative is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision does not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Initiative. The voters declare that this Initiative, and each section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase, part, or portion thereof, would have been adopted or passed irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, sub-sections, sentences, clauses, phrases, part, or portion is found to be invalid. If any provision of this Initiative is held invalid as applied to any person or circumstance, such invalidity does not affect any application of this Initiative that can be given effect without the invalid application.
- B. If any portion of this Initiative is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, we the People of the City of Big Bear Lake indicate our strong desire that: (i) the City Council use its best efforts to sustain and re-enact that portion, and (ii) the City Council implement this Initiative by taking all steps possible to cure any inadequacies or deficiencies identified by the court in a manner consistent with the express and implied intent of this Initiative, including adopting or reenacting any such portion in a manner consistent with this Initiative.
- C. The Proponents of this Initiative, and any committee formed to support this Initiative, shall have standing to enforce and defend the provisions of this Initiative in any judicial forum, as necessary.
- D. This Initiative must be broadly construed in order to achieve the purposes stated above. It is the intent of the voters that the provisions of this Initiative be interpreted or implemented by the city and others in a manner that facilitates the purpose set forth in this Initiative.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.

The provisions of this Initiative can be amended or repealed only by a majority of voters of the City of Big Bear Lake voting in an election held in accordance with state law.

<u>SECTION 6</u>. INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS REPEALED.

Any provisions of the City of Big Bear Lake Municipal Code, or any other ordinances of the city inconsistent with this Initiative, to the extent of such inconsistencies and no further, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. ATTESTATION OF ORDINANCE.

The Mayor is hereby authorized to attest to the adoption of this Ordinance by the People voting thereon on November 8, 2022, by signing where indicated below.

MEASURE P CITY OF BIG BEAR LAKE

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE P

This Impartial Analysis of Measure P has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX MEASURE

The City of Big Bear Lake ("City") currently imposes a transient occupancy tax ("TOT"), also generally known as a "hotel" tax, at the rate of eight percent (8%) of rent paid in order to occupy a room or space in a hotel, vacation rental or similar lodging (referred to herein as a "hotel"). This TOT is imposed upon occupancy of a room or hotel space within the City, for dwelling, lodging, or sleeping purposes, for a period of twenty-eight (28) consecutive days or less. The TOT currently provides approximately \$6,500,000 annually to the General Fund to pay for general City services and programs.

Measure P was placed on the ballot by the Big Bear Lake City Council and, if approved by a majority of Big Bear Lake voters, will amend the Municipal Code to increase the maximum TOT rate from eight percent (8%) to nine percent (9%) effective on January 1, 2024, and from nine percent (9%) to ten percent (10%) effective on January 1, 2025. Measure P would allow the City Council to adjust the tax rate without voter approval, provided it does not exceed the voter-approved maximum rate. It is anticipated that this rate increase will generate an additional \$1,300,000.00 in new revenues annually. Measure P would also update the Code to clarify that the tax applies to the full rent paid by the hotel guest for occupancy, whether payment is made directly to a hotel operator or to a third-party "rental agent" for booking purposes (i.e., online travel companies and online short term rental companies).

Measure P would be a "general tax". All revenue from this tax would be deposited into the City's General Fund and could be used for general City operations and services, such as public safety response, street repair and maintenance, park and trail construction and maintenance. Pursuant to State Law, a "general tax" requires approval by a majority of the City's voters voting at an election.

A "yes" vote on Measure P will approve the TOT tax rate increase.

A "no" vote on Measure P will not approve the TOT tax rate increase.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE P

This Argument in Favor of Measure P was submitted pursuant to Section 9282 of the California Elections Code. It is the opinion of the author(s), and has been printed exactly as submitted.

Measure P requires Big Bear Lake visitors to pay a modest annual 1% Transient Occupancy Tax increase on overnight lodging at private home rentals and hotels (also known as a TOT, bed, lodging, or hotel tax).

This Measure will help improve conditions for all Big Bear Lake stakeholders, including residents, 2nd homeowners, businesses, and visitors, in the following ways:

- Requires visitors, not residents, to help preserve critical City of Big Bear Lake infrastructure and services, such as streets, parks, trails, long term water and lake sustainability, plus public safety, including fire, ambulance, and law enforcement.
- Two small 1% increases are delayed and then slowly phased in, giving everyone ample time to ease into the new rates. The first 1% increase, from the current 8% to 9%, doesn't take effect for over a year, on January 1, 2024. The second 1% increase, from 9% to 10%, is effective another year later on January 1, 2025.
- Helps fairly shift the burden of supporting City infrastructure from residents, 2nd homeowners, and businesses, to the visitors who frequently use and benefit from these City services.
- Provides a long overdue TOT adjustment, which has not been raised since 2008.
- Translates into a minimal dollar increase on lodging rates. For example, an overnight visitor's \$108 bill with TOT would be \$109 in 2024, and \$110 in 2025. Just an extra \$1 or \$2 for every \$100 they spend.

• Brings Big Bear Lake's current low TOT closer to other similar resort communities, including Mammoth Lakes (13%), and South Lake Tahoe (12%-14%).

ORDINANCE NO. 2022-___

AN ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF BIG BEAR LAKE, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTION 3.20.030 OF CHAPTER 3.20 OF TITLE 3 OF THE BIG BEAR LAKE MUNICIPAL CODE INCREASING THE MAXIMUM RATE OF THE CITY'S TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY (HOTEL) TAX FROM 8% TO 9% EFFECTIVE ON JANUARY 1, 2024 AND FROM 9% TO 10% EFFECTIVE ON JANUARY 1, 2025.

(NOTE: Additions are highlighted in *bold italics* and deletions are highlighted in strikeout)

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF BIG BEAR LAKE DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Subject to the approval of a majority of the voters of the City of Big Bear Lake at the General Municipal Election so designated by the City Council in a separate resolution placing the proposal on the ballot for such election, Section 3.20.030 of Chapter 3.20 of Title 3 of the Big Bear Lake Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Chapter 3.20 TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX

. . . .

"3.20.030 Tax imposed.

For the privilege of occupancy in any hotel, each transient is subject to, and shall pay a tax on the rent charged by an operator to the transient, as follows; (a) as of until January 1, 20092024, a tax in the amount of seven eight percent; (b) as of January 1, 20102024, a tax in the maximum amount of eight-nine percent and (c) as of January 1, 2025, a tax in the maximum amount of ten percent. Insofar as the transient is concerned, the tax constitutes a debt owed by the transient to the city which is extinguished only by payment to the operator or to the city. This chapter may be repealed or amended by the City Council without a vote of the People of the City of Big Bear Lake. However, as required by California Constitution Article XIIIC (Proposition 218), voter approval is required for any amendment or provision that would increase the maximum rate or methodology of any tax levied pursuant to this chapter."

SECTION 2 The transient occupancy tax set forth herein shall be collected and administered in the manner set forth in Chapter 3.20 of the City of Big Bear Lake Municipal Code.

SECTION 3. Pursuant to Article XIIIB of the California Constitution, the appropriation limit for the City of Big Bear Lake will be increased by the maximum projected aggregate collection authorized by the levy of this general tax, as indicated in Section 1, in each of the years covered by this Ordinance plus the amount, if any, by which the appropriation limit is decreased by law as a result of the levy of the general tax set forth in this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. If any portion of this Ordinance is declared invalid by a court of law or other legal body with applicable authority, the invalidity shall not affect or prohibit the force and effect of any other provision or application of the Ordinance that is not deemed invalid. The voters of the City hereby declare that they would have circulated for qualification and/or voted for the adoption of this Section, and each portion thereof, regardless of the fact that any portion of the initiative may be subsequently deemed invalid.

SECTION 5. Pursuant to California Constitution Article XIIIC §(2)(b) and California Elections Code §9217, this Ordinance shall take effect only if approved by a majority of the eligible voters of the City of Big Bear Lake voting at the General Municipal Election to be held on November 8, 2022, and shall become effective as of January 1, 2023.

SECTION 6. The Mayor is hereby authorized to attest to the adoption of this Ordinance by the People voting thereon on November 8, 2022, by signing where indicated below.

MEASURE S CITY OF COLTON

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE S

This Impartial Analysis of Measure S has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

On May 4, 2022 the City Council unanimously voted to place Measure "S" on the November 8, 2022 general municipal election ballot. By placing Measure "S" on the ballot, the City complies with Article XIII C of the California Constitution (Proposition 218), which requires a majority of the voters to approve an ordinance which establishes a general tax.

If approved by a majority of Colton voters, this Measure would authorize a one percent (1%) retail transactions and use (sales) tax within the City of Colton. A 1% rate equates to an extra \$1.00 per \$100 purchased. It is estimated that Measure "S" will provide an additional \$9,500,000 in annual local funding that could be used to maintain police patrols, to address homelessness, gang, drug and crime prevention, fire protection, paramedics, 911 emergency response, to maintain senior and youth services, parks, sidewalks, roads, to clean and maintain public areas, and for general government use. This tax would be a "general tax," meaning that revenues raised from the tax would go into the City's general fund to pay for any lawful City program, improvement, or service.

California Revenue and Taxation Code section 7285.9 authorizes the City to levy a general transactions and use/sales tax at a rate of one percent (1%) so long as the tax is approved by a majority of the voters voting in an election on that issue. If approved, the tax will remain in effect until ended by Colton voters voting at a subsequent election.

The tax would be paid in addition to current sales taxes and would be collected at the same time and in the same manner as existing sales taxes. All revenues raised by the tax would remain in the City and would not be shared with the State, County or any other agency.

A "yes" vote on Measure "S" will authorize the 1% transactions and use (sales) tax.

A "no" vote on Measure "S" will not authorize the 1% transactions and use (sales) tax.

If Measure "S" is not approved, the General Fund will not receive the sales tax revenues identified in the Measure. The City Council will then have to decide, as part of the budgeting process, whether other revenues are available to pay for City programs and services, or whether City programs and services will have to be reduced.

MEASURE M CITY OF GRAND TERRACE

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE M

This Impartial Analysis of Measure M has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

The Grand Terrace City Council voted to placed Measure M, a transient occupancy tax, on the November 8, 2022, ballot ("Measure").

If approved by voters, the Measure adds Chapter 3.30 to Title 3 of the Grand Terrace Municipal Code to establish a transient occupancy tax with a maximum rate of 10% of the rent charged by an operator of an accommodation (such as a hotel), which would be collected from guests staying at an accommodation for 30 consecutive calendar days or less (counting portions of calendar days as full days). The City Council may set the rate by resolution, provided that it does not exceed the maximum 10% rate. As a general tax, funds collected are placed in the City of Grand Terrace's ("City") general fund and may be used for any City general fund purpose. The Measure excludes the following individuals from being taxed:

- 1. Any person as to whom, or any occupancy as to which, it is beyond the power of the City to impose the transient occupancy tax.
- 2. Any public officer or employee when on official business.
- 3. Any officer or employee of a foreign government who is exempt by reason of express provision of federal law or international treaty.

The Measure is estimated to generate approximately \$10,000 (current estimate) to \$250,000 (if a major hotel is developed in the City) in annual revenue.

The operators of accommodations are required to collect the transient occupancy tax from guests and, further, remit such funds collected to the City. The ordinance also contains enforcement provisions for the collection of the transient occupancy tax. The City Council may amend the ordinance to further its purpose and intent, but only the voters may approve an increase of the tax above the maximum 10%. If passed, it will stay in effect until ended by voters.

A "YES" vote is a vote to approve a transient occupancy tax with a maximum rate of 10%. A "NO" vote is a vote against a transient occupancy tax with a maximum rate of 10%. The transient occupancy tax proposed by Measure M would take effect only if it receives a majority "YES" vote by the City's voters at the November 8, 2022, election.

MEASURE R CITY OF MONTCLAIR

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE R

This Impartial Analysis of Measure R has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

If adopted by a majority of the voters, Measure "R" (Ordinance 22-999) would enact a general business license tax on cannabis businesses in an amount not to exceed seven percent (7%) of gross receipts of cannabis businesses in the City of Montclair. On August 1, 2022, the City Council voted to place Measure "R" on the November 8, 2022 general municipal election ballot. Currently, there is no cannabis business license tax in the City.

The gross receipts tax would be imposed on every person who engages in cannabis business in the City. Specifically, the tax would be imposed on every person who engages in (1) commercial cannabis cultivation, (2) the operation of a testing laboratory for cannabis or cannabis products, (3) the retail sales of cannabis as a retailer (dispensary) or non-store front retailer (delivery business), or microbusiness (retail sales activity), (4) cannabis distribution business for cannabis or cannabis products, or (5) cannabis manufacturing, processing, or microbusiness (non-retail activity) or any other type of cannabis business. The initial cannabis tax rate is set at zero dollars. The City Council may increase the tax rate up to seven percent (7%) once the City Attorney determines that commercial cannabis activities in the City are lawful. If the rate is increased to seven percent (7%), it is estimated to generate about \$3.5 million in revenue annually.

All revenue generated from the proposed cannabis business license tax would be deposited into the City's General Fund, and used by the City to pay for general City operations and services including, but not limited to, fire and police protection, 911 emergency response, recruiting and retaining firefighters and police officers, retaining local business and jobs, street and infrastructure maintenance, assistance for individuals experiencing homelessness, youth after-school and summer recreational programs, senior citizen programs, planning and engineering services, capital improvements projects, operational expenses, and general obligations of the City. As such, this ballot measure proposes a "general purpose tax," rather than a "special purpose tax." The measure requires a simple majority vote (50% plus 1) for adoption.

Measure "R" requires an annual audit by an independent auditor of the receipt and expenditures of the revenue generated by the proposed cannabis business license tax to ensure compliance with the requirements of the ballot measure.

A "yes" vote on Measure "R" will enact a gross receipts business license tax on cannabis businesses operating within the City.

A "no" vote on Measure "R" will not enact a gross receipts business license tax on cannabis businesses operating within the City.

Cannabis businesses may only be permitted by future City Council ordinance, state or federal law requirements, or by a future binding measure approved by Montclair voters.

If enacted by a majority (50% plus 1) vote, this Advisory Measure would advise the City Council that the voters desire to amend the Montclair Municipal Code to allow legalizing and licensing medical and adult-use cannabis businesses to operate within the City.

A "yes" vote on Advisory Measure "II" will recommend that cannabis businesses be allowed to operate within the City.

A "no" vote on Advisory Measure "II" will not recommend that cannabis businesses be allowed to operate within the City.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE TO INCLUDE SHORT TERM RESIDENTIAL UNITS IN THE CITY'S TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX

BACKGROUND: The City of Needles ("City") currently charges a 10% tax on stays in hotels and motels, but does not charge this tax for short term rentals in residential areas. The City's current 10% transient occupancy tax is collected from hotel and motel guests and is a general tax which can be spent on any lawful purpose of the City, including public safety, street maintenance, parks and recreation, and other services.

MEASURE: This measure was placed on the ballot by the Needles City Council. If approved, the transient occupancy tax would be expanded to apply to short-term residential rental units. A short term residential unit is defined as "any residential property or portion of a residential property that is rented to an individual or group for 30 consecutive days or less." If this measure passes, the City estimates \$84,300 of additional annual revenue will be generated for the City's general fund.

A "Yes" vote expands the application of the existing transient occupancy tax to short term residential rental units, effective as of January 1, 2023.

A "No" vote rejects the application of the current transient occupancy tax to short term residential rental units.

This Argument in Favor of Measure N was submitted pursuant to Section 9282 of the California Elections Code. It is the opinion of the author(s), and has been printed exactly as submitted.

Overnight visitors require City services such as public safety and parks and impact street wear. In 1959 and 1985 the voters approved a 10% Transient Occupancy Tax charged to the bills of guests staying at hotels, motels, apartment hotels/motels, RV parks and any other commercial lodging to pay their fair share of services and facilities. This tax is paid by out of towners, not Needles residents or businesses. These taxes are common in nearly every community across the country.

Recently overnight visitors have had the option of using Short Term Rentals. Instead of staying in a hotel, they rent a private residence. 133 such rentals operate in the City. These tax revenues paid by out of towners will remain in the City, controlled by the City, for use by general municipal purposes of public safety, street repair and park maintenance. These tax revenues cannot be taken by San Bernardino County or the State. Including short term residential rental units in the tax, the City will raise approximately \$84,300 annually to pay their fair share costs of maintenance and repair.

Short term Rental guest have the same impact on City services and facilities as hotel guests and should pay their fair share of costs. They should not be able to stay in a residential neighborhood, and not pay because of a loophole in the existing law. It is unfair to the legitimate hoteliers.

FULL TEXT FOR MEASURE N

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES TO INCLUDE IN THE CITY'S TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX, SHORT TERM RESIDENTIAL UNITS, AND AMENDING SECTIONS 20-8, 20-8.2(c) and 20-8.2(e) OF THE NEEDLES MUNICIPAL CODE

The People of the City of Needles do hereby ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Recitals.

A. The purpose of this Ordinance is to apply the City's existing transient occupancy tax to operators of short term residential properties and rental units.

B. The current transient occupancy tax is applied to and collected from operators of local hotels, motels and similar lodgings. The transient occupancy tax is not currently applied to or collected from operators of short term residential properties and rental units.

C. The transient occupancy tax is paid only by guests who stay in local hotels and other lodgings so that outof-town visitors pay their fair share of their use of City roads, parks, the beach, public safety and other City services

D. The revenues from the transient occupancy tax remain in the City, are controlled by the City, and are used for unrestricted general municipal purposes such as public safety, infrastructure, street repair and park improvements. Transient occupancy tax revenues cannot be taken by San Bernardino County or the State of California.

D. By including short term residential rental units in the transient occupancy tax, it is estimated the City will raise approximately \$84,300 annually, which will be used for general city services, including protecting residents' quality of life and property values and continue to provide excellent services.

SECTION 2. Section 20-8 of the Needles Municipal Code is amended to read:

<u>Tax levied</u>. Every operator of a hotel, motel, apartment hotel, apartment motel, trailer court, recreational vehicle park, <u>short term residential rental unit and/or property</u>, or any other commercial establishment furnishing lodging space in exchange for monetary compensation, located within the city, shall pay a transient occupancy tax of ten percent which shall be based on the operator's gross monthly receipts received from transient lodgers.

SECTION 3. Section 20-8.2(c) of the Needles Municipal Code is amended to read:

"Operator" shall mean the person who is an owner and/or proprietor of a hotel, motel, apartment hotel, apartment motel, trailer court, recreational vehicle park, <u>short term residential rental unit and/or property</u>, or any other commercial establishment furnishing lodging space in exchange for monetary compensation within the city. If an operator utilizes a managing agent who is not an employee, then such agent shall also constitute an "operator" for the purposes of this Article. Compliance with this Article by either the principal or the managing agent shall constitute compliance by both.

<u>SECTION 4</u>. Section 20-8.2(e) of the Needles Municipal Code is amended to read:

"Lodging Space" shall mean (i) one or more rooms used or intended to be used for dwelling or sleeping purposes, (ii) land in a trailer court or recreational vehicle park used or intended to be used for the parking of a trailer, recreational vehicle or other type vehicle used or intended to be for dwelling or sleeping purposes, <u>and or a short</u> term residential rental unit as defined in section 12-68.3.030, as may be amended from time to time.

This Impartial Analysis of Measure Q has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

On August 2, 2022 the City Council unanimously voted to place Measure "Q" on the November 8, 2022 general municipal election ballot. By placing Measure "Q" on the ballot, the City complies with Article XIII C of the California Constitution (Proposition 218), which requires a majority of the voters to approve an ordinance that establishes a general tax.

If approved by a majority of Ontario voters, this Measure would authorize a one percent (1%) retail transactions and use (sales) tax within the City of Ontario. A one percent (1%) rate equates to an extra \$1 per \$100 purchased of taxable goods. Exempted from sales tax are unprocessed groceries, rent, prescription medicine and personal services such as medical, dental, and legal. It is estimated that Measure "Q" will provide an additional \$95,000,000 in annual local funding that could be used for maintaining general City services such as fire, paramedic, police, 9-1-1 response, crime prevention, first responder recruitment and retention, street and sidewalk repairs, local drinking water source improvements, storm drains and flood control, homelessness assistance, public area beautification, parks and recreation facilities, and programs for youth, seniors and veterans. This tax would be a "general tax," meaning that revenues raised from the tax would go into the City's general fund to pay for any lawful City program, improvement, or service.

California Revenue and Taxation Code section 7285.9 authorizes the City to levy a general transactions and use/sales tax at a rate of one percent (1%) so long as the tax is approved by a majority of the voters voting in an election on that issue. If approved, the tax would remain in effect until ended by Ontario voters voting at a subsequent election.

The tax would be paid in addition to current sales taxes and would be collected at the same time and in the same manner as existing sales taxes. All revenues raised by the tax would remain in the City and would not be shared with the State, County, or any other agency.

A "yes" vote on Measure "Q" will authorize the 1% transactions and use (sales) tax.

A "no" vote on Measure "Q" will not authorize the 1% transactions and use (sales) tax.

MEASURE F CITY OF REDLANDS

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE F

This Impartial Analysis of Measure F has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

Measure F proposes an Ordinance amending sections 1A.0, 1A.10, 1.A.30, 4.2B and 4.41j of the Redlands General Plan 2035, collectively titled, "Principles of Managed Development." Measure F was placed on the ballot by the City Council and provides as follows:

- The Redlands General Plan provides that socio-economic studies be prepared for most development projects. Measure F amends the socio-economic impact analysis for residential projects to provide that the "cost portion" of the study be determined by a mathematical formula which considers the City's budgeted expenditures, the City's population, and the projected population of the proposed project.
- The Development Fee Policy and the Socio-Economic Cost/Benefit Study would not apply to any development that is located within the University Street Transit Village, which is government funded and/or subsidized and subject to a master development permit.
- The Redlands General Plan prohibits the establishment of new residential land use classifications by the City Council. Measure F exempts the "Transit Village Overlay Zone" from this prohibition.
- New construction of single-family homes on existing lots bound by developed property as of March 1, 2020 are exempt from Measure U.
- The Redlands General Plan exempts from Measure U development directly related to Metrolink stations. Measure F eliminates this exemption.
- The Redlands General Plan exempts from Measure U projects proposed within the City's Downtown Specific Plan 45 by a 4/5th vote of the City Council. Measure F eliminates this exemption.
- Parcels identified as Resource Preservation located in San Timoteo Canyon west of the Southeast Area which are zoned Agriculture (A-1) cannot be rezoned, unless approved by the voters.
- Measure F adds the following provisions to the Redlands General Plan:
 - Limits building height within the Downtown Transit Village and the University Street Transit Village to 3 stories and 43 feet in height; except:
 - Buildings located within ¼ mile from a transit station within the University Street Transit Village shall be limited to 4 stories and 68 feet in height; and
 - Buildings within a single-family residential neighborhood shall be limited to 2 stories or 35 feet in height.
 - Limits building height within the Alabama Street, California Street and New York Street Transit Villages to 4 stories and 68 feet in height.
 - Prohibits buildings more than 2 stories in height from being constructed adjacent to a single-family residence, absent written agreement from the owner of the residence, except properties across a public right-of-way.
 - Requires residential multistory buildings, constructed within the City's Transit Villages, to provide one covered parking space for each one bedroom or studio unit; two covered parking spaces for two or more bedroom units; and one guest parking space for every five units.
 - Parking for projects within 1/4 mile of a transit station within the University Street Transit Village shall be governed by a comprehensive parking management plan.
 - Allows nonresidential hotels to be constructed within the City's Transit Villages, with the height and size determined by the City Council.

A "yes" vote would approve Measure F.

A "no" vote would reject Measure F.

This Rebuttal to Argument in Favor of Measure F was submitted pursuant to Section 9285 of the California Elections Code. It is the opinion of the author(s), and has been printed exactly as submitted.

The Measure F argument conveniently sidestepped the realities that Redlanders will face in November. Most notably, authors dodged how the measure allows for 68-foot buildings on the eastside and westside.

In comparison, the Stuart Street garage is an unaesthetic 55 feet. The future City Hall is an 85-foot hi-rise. If approved, the Measure F creates new eyesores blocking our mountain views.

Their obfuscations cannot be overlooked. They imply that Measure F:

- Caps buildings at three stories- Too late. In May, the Redlands City Council rubber-stamped State Street Village, which calls for 700 apartments in five-story buildings shoehorned into downtown.
- Reduces traffic- They claim University Village will magically reduce commuter traffic. Their implication that renters will swap cars for bicycles is wishful thinking. And incredibly, they state university faculty and staff will leave their houses for on-campus living.
- Will create four-story buildings- Nonsense. Sixty-eight feet equates to a five-story building.

Further, they never addressed crime and noise. Also, they ignore impacts on public services and an already failing sewer system.

Undoubtedly, supporters will enjoy a campaign war chest that out-of-town developers will provide. They will shower voters with advertisements claiming taller buildings lead to a happier community. (A similar tactic failed in 2020, when Measure G supporters lost in a 2-1 landslide despite enjoying a 9-1 spending advantage.)

We understand the University of Redlands is essential to the life of the city. Many of us are longtime neighbors and alumni of the University.

However, we don't believe the university should ruin our homes with a high-density project bringing noise, traffic, pollution, and crime to our quiet neighborhoods.

The University Project is too tall and dense for our sleepy streets. We didn't buy here so developers could destroy our American dream. That's why we were among the most enthusiastic supporters of the height-capping initiative that collected 7,710 signatures.

University Village is a monstrosity! According to its master plan, the project measures 1,445,000 square-feet of development in a compact area. That includes a hotel as well as 68-foot buildings, which would cast shadows over our one-story homes (In comparison, the new downtown Stuart Street parking garage is 55 feet) Grove Street, where it is planned to sit, is very narrow. Neighbors find it difficult to drive down Grove Street as it is today. Can you imagine adding hundreds more daily drivers?

At a June 21 meeting of the Redlands City Council, University President Krista Newkirk said the additional height ensures profitability. In the Redlands Community News, Kevin Dyerly, University VP of finance, stated that the additional height meant the project wouldn't "lose an estimated \$54 million in value."

INITIATIVE ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF REDLANDS AMENDING SECTIONS 1A.0, 1A.10, 1.A.30, 4.2B, AND 4.41j OF THE PRINCIPLES OF MANAGED DEVELOPMENT OF THE CITY OF REDLANDS GENERAL PLAN 2035

WHEREAS, more than 40 years ago, in 1978, the voters of the City of Redlands approved Proposition "R," which established an ordinance enacting certain standards and procedures relating to managing growth within the City of Redlands; and

WHEREAS, more than 30 years ago, in 1987, the voters of the City of Redlands approved Measure "N," which in relevant part enacted an ordinance which amended Proposition "R" to enhance the limitations established by Measure R and establish additional development standards within the City; and

WHEREAS, Measures R and N have been codified in the City of Redlands Municipal Code as Title 19, Growth Management; and

WHEREAS, in 1997 the voters of the City of Redlands approved the General Plan amendment commonly known as Measure "U" to assure consistency between the General Plan and growth management limitations and standards established by Measure R and N; and

WHEREAS, the provisions of Measure U have been fully incorporated in the City's current General Plan 2035 in its current form which was enacted on December 5, 2017 ("General Plan 2035"); and

WHEREAS, in order to assure that future development within the City of Redlands occurs in a way that is consistent with the established values and standards enacted by the people of Redlands that promote the social and economic well-being of the entire community, it is necessary to amend certain provisions of General Plan 2035 to:

- a. Reduce costly urban sprawl and minimize future tax and utility rate increases while preventing the overcrowding of public school facilities, over-burdening public services such as police and fire, while providing adequate traffic circulation.
- b. Preserve, protect and promote agricultural and open space uses.
- c. Preserve the vitality and character of historic and older neighborhoods.
- d. Preserve the vitality and character of the Historic Downtown Packinghouse District as the primary source of City sales, business license and property tax revenues.
- e. Ensure that sufficient developable land exists within the current City boundaries to meet projected housing needs, including housing for low and moderate income families, the handicapped and the elderly, while still preserving the City's quality of life.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF REDLANDS DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. GENERAL PLAN AMENDMENTS- The following provisions of the City's General Plan 2035, Sections 1A.0, 1A.10, 1.A.30, 4.2B, and 4.41j are hereby amended to read in their entirety as follows (deletions are shown by strikeout and additions are underlined):

- a. AMENDMENT OF GENERAL PLAN 2035 SECTION 1A.0 PRINCIPLES OF MANAGED DEVELOPMENT
- 1. 1A.10 PRINCIPLE ONE: The cost of infrastructure required to mitigate the effects of development shall be paid by that new development.

- (a) Development fee policy In accord with the provisions of California Government Code Sections 66000 et. seq., all development projects as defined therein shall be required to pay the development fees to cover 100% of their pro rata share of the cost of any public infrastructure, facilities or services, including without limitation police and fire services, necessitated as a result of such development. The City Council shall set and determine development fees sufficient to cover 100% of the estimated cost of such public infrastructure, facilities and services based on appropriate cost-benefit analyses as required by the provisions of California law.
- (b) Socio-Economic Cost/benefit Study and Findings Required Every development project proposal requiring a General Plan Amendment, Zoning Amendment, Subdivision Map, Specific Plan, Pre-Annexation Agreement for Outside City Utility Connections for non-contiguous properties, or for projects involving structures larger than 5,000 square feet, Conditional Use Permit approval, shall submit a socio-economic analysis and cost/benefit study, which shall also be included in all environmental documents submitted to the extent permitted by law, identifying the source of funding for necessary public infrastructure and reflecting the effect of such development on the City, as part of the application process. The City Council shall publish notice of and hold at least one public hearing at which the public may appear and be heard to consider the socio-economic cost/benefit study. Approval of the development project shall only occur if the socio-economic study finds and determines to the satisfaction of the City Council that the development project 1) will not create unmitigated physical blight within the City or overburden public services, including without limitation the sufficiency of police and fire protection, and 2) the benefit of the development project to the City outweighs any direct cost to the City that may result. The City Council may, however, approve a development project for which the socioeconomic study fails to make the required findings or determinations if the City Council finds and determines upon a 4/5 vote of its total authorized membership that the benefits to the City from the development project outweigh the negative socio-economic effects that may result.

1) For projects with a residential component, the Cost portion of the Cost/Benefit Study for that component shall be determined by dividing the city General Fund Expenditure Budget by the City Population and multiplying that quotient by the projected population of the project.

- (c) Impacts of New Development on Public Schools Shall Be Mitigated -A mandatory component of the socioeconomic cost/benefit studies shall be an analysis of the effect of the proposed development on public schools facilities and resources, and shall include proposed measures to mitigate any identified adverse impacts on school facilities to the greatest extent permitted under California law.
- (d) Exception The provisions of Section 1A.10 shall not apply to any development, or portion thereof, that is located within the University Street Transit Village, funded by and/or subsidized by the federal, state, or local governments, and subject to a master development permit.
- 2. 1.A.30 PRINCIPLE THREE Land use classifications set forth in the Redlands General Plan provide for an appropriate range of densities for residential development and intensity of commercial and industrial development in the City of Redlands.
 - (a) Number of Land Use Classifications and Density Standards Shall Not Be Increased The density standards set forth in Paragraph 4.40, Residential Land Use Classifications, of Section 4.0, Land Use Element, of the Redlands General Plan shall not be increased, and no new residential land use classification <u>except for the Transit Village Overlay Zone</u> shall be added, without a vote of the people.
 - (b) Prohibition of Transfers of Density In order to assure that development occurs in a rational way, no transfer of residential development rights from lands other than those designated for single family residential shall be permitted, and then such transfers of single family residential density shall only be permitted to create or preserve agricultural, open space, school or park uses.
 - (c) <u>Buildings in the Downtown Transit Village and the University Street Transit Village shall be</u> <u>limited to three (3) stories and a height of forty-three (43) feet from ground level to their</u> <u>highest point visible from the fronting street.</u>

(1) Except: Those buildings that are located within ¼ mile of the transit station that is within the University Street Transit Village and that are subject to a master development plan shall be limited to four (4) stories and a height of sixty-eight (68) feet as measured from the ground level to their highest point visible from the fronting street.

(2) Except: No building more than two stories or (35) feet in height shall be permitted within an established and constructed single-family residential neighborhood.

- (d) <u>Buildings in the Alabama Street, California Street and New York Street Transit Villages shall</u> be limited to four (4) stories and sixty-eight (68) feet in height as measured from the ground level to their highest point as viewed from the fronting street.
- (e) <u>No building more than two stories in height shall be permitted adjacent to a single-family</u> <u>dwelling absent written agreement of the dwelling owner(s); however, this section does not</u> <u>apply to properties across a public right of way.</u>
- (f) In multi-story structures with a residential living component in the five Transit Villages, parking for two or more bedroom units shall be two covered parking spaces and for one bedroom and studio units shall be one covered parking space. Every five units shall have one guest parking space.

Except: Parking for projects within 1/4 mile of the transit station that is within the University Street Transit Village and that are subject to a master development permit shall be governed by a comprehensive parking management plan made part of the master development permit that establishes all required parking spaces.

- (g) <u>Non-residential hotels are permitted and can be developed anywhere in the five Transit</u> <u>Villages, height and size determined by the City Council and are exempt from 1.A.30(c) and</u> <u>(d).</u>
- b. AMENDMENT OF GENERAL PLAN 2035 SECTION 4.2B PRINCIPLES OF MANAGED DEVELOPMENT:
- **B. EXEMPTIONS**
- 1. Vested projects. This initiative measure shall not apply to or affect any property on which a vested right has been legally perfected and acquired prior to the Effective Date pursuant to state law.

2. Special Categories of Development. The provisions of this initiative measure shall not apply to the following:

A. New individual infill construction of single-family homes on existing lots of record bounded by developed property as of March 1, 1997 <u>2020</u>;

B. Rehabilitation, remodeling or additions to existing single-family residential structures;

C. Reconstruction or replacement of any uses to the same density, intensity and classification of use as existed on the Effective Date, including non-conforming uses;

D. Development directly related to the proposed Metrolink stations in the City of Redlands, including one at the University of Redlands;

E. New development projects subject to Downtown Specific Plan 45, upon a four-fifths (4/5ths) vote of the total authorized membership of the City Council;

F.D. Special, temporary or occasional uses of public streets including parades, local sporting and cultural events, graduation ceremonies, approved school activities and other occasional public gatherings.

c. AMENDMENT OF GENERAL PLAN SECTION 4.41j

Section 4.41j of the Redlands General Plan 2035 shall be amended to read as follows:

All parcels of land encompassed within the area identified as Resource Preservation in the Redlands 2035 General Plan Figure 4-5 in San Timoteo Canyon, west of the Southeast Area (Figure 4-3), which are zoned A-1 Agriculture on the Effective Date shall remain A-1 Agriculture, unless changed by a majority vote of the electorate. on GP Figure 4-5 are subject to the residential density limitations set forth in Section 4.42m and are hereby designated as Resource Preservation as defined in Section 4.96.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS

- A. "Effective Date" shall mean the date on which this initiative measure was adopted by the City Council of the City of Redlands or on the date on which it was passed by the voters at the polls, whichever comes first.
- B. "Dwelling" and "dwelling units" shall be defined as any single family residence, apartment or dwelling unit in a multi-unit structure, or mobile home.

SECTION 3. EXEMPTIONS FOR CERTAIN PROJECTS

- A. This measure shall apply to all properties and projects covered by its terms, except it shall not apply to any development project which has obtained a vested right as of the effective date of this measure. For purposes of this measure, a vested right shall have been obtained only and if each and all of the following criteria are met:
 - 1. The proposed project has received a building permit or its final discretionary approval.

2. Substantial expenditures have been incurred in good faith reliance on the permit or final discretionary approval.

3. Substantial construction has been performed in good faith reliance on the permit or final discretionary approval.

- B. The substantiality of expenditures incurred and of construction performed and the question of whether or not such expenditures and construction were in good faith are questions of fact to be determined on a case by case basis by the City Council following application by the developer and notice of a public hearing. Actions taken by the developer to speed up or expedite a development project with knowledge of the pendency of this measure shall not be deemed in good faith and shall not qualify for vested rights. Phased projects shall be considered for exemption on a phase by phase basis to the extent permitted by California law. For purposes of section 19.04.060 of this chapter, with regard to water and sewer connections outside the city, an applicant shall qualify for a vested right only if the foregoing criteria are met after the applicant has obtained a water and sewer connection, commitment, or both if both are required, from the City (4 of Measure N, passed by voters 11-3-1987: 17 of Proposition R, passed by voters 11-7-1978).
- C. This initiative measure is not intended and shall not be applied or construed to authorize the City to exercise its powers in a manner which will take private property for public use without payment of just compensation, but shall be interpreted, applied and implemented so as to accomplish its purposes to the maximum constitutionally permissible extent without requiring payment of compensation.
- D. If application of this initiative measure to a specific property of record as of the Effective Date would create a taking then the City Council may, upon application by the landowner, allow additional density or uses on such property, upon findings that the level of additional development permitted is the minimum necessary to avoid a taking, and no lesser level of development would be sufficient to avoid a taking.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY

- A. In interpreting this initiative measure or resolving ambiguity thereof, the City Council and all other city entities charged with implementing or enforcing this initiative measure or any part of it, as well as a reviewing court, shall interpret this initiative measure in the manner which most vigorously and effectively accomplishes its purposes and operative provisions.
- B. If any portion of this initiative measure is hereafter determined to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, all remaining portions of this initiative measure shall remain in full force and effect. Each section, subsection, sentence, phrase, part or portion of this initiative measure would have been adopted and passed irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, phrases, parts or portions be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT AND REPEAL

This initiative measure and all of its provisions may be amended or repealed only by a majority vote of the electorate.

MEASURE J CITY OF REDLANDS

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE J

This Impartial Analysis of Measure J has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

Measure J proposes an Ordinance, if approved by the voters of the City of Redlands, would amend Redlands Municipal Code Section 5.08.482, and establish a new business license rate for distribution centers doing business in the City of Redlands. The revenue received by the City would be used to defray the costs of providing City services and supplement the City's General Fund. The Measure was placed on the ballot by the City Council.

A distribution center is defined in Redlands Municipal Code Section 5.08.482 as a business which consists primarily of receiving, temporarily storing and subsequently distributing goods, wares or merchandise to wholesalers and retailers.

Presently, the business license rate for distribution centers operating in the City of Redlands is four and seven-tenths cents (\$.047) per square foot of gross floor area. The Measure would establish a new annual business license rate of ten and one-half cents (\$.105) per square foot of gross floor area principally devoted to the distribution of goods. The Measure would also delete existing language that would increase the business license rate annually by the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index to the maximum amount of five cents (\$.05) per square foot of gross floor area. All other provisions of Redlands Municipal Code Section 5.08.482 remain unchanged.

Application of the new business license rate to such distribution centers would result in the City's receipt of approximately \$530,000 annually. If approved by the voters, the new business license rate would go into effect on January 1, 2023. Pursuant to State law, the Measure requires a simple majority approval of the voters to pass.

A "yes" vote would approve the increase of the business license rate to ten and one-half cents (\$.105) per square foot of gross floor area for distribution centers in the City of Redlands.

A "no" vote would leave the business license rate at its current rate of four and seven- tenths cents (\$.047) per square foot of gross floor area for distribution centers in the City of Redlands.

Voters should approve increasing the business license tax rate for warehouse/distribution centers to ten- and one-half cents (\$.105) per square foot because the current rate does not go far enough in giving the city the revenue necessary to offset the impacts these businesses have on our community today.

In 2007, Redlands voters approved the business license tax and set the rate at three- and one-half cents (\$.035) per square foot with an annual escalator of five thousandths of one cent (\$.005). This was at the start of the vast warehouse expansion. Today the rate is four- and seven thousand cents (\$.047) per square foot, which means this rate has only increased by one- and two thousandths of one cent (\$.012) over that past 15 years. The present structure of the business license tax rate, including the annual escalate, for warehouse/distribution centers doesn't work for our community.

Voters should approve increasing the rate increase to ten- and one-half cents (\$.105) because it will add \$530,000 to the general fund. The added revenue can be used to develop and implement programs to reduce the effects of climate change throughout our community and establish Redlands as the leader in these efforts, something that cannot be done with the rate structure that exists today. Approving this rate increase will have the added benefit of providing the city with a revenue source it can use during poor economic times when we will need revenue to staff our public safety departments, keep our library open and continue providing quality of life services to our residents.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF REDLANDS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTION 5.08.482 OF THE REDLANDS MUNICIPAL CODE AS IT RELATES TO BUSINESS LICENSE TAX RATES FOR DISTRIBUTION CENTERS.

(NOTE: Additions are highlighted in *bold italics* and deletions are highlighted in strikeout)

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF REDLANDS DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Subject to the approval of a majority of the voters of the City of Redlands at the General Municipal Election so designated by the City Council in a separate resolution placing the proposal on the ballot for such election, Section 5.08.482 of the Redlands Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

"Chapter 5.08– BUSINESS LICENSE RATES

Article VII. Particular Business

• • •

5.08.482: DISTRIBUTION CENTER:

- A. Commencing on the effective date hereof (the "effective date") for every person, firm, partnership, business or corporation conducting or managing a business consisting primarily of receiving, temporarily storing and subsequently distributing goods, wares or merchandise of any kind to wholesalers or retailers (hereinafter a "distribution center"), the business license tax shall be in the amount of three ten and one-half cents (\$0.035) (\$.105) per square foot of gross floor area principally devoted to such use, as calculated by the city's community development department. From and after such effective date, the business license tax established by this section shall be automatically adjusted each year by the percentage increase in the consumer price index Los Angeles Anaheim Riverside area; provided, however, the business license tax shall not be adjusted to any amount greater than five cents (\$0.05) per square foot of gross floor area.
- B. Notwithstanding subsection A of this section, any person, firm, partnership, business or corporation which conducts a wholesale or retail business within the city and which also conducts or operates a distribution center solely in support of such wholesale or retail business shall not be subject to the distribution center business license tax established by this section.
- C. Notwithstanding subsection A of this section, any person, firm, partnership, business or corporation which conducts a wholesale or retail business within the city and which also conducts or operates a distribution center in support of such wholesale or retail business and other wholesale or retail businesses located outside the city shall pay the distribution center business license tax established by this section only on the percentage of gross floor area of the distribution center principally devoted to supporting the wholesale or retail businesses located outside the city."

SECTION 2. The License Tax set forth herein shall be collected and administered in the manner set forth in Chapters 5.04 and 5.08 of the Redlands Municipal Code.

SECTION 3. Pursuant to Article XIIIB of the California Constitution, the appropriation limit for the City of Redlands will be increased by the maximum projected aggregate collection authorized by the levy of this general tax, as indicated in Section 1, in each of the years covered by this Ordinance plus the amount, if any, by which the appropriation limit is decreased by law as a result of the levy of the general tax set forth in this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. If any portion of this Ordinance is declared invalid by a court of law or other legal body with applicable authority, the invalidity shall not affect or prohibit the force and effect of any other provision or application of the Ordinance that is not deemed invalid. The voters of the City hereby declare that they would have circulated for qualification and/or voted for the adoption of this Section, and each portion thereof, regardless of the fact that any portion of the initiative may be subsequently deemed invalid.

SECTION 5. Pursuant to California Constitution Article XIIIC §(2)(b) and California Elections Code §9217, this Ordinance shall take effect only if approved by a majority of the eligible voters of the City of Redlands voting at the General Municipal Elections to be held on November 8, 2022. The new taxing rate shall go into effect on January 1, 2023.

SECTION 6. The Mayor is hereby authorized to attest to the adoption of this Ordinance by the People voting thereon on November 8, 2022, by signing where indicated below.

MEASURE L CITY OF UPLAND

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE L

This Impartial Analysis of Measure L has been prepared by the City Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

On August 8, 2022, the City Council unanimously voted to place Measure "L" on the November 8, 2022 general municipal election ballot. By placing Measure "L" on the ballot, the City complies with Article XIII C of the California Constitution (Proposition 218), which requires a majority of the voters to approve an ordinance which establishes a general tax.

If approved by a majority of Upland voters, this Measure would authorize a one percent (1%) retail transactions and use (sales) tax within the City of Upland. A 1% rate equates to an extra \$1.00 per \$100 purchased. It is estimated that Measure "L" will provide an additional \$16,000,000 in annual local funding which could be used for general City services such as 9-1-1 emergency response, police staff, patrols and public safety, gang and crime prevention programs, addressing homelessness, and maintenance of streets, sidewalks, parks and infrastructure. This tax would be a "general tax," meaning that revenues raised from the tax would go into the City's general fund to pay for any lawful City program, improvement, or service.

California Revenue and Taxation Code section 7285.9 authorizes the City to levy a general transactions and use/sales tax at a rate of one percent (1%) so long as the tax is approved by a majority of the voters voting in an election on that issue. If approved, the tax would remain in effect until ended by Upland voters voting at a subsequent election.

The tax would be paid in addition to current sales taxes and would be collected at the same time and in the same manner as existing sales taxes. All revenues raised by the tax would remain in the City and would not be shared with the State, County or any other agency.

A "yes" vote on Measure "L" will authorize the 1% transactions and use (sales) tax.

A "no" vote on Measure "L" will not authorize the 1% transactions and use (sales) tax.

If Measure "L" is not approved, the General Fund will not receive the sales tax revenues identified in the Measure. The City Council will then have to decide, as part of the budgeting process, whether other revenues are available to pay for City programs and services, or whether City programs and services will have to be reduced.

This Impartial Analysis of Measure K has been prepared by the Town Attorney pursuant to Section 9280 of the California Elections Code.

The Town Council has placed Measure K on the ballot ("Measure"). If approved, the Measure will amend the Town's existing Transient Occupancy Tax Ordinance ("TOT Ordinance") to adjust the tax rate under the TOT Ordinance.

The existing TOT Ordinance includes a tax on individuals staying in hotels, short-term vacation rentals, or other lodging for thirty (30) consecutive days or less. The current tax rate is 7% of the rental amount.

If approved, the Measure would amend the existing TOT Ordinance to adjust the tax rate to 12% of the rental amount. It is estimated that this proposed adjustment to the tax rate would provide the Town with an additional \$1,300,000 per year for general government use. The funds collected through the TOT Ordinance could be used by the Town for general services such as police patrols and 911 emergency response, short-term vacation rental compliance monitoring, gang and crime prevention, street maintenance, traffic management, maintaining and keeping parks and other Town facilities safe and clean, supporting fire protection, and affordable housing. The tax would continue until ended by the voters.

Since the TOT Ordinance is a general tax, this Measure requires a majority of "Yes" votes to take effect.

A "Yes" vote is a vote in favor of the Measure. If the Measure is approved, the tax rate paid by individuals staying in hotels, short-term vacation rentals, or other short-term lodging under the TOT Ordinance would be adjusted to 12%.

A "No" vote is a vote against the Measure. If the Measure is not approved, the tax rate paid by individuals staying in hotels, short-term vacation rentals, or other short-term lodging under the TOT Ordinance would remain at the current rate of 7%.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF YUCCA VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTION 3.24.030 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING THE TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX AS ENACTED BY THE TOWN OF YUCCA VALLEY VOTERS

WHEREAS, Town of Yucca Valley currently imposes a Transient Occupancy Tax ("TOT") on all visitors for the privilege of occupancy in any hotel, as defined in Section 3.24.020 of the Town of Yucca Valley Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, the TOT Ordinance imposes a general tax in the amount of seven percent (7%) of the rent charged by the operator of the hotel; and

WHEREAS, the Town and the people of the Town of Yucca Valley desire to adjust the TOT from seven percent (7%) to twelve percent (12%); and

WHEREAS, the TOT does not raise residents' taxes, it applies only to those who stay in local hotels, motels and short-term vacation rentals, ensuring visitors pay their fair share of services they use while in town; and

WHEREAS, an increase in Short Term Vacation Rentals has placed an additional burden on the services provided by the Town of Yucca Valley; and

WHEREAS, the Town is required to maintain 145+ miles of roads, Yucca Valley needs to keep up with repairs, maintenance to streets, sidewalks, storm drains, and other facilities before they become more expensive in the future; and

WHEREAS, additional funding to maintain the quality of services, such as police, 9-1-1 response times, maintenance of streets, parks, infrastructure, and programs for youth and seniors is needed; and

WHEREAS, by keeping Yucca Valley safe, clean, and well-maintained, the Town seeks to protect property values and preserve the small-town character that makes Yucca Valley a special place to live; and

SECTION 1. RECITALS.

The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are adopted as findings.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT OF SECTION 3.24.030.

Section 3.24.030 (Tax Imposed) of Chapter 3.24 (Transient Occupancy Tax) of the Town of Yucca Valley Municipal Code is hereby amended and restated in its entirety as follows:

"For the privilege of occupancy in any hotel, each transient is subject to, and shall pay a tax in the amount of twelve percent (12%) of the rent charged by the operator or otherwise playable by the transient. Insofar as the transient is concerned, said tax constitutes a debt owed by the transient to the operator or to the town. If the rent is paid in installments, a proportionate share of the tax shall be paid with each installment. The unpaid tax shall be due upon the transient's ceasing to occupy space in the hotel. If the tax is not paid to the hotel operator, the tax administrator may require payment directly to him."

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY

Should any provision, section, paragraph, sentence or word of this Ordinance be rendered or declared invalid by any final court action in a court of competent jurisdiction or by reason of any preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentences or words of this Ordinance as hereby adopted shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 4. CEQA

The adoption of this ordinance is not a "project" subject to the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (Public Resources Code Section 21000 et seq.). CEQA Guideline 15378(b)(4) provides that the creation of government funding mechanisms or other government fiscal activities that do not involve any commitment to a specific project that may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment are not projects subject to the requirements of CEQA.

SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall be submitted to the voters at the regular municipal election to be held on November 8, 2022. This ordinance shall not become operative unless and until a majority of the electors voting on the measure vote to approve this ordinance, in which case this ordinance shall go into effect ten (10) days after the date on which the election results are declared by the Town Council.

- Accessible ballot marking devices, including audio and large text options
- · Assistance by poll workers
- Curbside voting
- Page magnifiers
- Wheelchair accessible voting booths

Additionally, you may bring one or two persons to assist you with marking your ballot.

Website Accessibility

The Registrar of Voters' website provides screen-reader accessible information for voters, including Voter Information Guides and ballots. Voters with disabilities may use their computer to mark an accessible ballot. Once marked, voters print their ballot and return it to the Registrar of Voters office. Disability Rights California (DRC)

DRC operates a Voting Hotline year-round, Monday - Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. to assist voters with disabilities. On Election Day, the Voting Hotline is available from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Call (888) 569-7955.

Language Assistance for Voters

Language assistance and sample ballots are available in Chinese, Indonesian, Korean, Tagalog, Thai and Vietnamese at all county voting sites. To request a translated sample ballot, call (909) 387-8300, select a language preference when you register to vote or submit a request found at

Election Workers must comply with legal restrictions imposed upon them including, but not limited to, restraining orders, restrictions imposed on registered sex offenders, or any other prohibitions or limitations on their presence at voting locations and must notify the County immediately if they are prohibited from serving at their assigned voting location. For any questions, call the Registrar of Voters at (909) 387-8300.

Voter Bill of Rights

You have the following rights:

- 1. The right to vote if you are a registered voter. You are eligible to vote if you are:
 - a U.S. citizen living in California
 - at least 18 years old
 - registered where you currently live
 - not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony
 - not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court
- 2. The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list. You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.
- 3. The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.
- 4. The right to cast a secret ballot without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.
- 5. The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake, if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:
 - Ask an elections official at a polling place for a new ballot, or
 - Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot for a new one at an elections office, or at your polling place, or
 - Vote using a provisional ballot.
- 6. **The right to get help casting your ballot** from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.
- 7. The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place in California.
- 8. The right to get election materials in a language other than English if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.
- 9. The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures and watch the election process. If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.
- 10. The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.
